In the last newsletter, Pastor Joel wrote the following about how the idea of sabbatical developed through the Old Testament.

According to both Deuteronomy 15:1-2 and Leviticus 25:3-6, every 7 years was to be a "shemmitah" (Hebrew), or a year of release. For Deuteronomy, it was about relationships, a year to forgive all debts. For Leviticus, it was a year for the soil to lay fallow so that the earth could regenerate and be prepared for future harvests. Over time, these commands became more holistic, and the people began to see the 7-vear sabbatical as a time for the entire nation to collectively focus on higher pursuits, taking a break from distractions in order to focus on their identity as people of God's covenant

This ideal of higher pursuits and living into God's promise led us toward a sabbatical through May, June, and July, and specifically to the way we chose to use that sabbatical time. We did not see that time as ours alone, but as a time that we invited the congregation to also participate in, to focus on God's direction for us as a community of faith.

Based on information from twelve conversations held throughout October 2014 with over 100 people participating, the pastors, longrange planning committee, and council discerned three strategic areas that the congregation felt we might be "growing into the future together" with God, as the theme for our sabbatical was named. Those three areas are Service. Offsite Gathering, and Relationship with God.

1. Service

We desire to seek ways to deepen our relationships with those who live in our

community. Primarily, this will happen by extending our relationships with Monroe Elementary School, but the service dream team has also been collating the many ways to serve in our community, as well as discovering ways people at Zion already serve.

2. Offsite Gathering

Based on data that shows that at least 60% of our area population does not have a faith community they call home, we are considering locations, target audiences, and formats for an offsite gathering of some kind that would share our amazing Lutheran core message of love, grace, and forgiveness with others in our local community.

3. Relationship with God

The goal is to develop a congregational initiative to help support anyone at Zion in our pursuit to read God's Word, pray, and share our faith with others.

During sabbatical, much time was spent learning more and thinking about these three areas. Between the two of us, we read many books and learned from many others. We interviewed and spent time working with other pastors who lead communities we felt we could learn from, as well as community and social service agency leaders, a teacher and a principal at Monroe Elementary School, and Loveland police officers. All through this, we continued to focus on our theme verse from Scripture, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and

with all your mind. This is the first and the greatest commandment. And the second is like it. You shall love your neighbor as yourself' (Matthew 22:38-39).

We also had some surprises along the way that didn't necessarily fit into the strategic growth areas of our sabbatical, but were certainly ways that we can "grow into the future together."

With your help, we raised almost \$2,000 for the Lutheran Family Services Refugee & Asylee Program by running a half-marathon together!

While we were in Nicaragua visiting Pastor Sonja's family, we were able to travel to the little town of Somoto, in the northern region of the country, where we saw how a handful of Lutheran congregations from Northern Colorado has been serving those in need in that country for over 20 years. Our children were with us, allowing us the chance to explore the possibility of taking people of all ages back in future years to build houses, help in a childcare center for working parents, provide possible Vacation Bible School opportunities, and more. It is possible that Loveland Habitat for Humanity may be returning there with a stronger emphasis than ever before, and we just might be frontrunners in this mission opportunity!

All of those different learning opportunities sound like a lot, right? Well, we were fortunate to find many opportunities for rest, enjoyment, and renewal individually and for our entire family that we have not ordinarily taken.

Named and Claimed—Fall Worship Theme

Starting September 13, the focus for worship during the next 9 months at Zion will return to the Narrative Lectionary. The Narrative Lectionary follows the sweep of the entire biblical story from start to finish, starting with creation in Genesis each September, sweeping its way through the Old Testament until Christmas, then working through one of the Gospels and Acts in the spring.

The intent of the Narrative Lectionary is to help worshipers understand the story of Scripture as one and become fluent in the language of faith. Going through the Bible in order gives us a chance to put the stories in context. Our Bible stories are filled with flawed and very, well, *human* people. And yet, the theme you can't ignore when you work through these stories in order is that God never lets us down. God's covenant is renewed over and over and over again.

These are our stories—the good, the bad, and the ugly, and the good news is that God's work in the world didn't end at the end of the written Word. The stories we're living—our lives now—are part of that narrative that began generation upon generation ago. We find our story in God's story.

Our first theme this fall will be "Named and Claimed." We learn the power of names in the first two books of the Bible, and the good news that we are named and claimed by God.

