The Body of Christ

Dear Friends in Christ,

Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose.

-1 CORINTHIANS1:10

The theme for this issue of the *Eve* on Zion comes from the worship theme in the month of May, focusing on 1 Corinthians. What is it that draws us together as a church community, in spite of our differences? Sure, we are very much alike in many ways, but we still come together with various political opinions, social values, ages, and backgrounds. I would hazard a guess that there are some things about each other, that if we met one another in any other situation, we may not choose to meet again. And yet, as the body of Christ, we do meet again, and

again, and again.

Beyond those differences, we are drawn together in spite of both theological and geographic differences. The body of Christ is individual Christians and congregations all over the world, as witnessed by our mission in April to raise funds for Ejeda Hospital in Madagascar and to be drawn together to learn about the culture and the church there. Finally, the body of Christ surrounds us. In Loveland, we are drawn together with other Lutherans, and with Christians of other congregations that may seem so different from us. We may be different from them, but we are still the same body together, working together for the same purpose.

For all the differences we may see, we are drawn together for the sake

of the whole body, and perhaps more importantly for the sake of the world. When our differences threaten to divide us, what keeps us together is that Christ is at the center of it all. We are drawn together by Christ, to be Christ's body for the world. Teresa of Avila, a saint and theologian from the 16th century, wrote, "Christ has no body now on earth but yours, no hands but yours, no feet but yours, yours are the eyes through which Christ's compassion is to look out to the earth, yours are the feet by which He is to go about doing good and yours are the hands by which He is to bless us now."

What is your place in the body of Christ? What is our place together, as one expression of Christ's body? Within this issue of the *Eye on Zion*, you will find diversity, many activities, much cause for both celebration and challenge to grow as disciples. In all this, know that together as the body of Christ, Christ is our head, Christ is our center, and Christ is our support.

THE BODY OF CHRIST Worship Series on 1 Corinthians

In Corinth, the gathering of Christians, which the Apostle Paul helped establish during his 18-month stay in Corinth, had come into difficulties because of a variety of leaders with differing ideas, concerns about the right religious practices, as well as theological questions. The Apostle Paul writes to help answer the questions and to encourage them to unity. What joins this diverse group of Christians together is that they are all a part of the Body of Christ. Throughout the month of May, we will dive into Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians and what unites the Body of Christ.

May 1—United in Baptism—1 Corinthians 1:10-18

Our unity comes to us in the one baptism given to us in Christ.

May 8—Rooted in Love—1 Corinthians 13:1-13

Dedication of Lutheran World Relief Quilts. Zion's quilters have shared their gifts as they have worked tirelessly this year making 55 quilts. We will dedicate these in worship and send them to care for those in need around the world.

May 15—Activated by the Spirit—Acts 2:1-4; 1 Corinthians 12:1-13

Pentecost Sunday. We give thanks for the work of the Spirit who empowers us for mission and provides each one of us with gifts for ministry.

Dedication of Homeless Sleeping Mats. Throughout the winter, we collected over 3,000 plastic bags, cut them into strips, rolled them into balls from which the Sunday Stitchers crocheted them into five sleeping mats for the homeless. We will dedicate these in worship and take them to After Hours which serves the homeless at Civic Center Park in Denver.

May 22—Sent with the Gifts—1 Corinthians 12:22-31

Gratitude Sunday. God has gifted each one of us with gifts for mission. On Gratitude Sunday, we want to thank you for sharing these gifts within the Zion community and within the broader community of Loveland. We will give thanks for Zion's many ministries in worship. Following worship, the Generosity team will host a Gratitude Picnic at noon as a way to say THANK YOU for all that you do. (See the related article on page 17 of this newsletter.)

May 29—Raised to New Life—1 Corinthians 15:1-26, 51-57

Honoring Those Who Died in Faith. On this Memorial Day weekend, we will give out white carnations in worship. People may place these on the Veterans Memorial at Dwayne Webster Veterans Park in honor of those who died serving our country, place them on the grave of a loved one, or take them home to remember those who have died in faith.

Digging Deeper: Misused Verses in the Bible Summer Worship Series

We often hear people quoting the Bible to fit a particular argument, or to prove their faith to others. Maybe you have done that yourself. Sometimes it works, but sometimes when the quote is taken out of its original context, it ends up far from the intended meaning. Sometimes, people even quote the Bible...only to be told or to discover that the "quote" is not actually from the Bible at all.

This summer we are going to be "digging deeper" into some of these quotes to see just what the Bible says about them. This is going to be an exciting, but also challenging theme, as it may challenge some of our assumptions of our faith. In the schedule below, can you find the problems with each of our titles, taken from popular quotes today? If not, do not fear! We intend for this theme not to tear down, but to build up and lift up the Gospel and share the good news for us and for all in Jesus Christ.

