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## Foolish Love

This year a remarkable thing happens in our calendar. This is no joke! This year, Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day and Easter Sunday falls on April Fools' Day. This does not happen very often; the last time these dates coincided like this was 1945! In 1945, World War II ended. You could buy a house for about \$4,500 (yes, only two zeros!). The most popular song was "Sentimental Journey" by Les Brown and Doris Day. The Detroit Tigers won the World Series in Major League Baseball. Only a few of you remember those events in history; do you remember what it was like to celebrate Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day together, and Easter Sunday and April Fools' Day together?

This confluence of dates and holidays is unique, but it also gives Christians an interesting opportunity to reflect on the meaning of our Ash Wednesday and Easter observances. On Ash

Wednesday, many Christians receive an ash cross on their foreheads as they hear the words from Genesis 3:19: ... you are dust, and to dust you shall return." The ash has several different meanings, each taken from Scripture. It reminds us of the dust of the earth from which God made us, but it also is rooted in ancient biblical practices of wearing ashes (and sometimes sackcloth) as a sign of penance. We receive the ashes as a sign of grief that we have sinned and fallen from God, but the ash is marked as a cross to remind us that this same God who created us from dust also loves and forgives us.

Don't get any ideas—we won't be replacing ash with Valentine's chocolate for Ash Wednesday! In our cultural celebrations of Valentine's Day, very few people have any idea who Saint Valentine was or why a day is named after

him, and I suppose that is okay—I am not sure I would want my children giving Valentine's cards to their friends reminding them of 3rd century Valentinus, who refused to deny Christ and as a result was beaten with clubs and stones, and finally beheaded! Another legend of Valentinus was that he defied the emperor by marrying couples so that the men would not have to go to war. There are many legends and stories of St. Valentine, but the true love of all of these stories and of Valentine's Day is not romantic love but in Valentine's knowledge of God's love that goes to extreme lengths to be known.

Love can make us do foolish things. I remember my own early youthful experiences of love and how it made me completely irrational, and to be honest I kind of find joy in watching children coming of age become completely irrational in love. But the most foolish love of all is God's. Some may think that is irreverent of me, but leading up to Easter, we reflect on the "passion" of Christ, which is the story of his suffering and death for us, and while we often use the word passion to describe strong and sometimes even uncontrollable emotion, the root of the word passion is from the Latin word that means "to suffer." God's love for us is so strong that he suffered for us, even to the point of death on a cross. Jesus said, "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (JOHN 15:13).

That is why it is also so interesting that Ash Wednesday / Valentine's Day leads to Easter

Sunday / April Fools' Day this year. The cross is foolishness! Paul writes, "We are fools for the sake of Christ, but you are wise in Christ. We are weak, but you are strong. You are held in honor, but we in disrepute" (1 Corinthians 4:10). Paul writes this with irony, because while many of the Christians in Corinth saw that his life was full of suffering and hardship all for the sake of sharing the love of Christ, they began to boast in their accomplishments and great faith. They thought their faith was stronger and their wisdom was greater, but Paul wants them to see that success and wisdom that the world desires is not the success and wisdom that God desires and expresses. His "foolishness" of suffering for the sake of others is a reflection of God's "wisdom."

This confusion of foolishness and wisdom that Paul wrote about still happens today. Commitment to the gospel and to showing God's love that goes to extreme lengths seems foolish compared to the ways of the world. It will not lead to success or fame or wealth. It may not even necessarily lead to good health or long life or happiness. But it does rest in a sure and certain hope of the resurrection, new life in God's kingdom. And that hope leads us to do foolish things, like giving our time, talent, and treasure to God's mission of redeeming the world. Christian faith may seem foolish, but it is no less foolish than a God who loves you to death literally. This year, as we reflect on God's love for us that goes to any extreme, join me in being fools for Christ.

od's love manifests itself in any number of ways—as an individual who has dedicated his life to the arts, His love manifests itself in my life every day—through music. I am especially grateful to the chancel choir, children's choir, praise band, and bell choir, for their efforts at the end of 2017, particularly in the Advent and Christmas season, and I am eagerly looking forward to the efforts of these groups in 2018.