September 13—"What's in a Name?" (Genesis 2:4b-25)

Adam and Eve, man and woman, are named, and their names are more than simply personal names. Their names mark their vocation, the image of God they carry, and the deep relationship they have with God.

September 20—"His Name is Laughter" (Genesis 18:1-15; 21:1-7)

"Isaac," Abraham and Sarah's son born to them in spite of their old age, means "laughter." There is joy in God doing the impossible! Is anything too wonderful for the Lord?

September 27—"You Shall No Longer be Called Jacob, but Israel" (Genesis 32:22-30)

"Israel" means "one who wrestles with God." What does it mean to wrestle with God? It transforms lives, even in the most difficult of relationships.

October 4—"The Unnamed Pharaoh and the Named God" (Exodus 1:1-14; 3:1-15)

The most powerful man on earth bears no name in this story, but God's name is revealed, and may reflect on our own names and identities.

Naming Daughters by Brooke Loftus

Naming my first daughter, I worried that somehow I would give her the WRONG name. I wanted the name to have a significant meaning and be as beautiful as the newborn I held in my arms. It also had to be one her father and I could agree on. We spent days looking through lists, and marking names we liked. I would hold our daughter and call her by each name. I was surprised when names I thought fitting really weren't when compared with others. I put off the decision as long as I could, agonizing that somehow I would fail as her mother if I were to give her a name that didn't fit her personality or a name she would grow to hate. Other factors also concerned me. What would other people think of her name? How would my name choice for her reflect on me? Again, what if I gave her the wrong name? People kept asking if we had a name for our baby yet. At a week old, we finally settled on her name, Leilani Hana-Marie McKee. My mom's response will forever stick in my head, "That's such a long name for such a tiny little baby. But I suppose she will grow into it."

Leilani means "heavenly flower" or "royal child" depending on the translation, and it is a popular Hawaiian name. Hawaii runs through my blood, or at least it feels like it, even though I grew up in Colorado, and spent what time I did in Hawaii mostly as a tourist. I have no family there. And yet, I couldn't shake this deep desire to manifest the islands in my life. The name also seems to fit her, thankfully, after all the anxiety we experienced attempting to come up with that one perfect name.

Nearly 10 years later, naming my second daughter was so different. Leilani was writing a story where the main character, modeled after herself, had a little sister, 8-10 years younger, named Emmalia. Leilani was

For example -

CHARLOTTE SCHMIDT who was named after her mother, which was unusual back in those "old" days. She also has a cousin named Charlotte as well as an aunt. When she was little, Charlotte had a German nickname (Lutechen), which was German for Charlotte.

SUSAN and DAVID SAMUELS had a combination of criteria for naming. Susan was named by her mother just because she "liked the name of Susan." When Susan and David named their children, they liked biblical names, but also liked when the names were grandparents from either side. Hence, Nathan Benjamin (from grandparents on both sides) and Luke David (from his father, David). Their daughter, Rachel, was obviously, a strong biblical choice and their youngest child, Joshua Adam, was actually named by his two older brothers.

One of our newest families, WILL and ROCILLE LINCE, have an additional twist for us in the naming and claiming information, as they are expecting their new daughter in September/ October. Rocille was named after her parents (a combination of Rolando and Cecilia). When selecting names for this new baby, they started with names that they liked the sound of, and then moved on deeper into the meanings. At this time, they are "leaning" toward the name Danica. This is a name from Slavic mythology and actually means Day Star, who was the younger sister of the Sun. She would arise early each morning to open the gates to release the Sun so that he could move across the sky and then be there to close the gates after the Sun returned in the evening. Danica was also known as a Goddess and Protector. It seems this may be a lot for a little baby to live up to.

convinced she had made it up all by herself. I remember reflecting on Leilani's story and how interesting it was that she had created this family group, giving herself a younger sister. Less than 2 weeks later, when I learned that I was expecting, Leilani immediately asked, "If it's a girl, can we name her Emmalia?" I would say, "We'll see," knowing full well that any name would have to wait for the "test" of does it actually match the child. Again, I scanned name sites to have alternatives, in case Leilani's choice didn't work with this new child, although I would find myself referring to her as Emmalia constantly despite myself. The name needs to fit the child, I would remind Leilani. The day I met Emmalia for the first time, I quietly tried out her name. I was pretty sure it fit. Nothing else seemed to. This time, as unsure as I felt about the enormous responsibility of naming a human being, her name was clear. She left the hospital officially Emmalia Jean Loftus.

