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Wilderness

As we enter into the 40 days of Lent, we are reminded of the 40 days Jesus was tempted in the wilderness and are reminded of the 40 years that the Israelites wandered in the wilderness. The time in the wilderness is a not an easy time, but it is a time of learning who we are and whose we are.

When Jesus was in the wilderness, he found temptation and struggle, but he also found fasting, resting, and wandering that shaped him for his ministry. This time in the wilderness was transformative for Jesus because he connected to God the Father. He was shaped for his ministry as he discovered more deeply who he was as the son of God. He also learned more deeply whose he was—a beloved child of God.

As the Israelites wandered 40 years in the wilderness, they found the wilderness to be a place of challenge. They often wanted to return back to Egypt and the life they knew before, even if it was a

life of slavery. In the wilderness, these challenges helped the Israelites learn who they were and whose they were. They learned how to be the people of God as God gave them the Ten Commandments. They learned to trust God each day as God provided just enough manna for that day. If they hoarded more manna, it rotted. In the wilderness, they learned again who they were as the chosen people of God, whom God freed from slavery and led to the Promised Land; they learned whose they were. These lessons guided them as they entered into the Promised Land. If they had not had the wilderness time, they would not have been shaped into people of God.

We may find ourselves in the wilderness for a variety of reasons. Many times we find ourselves in the wilderness of unemployment, divorce, empty nest, retirement, illness, grief, depression, anxiety, or addiction. Our wilderness times are times when the future is unknown

or uncertain. We may feel disconnected from our past, and we don't know what the future will hold. We rarely enter the wilderness willingly, but through our wanderings in the wilderness we learn again who we are and whose we are. We are reminded again that God is leading us. We are reminded again that God is providing for us. We are reminded again that there is no wilderness space that is too harsh or threatening for God's love.

In this time of transition at Zion, it may feel a bit like we are in the wilderness as a congregation. There is a disruption in the way of life as we knew it before. The future feels unknown as we readjust our budget to accommodate the new building priority. We come to worship and things are out of place; everything is a mess because of the expansion and remodel. We have to find new ways to do what we always have done before such as midweek Lent without soup supper and funerals without receptions. We are challenged to live into normal congregational life when things feel disrupted all around us. We know that God is leading us while we are in the wilderness, but we don't know exactly what the future holds. For those of us, like myself who are planners, these times can feel a bit uncertain and a bit scary. Yet, it is exactly these times that help us to grow in our identity as the people of God and to follow where God is leading and trust in God providing.

In our visit to the Holy Land, one of the most impactful experiences was looking over that vast wilderness. The desert goes on as far as the eye can see, and yet, God is there in the midst. I have a picture of the wilderness taken by a good friend from our first trip to the Holy Land that hangs in our bedroom to daily remind me that God leads us each day and provides for us for what we need for that day. The photo reminds me to trust in God's leading and to have faith in God's provision for the future. The wilderness is

shaping me. The wilderness is shaping you, and it is shaping our congregation.

As we enter into this Lenten season, we invite each of you to enter into the wilderness of these 40 days and be transformed through your wilderness wanderings.

As a community, we will embrace the gifts that come to us in the wilderness as we focus on who we are and whose we are.

In the midst of the many transitions all around us during our Lenten midweek, we return to the familiar *Holden Evening Prayer*, a beautiful liturgy that keeps us grounded in God. Each week, we will *Enter the Passion of Jesus: Picturing Ourselves in the Story*. We will take time throughout Lent to hear again the central story of our Christian faith, Jesus' Passion which tells of who God is and embodies God's love for us. Each week, we will freeze-frame a moment in that story and picture ourselves in that story as we ground ourselves in God's central story of who God is and whose we are. In the midst of the wilderness, we cling to God's story to lead us and guide us.

ust when we think we know exactly what God is doing, just when we try to make ourselves secure in what we know, God sends us on a wilderness journey to receive His love through surrendering to what we don't know.

When God began calling me in the summer of 2019 to relocate from Texas to Colorado, I had no idea that I would be accepting a call to direct the music ministry of Zion Lutheran Church in Loveland.

After stepping away from years of working as a music minister in the Lutheran church, I was just becoming comfortable with the ebb and flow of being self-employed in Austin, Texas. I had finally gotten used to the extreme Texas heat. But God was tugging on my heart. Sign after sign after sign was pointing me to the Fort Collins area of Colorado. I surrendered enough to make the move. But upon arriving in Colorado in early November, I had only gone ankle deep into the refreshing cool of the Rocky Mountain streams.

Over the next month, God began quickly revealing his bigger plan for me here and many things in my personal life outside of church unexpectedly shifted, requiring me to dive head first into the unknown. My mind tried to convince me these changes were somehow bad and that they were my fault and that I should retreat back to controlling everything in my life where it felt safe. After daily coming up against the monsters of this self-induced anxiety, I began surrendering more and more through the healing work of music ministry.

With the ever-present help of the Holy Spirit, I was gently guided to begin breathing deeper,

surrendering to the heart where His infinite love resides. In this surrender, I have found myself being daily refreshed in the deep of His grace with greater opportunities for music leadership in the church than I initially could imagine when I was still clinging to what felt safe in my own mind. The more one immerses themselves into the ministry of facilitating music leadership for the church, the more one recognizes the need to receive the healing this leadership brings to them—that this surrender to receive the healing of congregational + choir voices united in song is actually the healing work of bringing Heaven to Earth.

