For it was you who formed my inward parts; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works; that I know very well.

-PSALM 139:13-14

It is difficult for me to name one favorite Psalm. I have a favorite for every kind of situation in life. But when I think about the miracle of life and our relationship to God. Psalm 139 is "it." God knit each of us together in a way that is beyond our understanding-the way our inward parts work together in a perfect balance. Even the smallest parts of our bodies, down to each individual cell, has a function that works toward a greater purpose, giving us the ability to learn and reason, to talk and listen to others, to embrace each other and to send messages, all while our bodies automatically control our heart rate, blood pressure, balance, breathing, and many other functions. It is amazing; an absolute miracle when you start to think about the complexities of our bodies and the way God has knit them together. We are indeed "fearfully and wonderfully made."

That means every person who reads this article, every person who participates in community, has a creative purpose, whether intentionally acted out or automatically directed as nothing

Of course, if we are fortunate enough to grow old, many experience the failing of our physical bodies. The same happens in community. Eventually, there will always be some conflict, some disagreement, some struggle to get through. But all life depends on the gracious will and act of God, who both creates us and redeems us through Jesus Christ. Christ gave

# International Baccalaureate (IB) Personal Project Girl Talk at Zion

The Personal Project is an independent assignment that gives individual students attending Loveland High School the opportunity to share something that they're passionate about, and is meant to stress an importance on selfdiscovery and growth as an IB learner. The intent of the project is to challenge students over the course of many months, and allow individuals to expand upon their strong interests and genuine curiosities.

For my Personal Project, I have chosen to start a nationally recognized club chapter, known as Girl Talk, within my community; focusing on the middle schoolaged females living within Loveland, Colorado, who may be struggling with the issues an abundance of young women face throughout their 6th-8th grade years in school.

Girl Talk is an international nonprofit mentoring program with a simple yet clear foundation: to give high school girls the chance to mentor middle school girls, helping them confront the challenges many encounter during their formative teenage years. Their mission is to help young teenaged girls build personal leadership skills, recognize the importance of improving one's community, and develop higher self-confidence. Middle school girls, with the help of Girl Talk, are provided with the realization that they don't have to feel hopeless or lonely regarding the obstacles they face. High school leaders have the opportunity to share their experiences and advise younger members, creating positive role models for the middle school youth. The lessons learned in Girl Talk have the potential to contribute to girls becoming more confident, service-minded women with stronger leadership characteristics.

My experiences with bonding and developing lifelong friendships with a diverse group of young women within my community thus far has allowed me to prove to myself that I am capable of doing much more than I've previously thought or imagined. My Personal Project has pushed me outside of my comfort zone, forcing me to challenge myself and look beyond just school and academics; overall turning into a goal that is greater than myself.

Girl Talk has given me the support and encouragement to bond with youth living in the Loveland area, and provide them with a sense of camaraderie. Due to the things I have experienced and learned throughout the development of my Personal Project, I now realize that, no matter how stressful taking on a task like starting a Girl Talk chapter can be, I have the capability of producing something worthwhile and substantial despite the obstacles that stand in my way.

If you're interested or want to recommend this club to anyone you know, please feel free to. We love getting new members and want to grow Girl Talk into something even larger than it is now. We meet every Tuesday evening, from 6:00-7:00 p.m. at Zion Lutheran Church and tend to involve crafts/snacks at every meeting while discussing a meaningful topic (ranging from things like family relationships to school). To those interested: just show up! We meet in the middle school room downstairs. Bring a friend or come alone; we'd be so happy to have you.

As a group, we have given shawls to people who are suffering from cancer, and have heard that they love to wrap themselves in the shawl for not



When there is a funeral at Zion, it has been our pleasure to present the family with shawls, and they are always so happy to receive them again knowing we are praying for them. We are always happy to give a small shawl to the children who are baptized to let the family know prayers are being lifted for all of them. We share this ministry with the bride and groom and present them with a shawl for God's blessing on their wedding. Another group that has been blessed with shawls are our Stephen Ministers upon completing their training. I think this shows them that they are also being prayed for in their ministry and that when they enter into prayer for their care receiver, they can wrap up in their shawl.

