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Living the In Between

We spend much of our lives in between. In between jobs, in between stages of life. There are good in-between times: waiting for a birth, or for a wedding day. There are also more difficult in-between times: waiting for a diagnosis, or for a job offer that does not seem to come. Even in those circumstances when the in-between times create excitement and good anticipation, the waiting can be difficult.

Christian faith invites us into a practice of waiting where the "already" of Jesus' presence among us informs the "not yet" of living in between. We live between Jesus' incarnation and his return in glory. In between, we clearly see that the world is broken, yet we also see what others may not see: that God's kingdom is breaking through. Not yet-now.

All of this in-between time in our lives is what makes the season of Advent such an important time in the life of a Christian. Advent is itself an in-between season. Not only is Advent between Thanksgiving and Christmas, it also is all about what has already happened and what has yet to happen. So Advent invites us into a

practice of hopeful anticipation and expectancy. It invites us into watchfulness, to carefully observe the needs of the world, where Jesus' love may not be known in full, so that we can then fulfill the promise of Christ's presence and wholeness. Advent reminds us that our waiting is more than passive, as if we just sit still long enough Christmas will be here and all will be well. Jesus' birth into the world and into our hearts inspires us into active waiting, which means being a part of bringing God's kingdom and God's will to others.

This issue of the "Eye on Zion" is an invitation for you to live in between. We live fully in the here and now, with all the joys and sorrows, victories and setbacks of this life. We love and laugh, we get tired and make mistakes, we hurt, we rejoice, we grieve, all while on this journey of life given to us by God. The journey is not alone; it is with the body of Christ. As you read this newsletter, give thanks for the community of faith that God has surrounded you with, and imagine how God might be calling you to bring the "now" of Jesus into the "not yet" of the world.

The Beatitudes—Blessings for All Who Struggle

In-between times are not always the most comfortable places to be in life. We know there is something better to come, yet we are not quite there. We struggle, we mourn our losses, we long for something more, we witness violence and pain. What does God have to say to all this? In November, our worship will focus on four of the "Beatitudes" found in the gospel according to Matthew. Many have struggled with the translation of the word "blessed" or "happy" in the Beatitudes. How is someone who is poor in spirit happy or blessed when they are struggling? One thing we will notice in the Beatitudes is that when Jesus names particular burdens that people face, he offers words of hope and assurance. It's as if Jesus says, "I see you. You are not alone. Remember this hope, that the kingdom of heaven and all of God's abundance belongs to you!"

November 4

"Blessed are the poor in spirit" (Matthew 5:3) Luke 18:9-14; Philippians 3:7-14

November 11

"Blessed are those who mourn" (Matthew 5:4) Lamentations 3:19-25; 2 Corinthians 1:3-4; Revelation 21:1-5

November 18

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness" (Matthew 5:6) Isaiah 58:6-9a; Romans 3:21-26

November 25

"Blessed are the peacemakers" (Matthew 5:9) Ephesians 4:1-6; Romans 14:13-19

As a visual focus for these Beatitudes, Zion has been blessed with paintings from Pastor Martie McMane, an artist and pastor. Martie McMane is a retired United Church of Christ pastor who in her retirement is using her creativity to share the gospel message of God's grace through her art. Her hope is that the art may help people to slow down a little and look a little more deeply into what being a follower of Jesus means as well as to reflect on the deeper meanings of Scripture for their lives. In Martie's 35 years as an ordained minister, she served as a pastor of three churches—in Ohio, Connecticut, and Colorado. She also served on the national staff of the United Church of Christ as a Minister of Spiritual and Membership Growth for the denomination. She has written two books, numerous articles on worship and evangelism, and has several liturgical responses and hymns published. Martie retired in 2016 after serving as the Lead Pastor for First Congregational Church in Boulder for 16 years. She is now a member of Atonement Lutheran Church in Boulder. (She says it's like "coming home," as she was baptized and confirmed in St. John's Lutheran Church in Summit, New Jersey.)

The four prints on the Beatitudes are giclées made from four mixed media canvasses Martie created from May through September. The original pieces each contain a drawing done either with graphite or soft pastel over acrylic paint. To create various textures, some of the canvasses contain handmade papers, stenciling, collaged pieces of Scripture from an old Bible, glass bead medium and modeling paste.

