A Light to Lead the Way Pastor Joel Pancoast

At baptism, all who are baptized receive a baptismal candle, lit from the large Paschal Candle, representing the light of Christ that shines in their lives. At Zion, we encourage everyone to celebrate their baptismal birthdays every year. This encouragement is not only for the newly baptized, but everyone of any age who has been baptized at any time. Just as we often celebrate birthdays, even more we should celebrate the day we were given a sign and a promise that God has claimed us, named us, and given us a light in Jesus to lead the way.

Sometimes with the way our culture celebrates Christmas, the meaning and importance connected to our lives can be lost or forgotten. For this reason, Christians have observed the season of Advent as a way to prepare for Christmas and to welcome the same Jesus, who is born into our hearts. This year, our Advent and Christmas celebrations focus on the light of Christ, "A



Light to Lead the Way." We anticipate the celebration of the birth of Jesus, just as we long for Jesus to come again to bring the kingdom of God in its fullness. As we do, we will hear God's word from the prophets of old, who promise the light that leads the way of hope, love, joy, and peace. Jesus will come again to bring the light in its splendor. In the meantime you have that light already, even if only a dim specter of Christ's light, because in baptism you are marked with the cross of Christ, sealed by the Holy Spirit, and led by the light of Christ. As you live in that promise, you bear that same light to the world.

As we focus on this theme of "A Light to Lead the Way" in Advent and Christmas, remember your baptism! If your baptismal birthday falls during this season, celebrate God's light in your life. To help, the names of everyone who has a baptismal birthday in the following week are read in worship. On your baptismal birthday, invite people to

celebrate with you, say a special prayer of thanks, have a special meal. Most importantly, light a candle to reflect on Christ's light shining in your life, and consider how you will share that light. Even if your baptismal birthday doesn't fall during this season, this season is a time to give thanks and celebrate Christ's life and light.

I have often said both during preparation for baptism and baptism itself that I would be delighted if I am asked by any of you if you could have another baptismal candle because your has burned too low from too much use. I hope my encouragement here, as well as my own family's practice, might encourage you to use yours if you have one. On October 29, we celebrated our oldest daughter's baptismal birthday, and as is our tradition, she pulled her baptismal candle out of her faith chest. As we remembered her baptism, prayed, and talked about that special day in her life, the flame from the candle caught fire on the candle's decal, showing us that it is time to replace it. We could use any candle, but for Sophia, a candle from church with signs of baptism on it carry special significance. I

asked her to write something to share with you about her baptismal birthday, and this is what she wrote:

Every year, when my baptismal birthday comes around, my family celebrates it. To our family, it means that we are loved children of God. I don't get huge presents, just ones like a bible highlighter, or a bible, or a bookmark, or a piece of jewelry to remind me of my faith. Something to help me grow in faith. To my family, being a child of God means sharing the word, and helping others grow in their faith. For that reason, we celebrate.—SOPHIA PANCOAST




Children's Music Ministry (CMM) Noelle Bauman

Before our first service singing with the chancel choir, the choristers of the Zion children's choir talked about why they were practicing to sing for the congregation. This type of reflection has been paramount to the overall environment the CMM volunteers and I are creating with our after-school choir. Even though the choristers express their nervousness about singing in front of people, they all agree they have been given a gift that can be used to glorify God.

Since our first rehearsal in September to our first worship service in October, the choir has grown to include eight girls of varying ages. With direction from the CMM Vision Team, our group has focused on being musically literate, being respectful choristers, and preparing songs for worship independently, and alongside the adult chancel choir. The amount of hard work the girls put in on a weekly basis is impressive, and much of the drive is owed to the amazing help of our volunteers. I find myself continuously in awe of the sense of community throughout Zion, and the dedication to lead the young children in the way of God.

As we look to the future of this ministry, we prepare for the welcoming of students from Monroe Elementary. As I learn more about the relationship between Zion and Monroe, I see people who are surprised—as I was—at the amount of assistance, care, and support Zion can give. Confirmation Shines a Light

On October 30, Zion witnessed as seven of our young people affirmed the faith into which they were baptized. This act of affirming their faith, and being confirmed by God's Spirit, is the culmination of a lengthy process of learning and growing in the light of Christ, and it is the beginning of a new stage in their lives as they continue to follow—and to shine—that light to others.

At Zion, confirmation is a 3-year process for youth and their parents (or some caring adult) through the middle school years with a dual emphasis both on teaching and a fellowship. Over the course of 3 years, we learn the whole story of the Bible and how our lives fit into that story; the basics of faith taught in Luther's Small Catechism (Ten Commandments, Creed, The Lord's Prayer, Holy Communion, and Baptism); and generally what it means to be and to live as a Lutheran Christian.

Throughout those 3 years, their teaching and learning is complemented by many experiences that teach them to see and be a part of Christ's light shining in the world. They participate in confirmation camp at Sky Ranch, where they experience a major story of the Bible, such as the Exodus story, the Jesus story, and the Acts of the Apostles, and the formation of the early church story. They attend retreats, where they learn about the complex issues of poverty and homelessness while working on ways to help the poor; they learn about the greater church they are a part of as they gather with hundreds of other middle school youth from around the Rocky Mountain Synod; and they learn about biblical concepts like spiritual gifts, worship, and prayer.