Please note that our summer worship times change starting June 5 and will continue through September 4, Labor Day weekend. Because of their commitment and dedication, this ministry will become possible. It's truly amazing how everything has fallen into place -donations to provide initial funding, the foresight of our Council and Long-Range Planning Committee to integrate the Children's Music Ministry into our overall financial structure, our continued relationship and outreach with Monroe Elementary, and the enthusiasm of many parents at Zion with whom this ministry would directly connect through their children.

Finally, I would encourage you to pray and consider being a part of this wonderful ministry. We will need volunteers for the after-school program, your wisdom as we experience the growing pains that are inevitable with any new ministry, and your prayers as we seek God's plan forward through the Children's Music Ministry. Milwaukee Children's Choir

As a special kickoff to our inaugural year of the Zion Children's Music Ministry, we have invited the Milwaukee Children's Choir to perform a concert at Zion Lutheran Church on **Tuesday**, **June 28, at 7:30 p.m.**

Zion has had the privilege to work with Artistic Director Marco Antonio Melendez, who was a guest clinician and artist in October 2015 with the Chancel Choir. Marco is an accomplished vocalist and conductor, having studied at the prestigious Westminster Choir College, and he has worked with a number of youth choirs in his years in the profession. Marco was a consultant as we began discussions at Zion for the development of a Children's Music Ministry, and the work he has done with the Milwaukee Children's Choir is most impressive. You won't believe the amazing sound that comes from these kids!

To make a concert of this magnitude a reality, there are some logistical considerations which must be accomplished. The music ministry has contributed to the Milwaukee Children's Choir so that the concert can be free, but donations will be asked for to help further defer the costs of travel. Additionally, we will need host families

for the choir members for two nights (Monday and Tuesday, June 27 and 28). Serving as a host family would include transportation to and from Zion, breakfast, and providing a welcoming and safe atmosphere for our young guest artists. The children will have been accustomed to sharing beds (two students per bed) while on tour, so it would be ideal to host students in groups of two. For more information, the Milwaukee Children's Choir has provided a "Guidelines for Host Families" document that will be available at the Zion office. And, finally, we have agreed to feed those involved with Milwaukee Children's Choir the evening of the concert (June 28 at 6:00 p.m.), and we will need help in providing this meal. Sign-up sheets for host families and the June 28 meal will be available through the Zion office. Additionally, you can send an e-mail to me at music@zionloveland.com.

Thank you for all of your support, year after year, for the work of the music ministries. I am excited to see this concert come to fruition, and I believe it will be an inspiring experience for youth and adults alike on the incredible abilities of young musicians as we begin our ministry in children's music.

In 1983, a small group of dedicated people came together with the vision to start a church library. They dreamed and visioned, but the vision did not become a reality until a librarian was in place to care for the library on a regular basis. Carolyn Smela stepped up to take on that ministry, surely not knowing she would hold this position for the next 32 years. Carolyn tirelessly cared for Zion's library as she cataloged, purchased, and reshelved books. Along the way, she had many helpers, but they all took direction from Carolyn. Carolyn's ministry was a behind-the-scenes kind where most people don't even know it is going on until it does not happen. One cannot begin to count the time and love that Carolyn has put into the library over the years. When you go to other church libraries, you realize how amazing Zion's library is. This is all due to the work of Carolyn. Thirty-two years is a long time to do anything, and so at the end of 2015 Carolyn retired from this ministry. Emeritus Professor Dr. George Stevens visits Mountain View High School in honor of Martin Luther King Day









I n November, Zion said "farewell and godspeed" to ANGIE ELDER in her role as our Director of Children, Youth, and Family Ministries. We believe a very large percentage of these ministries involve the same kind of activities. By sharing all of these common points of ministry, our hope is that we will be able to save time for each congregation's staff, build a greater level of support and collegiality, and increase opportunities for creativity. As an integral part of this shared ministry, a team that includes pastors from both congregations called Loveland Lutheran Faith Formation (L2F2) will be created to determine on an ongoing basis how we walk forward in ministry together. This team will help our staff distribute responsibilities. We hope that

this will provide greater sustainability in this ministry.

There are still ministry responsibilities that are "site specific" that will not be part of L2F2 shared ministry. These areas include Sunday School, nursery, worship,

and possibly some of our fund-raisers.

We are excited about the possibilities this shared ministry will bring for Zion, King of Glory, and our shared witness to the community. A search team made up of JUDY GUSTAFSON and BEILYNN, KRISTI PEACH, SUSAN SAMUELS and RACHEL, and PASTOR JOEL are currently working with a team from King of Glory, and we hope to have both positions filled sometime during the summer.