Martie's intent with these works was to try to evoke a response for the people Jesus was blessing in his sermon on the mount. When Jesus offered these blessings (found in both the gospels of Matthew and Luke) it was a big surprise to people. These were not the people who were normally thought of as "blessed." Her hope is, as you look at the images, you may be moved to wonder and to ask some questions. Questions like:

Poor in Spirit—Who are the poor in Spirit? Who is that person with her back to us? Where has she come from? Where is she going? What emotion do you feel when you look at the image? Why would Jesus have called the poor in Spirit blessed?



Those who Mourn—Who is that couple who look

so sad? Why are they huddled together? What is their loss? Are they both mourning, or only one? Perhaps both, but perhaps only one. Could the other be coming along side to comfort? Who do you know who is mourning? How can they be blessed?



Those who Hunger and Thirst for Righteousness—When we think of "Those who hunger and thirst for righteousness," we most often think first of people like Gandhi, Martin

Luther King, Jr., and Nelson Mandela. Who do you think the child is? What is going on for the child? How could the child be hungering and thirsting for righteousness? What does all the lumber evoke for you? What about the



background? What is your response to the child? Are you also among those who hunger and thirst for righteousness? How?

The Peacemakers—

Generally, when we think of the "peacemakers" our minds go to the great movers and shakers for world peace: Bishop Tutu, the Dali Llama, Mother Teresa. How do you think this little one in the painting could be a peacemaker? What



kind of person or image would you have chosen to depict a peacemaker? What do the words (which are intentionally obscured) on the wall behind the child evoke? What about that circle on the left-hand side of the painting, and the intimation of the other two circles?

Finally, you might ask, "What are these images and the "Beatitudes" of Jesus inviting me to?" In worship during November, come join the conversation to reflect on what blessing Jesus is inviting you to, especially in such in-between times as you may be living in today.

We wait for the celebration of the birth of Christ at Christmas, yet we live knowing that He has in fact already come and lives among us now to change our hearts so that we may change the world.

I hope that during the upcoming seasons of Advent and Christmas that you are able to find the right balance between the hustle and bustle during the holidays and finding enough time to catch your breath and reflect on the spirit of the seasons. Advent and Christmas are wonderful seasons in our church year, filled with promises of joy, hope for all mankind, and a belief in tomorrow that has manifested through the birth of Christ so many years ago in a countryside barn, the most unlikely of places for the Savior of the world to come from. write a script for, and promote!), an annual out-ofstate Christmas recital, more Nutcracker performances per year than I can count on one hand, piano student recitals/performances, and I know that our other music staff are equally saturated in their winter schedules.

I often feel during the holidays that I am living "in between," saturated in spreading the joy of Christ through music, but often everything feels transitory and fleeting because I do not have the opportunity to sit and listen to great music-making or to reflect on the spirit of the season. This is something I have dedicated myself to make time for in December 2018, and I would challenge you during our upcoming Advent season to find successful strategies for finding beauty and meaning beyond living "in between." Perhaps that is through performing music (consider offering your voice to our choir, or donating your time as a volunteer to our children's choir this holiday season!), listening to music, seeking the joy of giving through presents to friends and family, seeking the joy of giving through charitable contributions, finding the love of fellowship by being active in the Zion community or any other organization, focusing on the hope of Christ through the celebration of His birth, or focusing on the hope for humanity given to us by the grace of God. However you choose to spend the holiday, I hope that you will find the manifestation of God's love through our seasonal themes of love, joy, hope, and peace, followed by new beginnings symbolized by New Year's Day.

Please join us in prayer for Sky Ranch staff as they prepare for another summer of intentional ministry with young people from across Colorado and the country!



- 2. Download the "SoundCloud" app from your app store, then search "Zionloveland." Once you've found Zion's station, you can "Follow" it, and SoundCloud will notify you whenever a new sermon is added.

"Flip Sunday" Change

At the August meeting of Zion's congregational council, it was decided that Zion will discontinue the practice of "Flip Sundays" for the year. This decision was not made lightly, and came after much discussion—with council, staff, and after receiving feedback throughout August from over fifty regular worshipers. The council reviewed each person's comments.