One of the most dangerous places for a crocheter to visit is the yarn aisle. Don't worry, you did indeed read that correctly—the yarn aisle. If the crafter is unprepared, they will leave drowning in skeins of yarn they did not need. How does this happen? One word—potential. I see potential in a skein of yarn. What can I turn this into? A hat? A blanket? A Dancing Baby Groot? The possibilities are endless!




Skeins of yarn offer potential to the crocheter. Similarly, we are like skeins of yarn in God's eyes.

My perspective about a skein of yarn doesn't seem too far off from how God sees us—skeins of yarn of potential. He is our maker and he "hooks" in a series of specially spaced twists and turns to form us. He sees what we have been, what we are, and what we can become. After he's done shaping us, he then hooks us to each other. We are all part of the beautiful tapestry of community.

It's nice to know that I am a piece of the community that God tied me into, but sometimes it's hard for me to see my role/place in the group. What am I supposed to do for my crochet ministry? The challenge that has been placed before me by God is to see beyond the "rectangle."

Not only do I feel like God has asked me to look beyond the typical rectangular shape of a blanket, but to look beyond Zion. Who can benefit from a crocheted item? So far, I've only gotten as far as sleeping mats made from plastic bags given to the homeless community in Denver. But I have seen so much more since I have opened my eyes. There are people out there crocheting octopuses for preemies (the spiral tentacles are comforting to hold onto because it mimics an umbilical cord). Others have taken the call to crochet prosthetic breasts for women who have had mastectomies. There is unlimited potential to where my hook and yarn can take me.

So, what will your skein of yarn become? How can you use your special, unique talent to help hook your community together? For me, I am still creating blankets for the police chaplains to hand out in the community. My "beyond the

happen. The many children God brings to Zion are knit together as they become a community throughout the week of VBS.



We are excited to put together a team from Zion to join Laura's Team in the fight against meningitis. Sierra's Race is a 5K run or fun run for those 10 and under that helps to raise funds for the meningitis vaccine and raise awareness that with the vaccine many forms of meningitis can be prevented.

Meningitis hits close to home in our community. Laura Loken died of meningitis, Pastor Sonja's sisterin-law died from meningitis, and just this year one of our members, Sara Schreiner, contracted meningitis and continues to recover from the impacts of this horrible virus and bacteria.

\* The Loken family has graciously offered to sponsor all children age 10 and under at no cost who want to run the fun run plus cover half the cost for any youth age 11 to 18 as part of the Laura Loken Memorial.

The race was created in memory of Sierra Krizman who died suddenly of bacterial meningitis in April 2007. Sierra was just 20 years old when she died and had been in college studying elementary education. Had the family known that an immunization could have prevented this tragedy, Sierra would be alive today. 100% of all proceeds go to immunization and awareness of bacterial meningitis in hopes that no family would have to go through what the Krizman family did 10 years ago.


# Bike to Work Day Wednesday, June 28

# Lawn Maintenance

A transition in responsibility for Zion's landscape needs

When you look out of an airplane window flying over the middle of the country, the landscape looks like a patchwork quilt. Sometimes that landscape view reminds me of community, where individual gifts and contributions come together to create one beautiful handiwork. One such contribution has been what the Horst family has done over many years to create a beautiful landscape at Zion.

In March, the Horsts retired their work of contributing to the consistent care and maintenance of the lawn and the surrounding landscape after many years. When asked how long he had been taking care of the church landscape, Kevin's first response was, "A long time!" It was difficult for him to remember just how long he had been at it. Kevin first started taking care of the lawn in the 1980s, when he was in high school. When he got married and moved to Denver, he had to give it up, and volunteers continued the work for him. In 1998, he started at it again, and over the years his entire family has been involved in different ways. His son Josh started helping when he was probably 10 years old, but even as Josh and his sister Jordyn got older you could see all four of them-Kevin and Wendy, Josh, and Jordyn-on any given weekend in the summer riding the lawnmower or carrying a trimmer. In recent years as Kevin's work shifted, Josh took over the business and the care of Zion's landscape. Their care as a family for Zion's landscape has been admirable, and we are thankful, not just for their time, but for the quality of their care.