It is with excitement that I would like to announce the next major project of the chancel choir: a joint cantata with Trinity Lutheran Church, to be performed on Passion Sunday, March 25, at the 10:45 a.m. service. This cantata will incorporate Theodore Dubois' *The Seven Last Words of Christ*, a dramatic musical setting of the end of Christ's life. This unique opportunity to enter into holy week will see the choirs of Trinity and Zion collaborate with soprano, tenor, and bass soloists, and small chamber orchestra. I hope that you will join us, either as a temporary choir member for the project, or in joint fellowship in worship. # "The Great I AM" Sunday Worship for Lent

Our lectionary Scriptures for worship have taken us through the narrative arc of the Bible, starting with Creation at the end of summer, winding through the prophets in preparation for Christmas, and taking us through the Gospel according to John through the season after Epiphany as we encountered Christ in many ways. During Lent, our journey through John's Gospel continues with Jesus' many "I AM" statements.

These "I AM" statements in the Gospel according to John reveal Jesus' identity in all its fullness. When Jesus says "I AM...", no matter what qualifier follows, he is referring back to the name of God first given in Exodus 3. This name tells us both that God is personal and has a name to be known by, and that God's name implies power and action. The name of God implies that God is life itself, not the mere creator of life. Throughout this series during Lent, we hear many of the ways Jesus connects himself to God as the great "I AM." Whenever Jesus says, "I am the bread of life," or "I am the Good Shepherd," or any other "I AM...," the fullness of God as "I AM" stands behind that claim. Jesus as human cannot be separated from Jesus as God, and that is good news for us as we move toward the passion and cross of Jesus, for the great "I AM"—life itself—will bring resurrection and life for all humanity and all creation.

Consider a quotation that has been floating around throughout social media:

"I AM. Two of the most powerful words; for what you put after them shapes your reality."

This Lenten series helps us imagine that what Jesus puts after "I AM" in the Gospel of John shapes our reality, and who we are.



## From the Minutes submitted by Ruth Sprain

- 1. The meeting began with opening devotions by Pastor Sonja Pancoast.
- 2. The 2017 Annual Meeting Minutes were approved as submitted.
- 3. The 2017 Treasurer's Report was approved as submitted. Terri Sloan stated that a family donated an additional \$2,169 to cover the 2017 deficit, so the 2017 budget balanced.
- 4. 2017 Council Report—Joel Brauner highlighted three of Zion's ministries.
- a. Monroe Elementary Partnership—described the events and activities that happened through the partnership. In a video, John and Linda Sterner told of their experience volunteering in a kindergarten classroom and how that experience enriched their lives.
- b. Children's Music Ministry—number of students has increased to 15, joining Zion's worship six times in 2017. In a video, Pam Stevens shared her experiences working with this ministry—from snacks to teaching music concepts.
- c. Reformation concert called Ein Feste Burg was held to celebrate the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Reformation, featuring the combined choirs of King of Glory, Trinity, and Zion accompanied by an orchestra. In a video, Eileen Huddle shared her experiences with music and why Ein Feste Burg was so meaningful to her.

- c. Global Outreach—Zion will be sending a small team to explore an ongoing partnership with a Nicaraguan church, in an area where other Northern Colorado Lutheran churches are working. The Zion team will investigate a recurring trip.
- d. Midweek Lenten Study—The midweek Lenten gatherings will be built around the Pastors' experiences during their recent trip to Israel, titled "Places Along the Way—The Footsteps of Jesus." The pastors will tell their first-hand stories, share many photos, and in a spiritual journey bring life to the stories of the Bible.

## Global Missions—Zion Mission Committee

## Will and Kathy Reents

This year the Zion Mission Committee collaborated with a local N.G.O., Think Humanity, which was founded 10 years ago by Beth and Jim Heckle.