"Flip Sunday" was the practice of flipping the styles of worship, so that on every third Sunday of the month, contemporary worship led by the band was at 8:15 a.m. and traditional worship led with organ, choir, and bells was at 10:45 a.m. On other Sundays of the month, the regular schedule was to hold traditional worship at 8:15 a.m. and contemporary worship at 10:45 a.m.

The council's decision was based on four main reasons:

- Staff and Volunteer Musicians—"Flip Sundays" take extra work to prepare and places a greater burden on everyone who plans worship, from office to projection to musicians. Our volunteer musicians found it difficult to transition, and some chose not to participate, which made the overall quality of music in worship lower on those third Sundays.
- Visitors—As we try to be more welcoming and hospitable, we have often heard from visitors that they are confused by "Flip Sunday." Though we publicize and tell visitors, they find it difficult to remember

- that it happens each third Sunday, leaving them confused or anxious.
- 3. Congregational Feedback—The response from Zion members was more than two-to-one in favor of discontinuing "Flip Sunday." Though the council did not consider only the numbers (because undoubtedly there are many with an opinion who did not share it), the amount of feedback and what people said was certainly important in their consideration.
- 4. Theology of Worship—Finally, it is important to note that while preference for worship is important, it is not the only thing. God is at work in our worship regardless of our personal preferences, and the council felt that moving to a consistent schedule allows everyone (staff, musicians, and worship participants) to give our best to God so that God can be at work in our hearts.

Starting September 9, Zion's worship moved to a consistent weekly schedule of traditional worship at 8:15 a.m. and contemporary worship at 10:45 a.m. Some will be disappointed with this change. If you have any concerns or would like more information, please talk to any member of council. We would appreciate any feedback. Council would also like to thank everyone who gave feedback earlier. The feedback is helpful for us to see the character of our church and help us discern God's mission for Zion.

Sky Ranch Summer Staff and Seasonal Retreat Cabin

On July 30, construction began on the new summer staff and seasonal retreat cabin at Sky Ranch! The cabin will have four bedrooms with bathrooms capable of housing 32 summer staff. It will also include a large meeting room and two exterior bathrooms to service the other cabins on the western edge of camp. Though completion was set back from the goal to have construction of the new building completed by late this fall, the work has continued despite the snow in early October.

Sky Ranch received a generous gift from an anonymous donor that made this project possible as a way to support and enhance Sky Ranch's growing camper and retreat ministries. To complete this cabin, new water lines, septic and leach fields, and electrical upgrades were necessary. As a way of honoring Zion's long and fruitful relationship with Sky Ranch, Zion's endowment committee committed \$5,000 for these infrastructure needs.

With summer camp numbers increasing steadily, relocating staff beyond the center of camp will provide two additional cabins in the center for camper use, and another cabin for adult sponsor use. Additionally, during non-summer months, retreat groups will be able to use this new heated cabin.

The preschool is unique as it is educationally focused and gives all children the opportunity for participation through sliding scale tuition and scholarships.

Every three years, Thompson Valley Preschool participates in a quality rating to ensure it is providing and maintaining a high-quality program for the children and families in the community. The preschool is proud to announce it has achieved a Level 5 rating from Colorado Shines, the State of Colorado's Quality Rating Improvement System for early care and education programs for children 5 years of age and younger. Level 5 is the highest level of recognition and indicates the hard work and dedication required to be a quality program. They attribute their success due to the support of their board of directors, staff, the Early Childhood Council of Larimer County, and their families.

Serving God's People In Between

Living in between calls us to shine Christ's light into the world, so that the "now" of Christ's promise becomes a reality in spite of the "not yet" of his return in glory. As a congregation, we are intimately involved in almost every agency in Loveland that serves those in need, including but not limited to House of Neighborly Service, Habitat for Humanity, Community Kitchen, Salvation Army, and KidsPak.