I have been so blessed to begin this ministry position with a firm foundation already put in place by your previous music minister, ADAM TORRES and the rock-solid assistance and interim music ministry leadership of NOELLE BAUMAN. The remainder of Zion's staff, PASTORS JOEL and Sonja Pancoast, Lindsey Walter, Maddy SCHWARTZ, and STIG ORESJO have been paramount in creating a space of ease for my transition into music ministry for your church community. Equally as important has been the open-hearted willingness of Zion's music ministry volunteers to co-lead week in, week out with chancel choir and praise band. I am grateful to have the opportunity to witness each of your unique God-given gifts and help facilitate the growth of Zion's music ministry as the Holy Spirit leads me.

I look forward to the remainder of the season after Epiphany leading into the focus on the wilderness during Zion's Lenten season. I look forward to continuing to identify each volunteer's unique God-given gifts that help lead

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the community into deeper communion with our Almighty loving God. I believe deeply and firmly that each soul carries a unique signature of God's love and that I am called to encourage the expression and therefore *leadership* of each soul who volunteers their time in Zion's music ministry.

This path of surrender that each of us is individually called to is never the path most taken. We can't draw up the GPS for easy directions by simply mimicking someone else's path or relying on anyone else's advice. Walking this path requires daily surrender to God and His greater plan. Though we daily try to convince ourselves "I'm not worth His time," "my gifts aren't as special as so-and-so's," "oh look I've messed up again," this resistance to our own divinity cannot match the power of Jesus resurrected and his Holy Spirit indwelling within us carrying the power of God's all-creating love. Even in our resistance, he gently guides us with His infinite love to see where surrender to this love opens us up to greater joy, peace, and strength than we could have ever found in our attempts to keep life "comfortable" and "the same." It is in this surrender that we find God positioning us perfectly to each lead in our own uniquely empowered way that reveals God's kingdom on earth.



Thank you, Zion Lutheran Church, for calling me to minister to you during such a time as this. Our world may seem to be growing darker daily. If we want to find something to be afraid of, we'll find it. But isn't it beautiful and overwhelmingly glorious that God can remind us through worship each week that His love is stronger than this fear! God is fighting for us, pushing back the darkness, lighting up the kingdom that cannot be shaken. And He is lighting up the kingdom through you, through me, in our weakness and in our strength all the same. Let us remember as we go forward through this wilderness of the unknown that God is leading us to receive His Kingdom Come on earth. Every time we make the decision to honor God through raising our voices and making music together, we bring that Kingdom of infinite Love and Grace ever closer. What a gift we are called to receive. What a gift it is to receive this gift with you all as your music minister. May God, through His Holy Spirit, continue to guide me to facilitate the building of His Kingdom through the encouraging of your unique musical gifts at Zion Lutheran Church. May we all continue learning to embrace the beautiful discomfort of the unknown that guides us back to His loving arms.


We appreciate Jim for his work. We are blessed to count him among the many talented people we have at Zion. Kudos, JIM VOSBERG!

The Department of Chemical and Biological Engineering has named Lisa Weber the first recipient of a newly endowed graduate fellowship named after Emeritus Professor Jim Linden.

His research interests focused on biomass refining to produce ethanol and/or single-cell protein; cultivation of fungi and bacteria for enzyme production; and elicitation of disease responses by plants and plant cell cultures.

Mobile Laundry Truck—Making A Difference



Zion is one of two sites in Loveland where you will find the mobile laundry truck in operation. On the side of the truck, you will see Zion's logo, demonstrating our support for this laundry service.

Zion provided the very first financial contribution to get the mobile laundry truck ministry off the ground, and we are honored to be one of two sites in Loveland where you will find the truck parked during the week. They receive laundry from people who may feel like they're struggling through the wilderness. Some are working multiple jobs to make ends meet, others are spending their days trying to find jobs, and most of them are trying to raise

children in difficult environments. Clean clothes provide dignity in life, yet many people either don't have the time or resources to wash their own clothes. If you are struggling to hold it all together and can't find the time to do laundry, bring it to the mobile laundry truck on Thursday mornings.

Here are three stories from people who have been served by the mobile laundry truck:

At the Loveland Public Library, we washed clothes for "Dave" and "Brenda." Dave's sleeping bag was pretty beat up, so we asked if he needed a new one. He said his was okay, but that Brenda (who appears to be going through chemo) could use a sleeping bag. You see, she was sleeping in Dave's car covered by all the blankets he owns. We were grateful to be able to give Brenda a new sleeping bag!

At Zion Lutheran Church, we've seen "Heidi" every week. She brings at least 10 loads of laundry for her large family every week. Last week, she brought us a beautiful handwritten note, thanking us for our ministry.

Finally, we met "Donald" this week. He told us he used to be homeless and addicted to drugs and alcohol. Now, "thanks to the wonderful people of Loveland," he's clean and sober and operating a catering business. He brings meals to his neighbors who can't cook for themselves and brought us laundry from his neighbors who can't do their own.

Interested in supporting the mobile laundry? Our two biggest needs are:

- 1. A warm garage to store the truck on cold winter nights.
- 2. Fuel cards (gas and propane). Our preferred provider is Poudre Valley Co-op.

Moving the enormous Fat Albert evergreen tree on November 7, 2019, was fun to watch. All agree the new