But the theological and academic content of what confirmation youth and their families learn together only takes root if they have a deep, rich foundation of soil, provided by a loving community of faith. These youth and their families grow together as a part of the church, just as they grow into their understanding of being a part of the whole church. They have supported each other just as they have been supported by you. They have found mentors and caring adults throughout the congregation, and we pray those relationships continue. They have learned to participate fully in worship, and they have supported and led worship. Christ's light has led them in their lives, just as they have shined Christ's light to those around them, and we look forward to seeing Christ's light continue to lead them in their journeys.

As each youth prepared their own statement of faith, they were also asked to consider a Bible verse that would help guide them in their lives, both in good times and in bad. They were also asked to consider the gifts that God had given them, and how they might use those gifts in an upcoming ministry project. Please pray for these confirmands, and for their lives of faith as they move beyond this important milestone and into a new stage of their faith journey.

WHAT ARE STEPHEN MINISTERS?

Stephen Ministers are laypeople—Christian men and women—trained to provide one-to-one care to people experiencing a difficult time in life, such as grief, divorce, job loss, chronic or terminal illness, and relocation or separation due to military deployment.

Stephen Ministers come from all walks of life. Their commonality? A passion for bringing Christ's love and care to people during a time of need. A Stephen Minister begins a caring relationship when he or she is matched with a person experiencing a life crisis. The Stephen Minister then meets with that person on a weekly basis to listen, care, encourage, and provide emotional and spiritual support. The caring relationship lasts as long as the person is in need of care.

Zion has its second boiler in about 50 years

Thanks to the work of BILL KURTZ and the generosity of many in the Zion community, Zion now has its second boiler in only about 50 years to heat the building! This has been a growing need for several years, especially as the boiler has gone down and required costly maintenance and repairs in the last several years. And of course, problems with a boiler always arise when it's being used heavily, so we lost the ability to heat the building at critical times, like Sunday worship or when families through Interfaith Hospitality Network (IHN) were staying overnight in the building.

The one behemoth Acme boiler that filled an entire room was deemed to be somewhere between 50-60 percent efficient. If you stood in the nursery, which was directly above the boiler room, you could feel that lack of efficiency as heat rose through the floor and made the room entirely too hot for the nursery staff and children. In place of the one large, inefficient boiler, we have actually received four Rinnai high-

efficiency boilers, which are 96 percent efficient and modulate as needed for maximum efficiency. This means that if only a portion of the heat is needed, the boilers will compensate and de-rate the output unlike the existing boiler that fired at full output no matter how small the demand. This will save a lot in the normal usage of natural gas purchased.

While the boilers were being replaced, we also learned

that the two water heaters were 12 years old, which is pushing toward the potential lifetime of standard water heaters. Since we were still within the total project amount, we opted to have the water heaters replaced with tube tanks that were close to the same cost if we replaced the current water heaters with the same equipment. These tanks contain tubes that hold water heated with the new high-efficiency boilers instead of their own burners. For this reason, these new tanks will last much, much longer than traditional direct heated water heater. This new hot water tank will also provide much more hot water recovery than two standard heaters. Overall, it seemed like a great opportunity while everything was taken apart and the system was being replaced.

Thanks again to Bill Kurtz and to all who generously provided financially to complete this project and provide consistent heat in the coming winter. If you would like to see the new boilers, come by sometime during the week and ask for a tour. We will be happy to show them off to you.

With summer over, Troop 314 has begun our yearly scouting program of activities. We finished out the month of August focused on wilderness survival skills such as building shelters, minimalist cooking, kit free first aid, and finding food sources in wild places. All those skills you hope you never need, but if you ever do.... Selfconfidence derives in part from understanding personal capability and knowledge, and the boys certainly gained from the month's skill building.

Also in August, the troop joined other local troops at the Scouting Ranch near Redfeather to participate in a shooting weekend. The boys who attended had the opportunity to shoot 22 caliber rifles, 12 gauge shotguns, and archery. Several boys were able to make strides toward shooting and archery merit badges, while others who were new to the sport had the opportunity to be introduced to the experience in a safe environment. Several of our adult leaders took the time earlier this year to become certified NRA Range Safety Officers and NRA Range Instructors and then provided range control during the event. Reports from the boys certainly expressed the event was fun and even the adults were O.K. at shooting. Who knew, right?

September launched a new skill theme of pioneering. Meetings were focused on learning to tie knots and lashings and then use the new skills to build structures in the parking lot. Starting small with cooking tripods, moved on to trail gateways and multi-level towers. Pioneering incorporates more than just "sticks and strings," but is a focused team training skill as most of the complex structures require boys working in unison to assemble and erect them. It is one of the popular themes as the boys end the evening looking at a big accomplishment that they built together.


October began our orientation month. Maps and compasses received a heavy and hard workout this month as the younger boys were introduced to the way-finding tools and the older boys were tested with increasingly complex courses to push their abilities. A skill that some are more natural at, a handful of scouts who really excel become the gurus for the rest of the troop. It is these scouts who are tasked with building the orientation courses for the rest of the troop by month's end.

We also accomplished our 2017 year planning in October. Troop 314 is a boy-led troop, and the scouts themselves met on a Saturday to discuss what the skill themes for next year will be, what weekends will be reserved for camping, what events they will be arranging for, and all the other activities. Adults were in attendance for nothing more than to agree to provide transportation and funding. In all seriousness, the adult leaders were there to guide the boy leaders and help answer questions, but the troop is, indeed, led and planned entirely by the scouts themselves.

With November being a shorter month, we are going to be focused on general rank advancement and quartermaster tasks. It is time to reorganize chuck boxes and repair tents. 
Zion member, Aaron Bauer, has had a short collection of his poems published and the book is available in Zion's library; check it out—literally!