Every year, Zion's congregational council directs King Soopers dollars toward two causes. One is ELCA World Hunger, which has been one of the causes supported by Zion's King Soopers funds for seven years, since we have been receiving funds from King Soopers gift cards obtained at Zion. The other half of these funds for the next year will go toward KidsPak. KidsPak is a weekend hunger relief program for children in the Thompson School District and Berthoud. The program partners with each school in the District to provide much needed packs of food that meets the nutritional requirements for children. The program partners with the Food Bank for Larimer County to create a specific menu each week to meet these needs. They currently serve 39 schools (early childhood, elementary, middle, and high schools), and are serving approximately 620 packs of food each week, projected to serve nearly 20,000 packs for 2018. If you are interested in helping pack food bags, you can join them on Wednesdays for 30 minutes at 9:00 a.m. at the back of the Food Share building at 2600 North Lincoln.

Zion is also involved heavily with House of Neighborly Service (HNS), contributing financially every year, as well as providing food and clothing through special appeals. PASTOR JOEL serves on the HNS board of directors, and Zion's IHN Coordinators are RICH MARQUARDT, FRAN RIVERS, AND RUTH SPRAIN. Thanks to the hospitality of the Zion community, we host homeless families in our building on a regular rotation through Angel House / Interfaith Hospitality Network (IHN), one of the programs of HNS. As of August, Angel House had served 26 families and 46 individuals.

Finally, the Zion community serves at the Community Kitchen every second Tuesday of the month, starting at 10:30 a.m. and serving through lunch. Community Kitchen serves over 50,000 meals annually to anyone who is hungry, without any qualification. If you are interested in serving with the Zion community or have questions, contact Fran Shelley.




Communion for the Homebound



ELCA, EPISCOPAL, AND CATHOLIC CHURCH LEADERS ISSUE STATEMENT ON EAST JERUSALEM HOSPITALS

CHICAGO (Nov. 1, 2018)—The Presiding Bishop and Conference of Bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America along with the Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church on behalf of its House of Bishops, and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committees on International Justice and Peace and Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs have issued a statement addressing concerns about the Trump Administration's apparent decision to end further humanitarian assistance to hospitals in East Jerusalem. The statement follows:

The Presiding Bishop and Conference of Bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church on behalf of its House of Bishops, and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committees on International Justice and Peace and Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs together wish to raise their grave concern that the Trump Administration has apparently decided to halt further U.S. humanitarian assistance to hospitals in East Jerusalem as part of a wider curtailment of U.S. funding that has been assisting the Palestinian people for many years.

The four medical institutions associated with us include: Augusta Victoria Hospital (Lutheran) St. John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital and Princess Basma Rehabilitation Centre (both Anglican/Episcopal), as well as St. Joseph's Hospital (Catholic), together with Makassed Islamic Charitable Hospital, and Red Crescent Maternity Hospital, are providing invaluable medical care for the most vulnerable populations, including Palestinians living in East Jerusalem, Gaza, and the West Bank. We consider them integral parts of our common commitment to ministry in the Holy Land.

These hospitals provide life-saving and, in some cases, unique forms of health care not available otherwise to Palestinians. For example, Augusta Victoria provides kidney dialysis for children and state-of-the-art cancer care. St. John of Jerusalem is the only charitable provider of expert eye care in the West Bank, Gaza, and East Jerusalem. The Jerusalem Princess Basma Centre provides services for children with a wide range of disabilities and has become one of the pioneering rehabilitation centers in autism treatment in the West Bank, East Jerusalem, and Gaza. St. Joseph's is a 73-bed general hospital serving the Palestinian neighborhoods of East Jerusalem. All of these institutions provide extensive outreach services throughout the West Bank.

Each has benefited from U.S. assistance for decades and, therefore, this decision to discontinue that funding leaves the patients, the wider Palestinian community, and us disappointed and perplexed. It is difficult for us to understand why this humanitarian assistance is being brought to a halt, given that lives are being threatened unnecessarily.

Calling the decision "a blow to the health of the city", more than a dozen Israeli doctors recently said, "a sudden and significant cut of support for medical services will cause imminent and serious harm to the health and wellbeing of those residents of the city who are well-served by these hospitals and medical centers."

In addition to being a morally correct thing to do, U.S. funding is key to paying pharmaceutical suppliers of medications, paying staff, and avoiding any interruption in the treatment of patients. We call on the President to restore this vital funding so that these patients will continue to receive the treatment and care they need.

You can help support campus ministry by bringing a meal to one of our weekly gatherings. If you are interested in donating a meal or grocery cards to purchase food please contact us!