This is not a new pattern for the Horst family, nor is it the end. When Zion moved to its current location in the late 1960s, Kevin's father (Virginia's husband) Bob was instrumental in bringing in the shade trees on the south lawn from the nursery that was part of his family, creating a beautiful landscape for the community. Then, in the late 1970s, after Virginia's mother, Katherine Zimmerman, died, a memorial in her name paid for the sprinkler system to keep the lawn green. Finally, the tranquility garden with the fountain was placed as a memorial for Bob, and the family continues to maintain that space beautifully.

As you can see, the care and maintenance of Zion's landscape remains a concern for the entire Horst family, but their schedules are preventing them from being able to provide the consistent care and attention it needs. We are grateful for the many years of care they have given to providing a landscape for Zion's community. Children have played there, individuals have rested and enjoyed the garden, and the community has worshiped there during the summer, and for that we thank the entire Horst family.

Recently, BILL KURTZ, Zion's building and grounds chair, received bids for a new lawn service provider, and with the council's approval settled on Jason Mueller. Jason has provided quality snow removal for several years, so we are happy to extend our relationship to him for our lawn care. This will include mowing and trimming, sprinkler maintenance, weed prevention and removal, and fertilization so that we can continue to enjoy the landscape.

But, it will never replace the care that the Horst family has given to the landscape of this community.

#### ELCA presiding bishop issues pastoral message on Syria

CHICAGO – The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), has issued a pastoral message on Syria.

Eaton's message follows.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Like many of you, I have been deeply troubled by the news this week from Syria. First, there was the horrific chemical weapons attack on civilians. Then the U.S.

missiles being used against the Syrian airbase understood to have perpetrated the earlier attack. In both instances, the lives of precious children of God have been lost. Lord, have mercy.

The psalmist reminds us not to put our "trust in princes, in mortals, in whom there is no help," but rather reminds us to place our hope in the Lord our God. He recalls that "the Lord watches over the strangers; he upholds the orphan and the widow, but the way of the wicked he brings to ruin" (Psalm 146).

It is a time for prayer – for peace, and for those seeking refuge during this time when there is no peace in Syria.

Still, acknowledging our brokenness in sin, we recall that God created humans in God's image "made for life in community" and that our social statement, *For Peace in God's World*, encourages us to "pray for forgiveness, and for the faith that in love acts for earthly peace," and to work for it.

In situations of civil war, the statement notes, questions arise "about what, if anything, the international community can and should do in the face of internal conflicts." In deciding about wars, "we face conflicting moral claims and agonizing dilemmas" about the ways to help and protect the neighbor in the face of injustice and aggression.

While the path to peace remains unclear, our commitment to it should not waiver. We have been and will continue to assist Syrians in need through the Syriac Orthodox Church of Antioch in Syria, through the Lutheran World Federation assisting refugees in Jordan and through our Global Mission partners in Europe.

Let us continue to pray, assist those in need, offer refuge to those fleeing violence, and encourage all efforts toward peace for all of the children of God created in God's image. We continue to place our hope in the Lord our God, the Prince of Peace.

# Are you ready for renewal?

This summer, you can take part in a three-session Bible study written by Kelly Fryer, published in Gather, the magazine of Women of the ELCA. In "All Anew: Ready or Not," Fryer challenges us to consider what we're really asking for when we plead

with God for renewal. Renewal is a process much like giving birth beautiful and essential for life but not "nice." Like giving birth, renewal "produces pain, requires sacrifice, and makes a really big mess," Fryer says.

#### Three Bible study sessions

#### Session 1: Say goodbye to nice

For the heroes and "sheroes" of the biblical story, being part of the "new" thing God was doing often meant having to do and say things that were unpopular with family, friends, and neighbors. What if being part of God's renewal today means not just wading into the messiness yourself, but being willing to create discomfort for those you love? What truths need to be told in the places where you live, work, worship, and play? Are you ready?



Session 2: Stand with the least of these

The biblical story tells us that whenever God does a new thing, it happens in, through, and with people who live on the margins. With whom is God asking you to align yourself? In whose corner are you being called to stand? Are you ready?

### Session 3: Upend the tables

The biblical story is filled with characters who challenged unjust systems, took action that turned societal norms upside down, and spoke truth to power. What systems are you a part of that need to be challenged? What counter-cultural, justice-making actions are you being called to take? Are you ready?