At church, on December 10 and 17, we sold items made by women from Uganda who had been displaced by war. On the sales table, Think Humanity posted signs reading, "For every \$5.00 spent on purchasing Christmas ornaments, one mosquito net will be given to people living in Uganda." In total, \$900.00 worth of Christmas ornaments were sold. Thus, Zion made it possible for 180 nets to be purchased. We have been told that four children are able to sleep under one net. Thus, Zion provided protection from malaria for 720 children. The average net lasts for five years.

In addition, Zion's Ruth Circle donated \$67.00 and the items sold, not including ornaments, amounted to \$1,804.50. Those items included earrings, bracelets, necklaces, hand-woven baskets, colorful cloth bags, trivets, aprons, and greeting cards. Many of the women who created the craft items were previously chopping rocks in the hot sun to be used for road base at a salary of \$1.00/day.

In total, Zion raised \$2,771.50 and contributed 180 mosquito nets.

One-hundred percent of the sales goes toward Think Humanity programs. Think Humanity targeted their assistance to refugees as they are often located in higher risk areas where there is inadequate health services, malnutrition, lack of clean water, and sanitation issues.

Think Humanity organizes one trip per year to Uganda. Beth and Jim lead the trip and other Board members and interested parties join them. It is vital that a close relationship is developed between the N.G.O. and the people receiving the assistance. Dr. Reents is a Board Member of Think Humanity and has gone to Uganda and hopes to return again this year.

Think Humanity grew from a small organization supplying mosquito nets to one that today provides healthcare, water wells, education, living quarters (girls' hostel), and socio-economic development projects.

At Think Humanity, instead of having an expatriate staff who may not fully understand the local people and ways of operating, they engage six local Ugandan leaders. Think Humanity helps to empower them to make the changes necessary in their communities.

The Zion Mission Committee would like to thank Zion members who so generously contributed to the success of this fundraiser. Think Humanity takes this opportunity to thank Zion members as well.

## JOYCE ROBINSON—SECRETARY





aristocratic private eye who specializes in reuniting families, trying to make amends for a loss in her own past. Working out of her jewel box of an apartment at the base of the Brooklyn Bridge, Celine has made a career of tracking down missing persons, and she has a better

record at it than the FBI. But when a young woman, Gabriela, asks for her help, a world of mystery and sorrow opens up. Gabriela's father was a photographer who went missing on the border of Montana and Wyoming. He was assumed to have died from a grizzly mauling, but his body was




never found. Now, as Celine and her partner head to Yellowstone National Park, investigating a trail gone cold, it becomes clear that they are being followed—that this is a case someone desperately wants to keep closed. Inspired by the life of Heller's own remarkable mother, a chic and iconoclastic private eye, Celine is a deeply personal novel, a wildly engrossing story of family, privilege, and childhood loss. MAY—**Born a Crime** by Trevor Noah. 304 pages. 2016. Memoir.

Trevor Noah's unlikely path from apartheid South Africa to the desk of The Daily Show began with a criminal act: his birth. Trevor was born to a white Swiss father and a black Xhosa mother at a time when such a union was punishable by five years in prison. Living proof of his parents' indiscretion, Trevor was kept mostly indoors for the earliest years of his life, bound by the extreme and often absurd measures his mother took to hide him from a government that could, at any moment, steal him away. Finally liberated by the end of South Africa's tyrannical white rule, Trevor and his mother set forth on a grand adventure, living openly and freely and embracing the opportunities won by a centuries-long struggle.

Born a Crime is the story of a mischievous young boy who grows into a restless young man as he struggles to find himself in a world where he was never supposed to exist. It is also the story of that young man's relationship with his fearless, rebellious, and fervently religious mother—his teammate, a woman determined to save her son



from the cycle of poverty, violence, and abuse that would ultimately threaten her own life. His stories weave together to form a moving and searingly funny portrait of a boy making his way through a damaged world in a dangerous time, armed only with a keen sense of humor and a

mother's unconventional, unconditional love.


#### Hello There!

I hope I see you soon in Zion's library!


## The Final Words by Adam Hamilton A 7-week study led by Janie Lichtfuss February 4 through March 18

Hamilton examines Christ's dying hours and his final words as seen and heard through the eyes and ears of those who stood near the cross.