Emmalia is a combination of "Emma" and "Lia." Emma means "universal, entire, whole, complete." Lia means "weary, bringer of good news." It certainly fits her. She's been talking since the moment she could breathe with small little noises and grunts. This time, instead of so much anxiety about the right name, I felt more relaxed. Her sister had given her a name. It would forever be a gift that Leilani and I had given to this new family member.

s Christians, our Baptism is the symbol of our new life with Christ. We are named as Children of God and claimed as Christians. Then as we grow up and receive our First Communion we are named again, as older, more mature, and free-thinking Christians. We feel a closer connection to Jesus as we take the Meal in remembrance of Him, yet again claimed by Jesus. We are claimed every time we take communion. We are claimed because we are remembering all God and Jesus sacrificed and how Jesus loved us so much he died for our sins. Then another couple of years pass, and we begin Confirmation. We learn about what it means to be named as a Christian. We dive deeper into subjects, and come up with our own ideas about being a Christian. Then as we get confirmed, we are claimed as official members of the church. We are named again as Children of God. We are claimed as Christians, Our Confirmation is an affirmation of our Baptism. It reminds us of the simplicity of being a loved child of God, but the Confirmation brings us into a new life under Christ and members of the church.

But this is where there becomes a gray area for me. If we are named and claimed through Baptism, Communion, and Confirmation, then what about the people that don't claim themselves as Christians. I have always been taught that God loves everyone: no matter if you are a Christian or not, sinner, or non-believer. God claims everyone as a loved child of God. Although not everyone knows of his loving,

you more than you can imagine. He claims and names everyone. He doesn't love anyone more than anyone else. God has no favorites. Being a Christians doesn't mean God loves you more. Just because you have been

boundaries. We claim God, and God claims us.

Preschool

Our youngest learners will be following a narrative lectionary-based curriculum and will continue to meet in the Thompson Valley Preschool building for arts and crafts, Bible stories, and fellowship led by MISS MEG.

Kindergarten—5th Grade

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We are Church: Better Together

Jacob and I first want to say thank you to Zion for the opportunity to represent our congregation in the 2015 Rocky Mountain Synod (RMS)

Assembly in Salt Lake City. After many years of attending youth gatherings I have a hard time remembering to call it an assembly and not a gathering as it truly was a gathering of friends new and old.

The theme this year is "We are Church: Better Together!" We found the words of Bishop Eaton, the keynote speaker, inspiring. She speaks with intelligence, wit, humor, and compassion. Her message of Better Together encouraged us that when Christians work together we find that we have more in common than we have differences. that our differences are what make us unique and are to be celebrated and embraced while our common work of serving God brings us together. She emphasized that the specific theology that makes us Lutheran is beautiful and is a thing to be celebrated. While we hold strongly to our identity as Lutherans we can also work with our fellow Christians with whom we have much in common. especially the call to share the love of Christ with the world through acts of service. Catholics, Episcopalians, Presbyterians, Methodists, and even Mormons were represented at the assembly and spoke to this same message.

The assembly voted on three resolutions, and all three passed. The first was <u>Addressing Mental Health and Wellness</u>, which created a task force to increase awareness of mental health needs in our church and communities. The second was

Making US Aid to the State of Israel Contingent on Halting Settlement Construction. This resolution produced the most debate, but in the end the prevailing argument against this measure was that the church should not be involved in politics. This argument was not strong because the ELCA and even our own synod is highly involved in political advocacy, speaking on behalf of those whose voice is marginalized. The RMS alone employs two full-time advocates. It was encouraging to hear how our church advocates for others; this is different from political lobbying because our advocates do not seek to better the position of our church but to help others. The third resolution followed this exact theme: Called to Set the Captives Free: A Call to Increased Awareness and Action to Confront the Practice of Human Trafficking, which also created a task force to raise awareness for human trafficking. The hope is with awareness, future action can be taken.

Along with listening to engaging speakers and meeting with friends and making new friends, different groups from the assembly had the opportunity to take tours of Mormon sites. We went on the cemetery tour, which was truly fascinating and encouraging to see how inclusive the Mormon cemetery is with space for different faith groups, including two separate Jewish cemeteries and several paupers fields, one of which holds a notorious local Joseph Slade who built Virginia Dale.