King of Glory church recognized for mission

King of Glory Lutheran Church, 2919 N. Wilson Ave., has been recognized by Reconciling Works (formerly Lutherans Concerned/North America) as the most recent Reconciling in Christ congregation in Northern Colorado.

The recognition comes after the congregation officially adopted a public statement of welcome for "all people regardless of race, age, culture, ability, socioeconomic status, personal background, sexual orientation or gender identities, or other circumstances that can divide us."

According to a news release, the recognition is consistent with the King of Glory mission statement that "As God's people ... graced by differences, we invite and welcome all to grow in faith."

Called Forward Together in Christ: A process to discern the ELCA's future

As we anticipate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation in 2017, many people are asking what kind of church do we believe God is calling the ELCA to become? How do we become an inclusive, diverse church that is inspiring and relevant in different communities?

Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton is leading a process endorsed by the ELCA Church Council and in collaboration with the Conference of Bishops and other leaders from across this church that will guide us as a church together to discern in faith the future of the ELCA.

Through an initiative titled Called Forward Together in Christ, we'll be assessing where we are as God's people and working to understand what God has in store for us. We are going to do a lot of listening— to God and to one another.

Together, we will create a vision for the future ELCA, a church with solid foundations

that shares the good news of Jesus Christ and makes a difference in the world.

What is the Called Forward Together in Christ process? In the three main stages of Called Forward Together in Christ we will:

- Have a conversation across this church about the future.
- Consult on directions and priorities that emerge.
- Reach decisions as a church about the directions in which we will head.

Between now and May, people in ELCA congregations, synods, social ministries, educational institutions and the churchwide office will be invited to take part in the conversations by providing ideas and feedback—hearing from as many people as possible.

In July, a consultation paper on the future directions of the

ELCA (based on these conversations) will be released. It will present themes and ideas for the future that will be tested in August and September.

At its November meeting, the ELCA Church Council will consider and approve a statement to articulate the future directions and priorities for our church. The goal is to launch this statement in 2017 as part of the ELCA's Reformation anniversary observance and begin to move in the direction in which God has called us.

Look for information about this initiative at upcoming meetings, including the Conference of Bishops gatherings, ELCA Church Council meetings, synod assemblies, the ELCA Multicultural Summit and the Churchwide Assembly, and Grace Gathering event this August. Freed in Christ to serve: The 2016 dedicated day of service

The ELCA's dedicated day of service—known as "God's work. Our hands." Sunday—will be Sunday, Sept. 11. The day offers an opportunity for Lutherans to extend the work they do in their communities every day, from preparing and delivering meals to people rendered homeless to thanking emergency responders. This year's day of service will also mark the 15year anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks on the United States.

"The world can be a dangerous place. But there are some who, when disaster strikes, run toward the danger. These are first responders, firefighters, police and EMTs, who live out their baptismal vocation in service to their communities in times of intense need. They do God's work with their hands," said Presiding Bishop Elizabeth A. Eaton.

She added, "The Rev. Stephen Bouman, executive director for ELCA Congregational and Synodical Mission and former bishop of the ELCA Metropolitan New York Synod at the time of Sept. 11, recounts this story: "He had a pastor in his synod who was a chaplain to the fire department. When the first plane hit the first tower, the chaplain rushed to the site where firefighters were mustering. He prayed with them and then took oil and marked their foreheads with the cross. Then the firefighters rushed into the building. The people who survived said they could see the crosses shining on the foreheads of the firefighters.

"In baptism we have been marked with the cross. We are the ones who go into the broken places of the world. We are the ones who, by showing up on 'God's work. Our hands.' Sunday, shine the light of the cross in our communities." Since 2013, thousands of ELCA congregations have dedicated a day to serve communities in ways that share the love of God with all people. Congregations are encouraged to select another day if Sept. 11 is not feasible.

On the way to greater unity: Lutherans and Catholics prepare declaration

Preparing for the 500th Reformation anniversary in 2017, Lutherans and Roman Catholics in the U.S. have prepared an ecumenical text, "Declaration on the Way: Church, Ministry and Eucharist." At its heart are 32 "Statements of Agreement," existing points of convergence whose cumulative impact has surprised even many of those who have closely followed the 50 years of dialogue between the two traditions. The document also indicates differences that remain and suggests some possible ways forward.

In its conclusion, the "Declaration" calls for reception at all levels—from international bodies to local settings, for which it offers concrete suggestions. It encourages Catholics and Lutherans locally to connect in "a deeper commitment to Christ and greater engagement and collaboration with one another." It also suggests that the expansion of opportunities for Lutherans and Catholics to receive Holy Communion together would be a sign of the agreements already reached.

In August, the ELCA Churchwide Assembly will consider the "Statement of Agreements." It already has been unanimously affirmed by the Church Council and by the Conference of Bishops, as well as by the Bishops Committee on Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops.
