Cultivating Gratitude

Each year instead of making a New Year's Resolution (which I will inevitably break before I even get to the end of January), I have begun the spiritual practice of choosing a word to guide me through the year. At the beginning of Advent (the beginning of the church year), I ask God to lead me to the word that I need for that coming year. I have had various words such as peace, patience, or positive in the past (I was on a kick of P words for a while). This year I was not led to a P word but instead to the word "grateful." I think God must have had a sense of humor because in the midst of all the craziness of this year, being grateful has grounded me and is exactly the word that I need for this time.

Being grateful is a way of approaching the world and being present in the moment. I look around at what I am grateful for this day or even for just this moment and it changes my perspective. Suddenly I see things differently. I am focused on what I have and not on what I don't have. I focus on the

gifts God has blessed me with instead of what I am lacking.

As we approach this fall, we will spend time in worship on various spiritual practices that help us grow as individuals and as a community. We continue through August to hear about Unraveled: Seeking God When Our Plans Fall Apart. As we move into the fall we have two new worship series planned. In September, our worship focuses on difficult communal spiritual practices of Loving When It's Difficult; in October, we focus on spiritual growth through Cultivating Gratitude

I think the best time to focus on gratitude may not be when we are surrounded by abundance, but in the more difficult times in our life when it is easy to forget all that God has given us. Living in a pandemic is obviously one of the more difficult times many of us have had to live through. We struggle with the reality of caring for our health and even our life and

Summer Worship Schedule (August 9—September 6)

Outdoor—8:15 a.m.

Zoom-9:30 a.m.

Starting Sunday, August 9, and continuing through Labor Day weekend, we offer an outdoor, in-person worship option in addition to our regular Zoom worship at 9:30 a.m. In order to be sure that we do not exceed the number in worship as permitted by the Larimer County Health Department variance for Houses of Worship, everyone who wants to attend the 8:15 a.m. outdoor worship will need to sign up either via the Sign Up Genius that will be sent by email or by calling the church office.

We are grateful that we are able to gather together again. We do, however, need to follow the guidelines to keep everyone safe as established by the Regathering at Zion team. These guidelines include:

- Outdoor worship only—participant access to the building for restrooms only
- Masks worn at all times
- 40 worship attendees (not including staff and worship leaders)
- Condensed worship time—45 minutes or less
- Instrumental music only—no congregational singing
- No Holy Communion
- Physical distance of 6 feet between chairs or a minimum of 28 sq. ft. per person
- No coffee-hour following worship.

The service may fill before Friday at noon and is on a "first-come, first-serve" basis. You are welcome to sign up for as many Sundays as you wish; however, despite the "first-come, first-serve" basis, if you have signed up for multiple weeks, we may contact you to remove you for one or more of the weeks if the spaces are filled and someone who has been unable to sign up for any Sundays wants to attend.

Only those on the list who made a reservation for outdoor worship will be able to attend. **People who show up for service without a reservation will be asked to return home and attend worship via Zoom at 9:30 a.m.** This outdoor worship service will be held as long as Larimer County continues the current variance for Houses of Worship to worship with up to 50 participants. Worship will have to cease if the variance is revoked by the county or if all of the above guidelines are not kept.

Grateful for Generous Hearts that Care for Others

In late spring, we reached out to the congregation to let you know about the possibility of giving to the Member Assistance Fund to help our members who are in need.

These funds are available to members who are experiencing hardships due to unforeseen circumstances related to the pandemic. This may include individuals who have lost their source of income or have had to defer bills due to impacts related to COVID-19.

To date, we have received about \$12,100 from the congregation. We have helped three families who are in need, but we are aware that many have been receiving unemployment benefits, which will be ending soon, or deferring bills. We are here to help each other as the body of Christ and support each other in this time, and we know that things may get worse before they get better.

If you are in need of assistance, please contact the church office or one of the pastors.

Regathering at Zion

We give thanks for the hard work of the Regathering at Zion team who has met many times each month to help determine the best ways and times for our congregation to safely regather at Zion. In all of its decision-making processes, the team has determined that their ultimate priority is the health and safety of our members and those who gather at Zion. Their purpose is to determine the protocols and timing for how we best regather at Zion. The resources that they use to guide their decisions include the CDC, State and County Health Departments, Church Mutual Insurance, and the ELCA Churchwide and Rocky Mountain Synod Office of the Bishop.

The building project is in its final stages of being approved for occupancy. To that end, the team has determined the following protocols:

- temperature checks for all staff
- physical distance of 6 feet or more between people
- one-way directional entrances
- · masks required
- heightened cleaning, disinfecting, and sanitizing procedures.

Our first regathering at Zion happened in mid-July with the tours of the building, which included 10 people or fewer going through the building to see all the wonderful work that has been done and blessing it for God's service in our community.

Starting August 9, we began to have outdoor worship with 50 or fewer participants (including staff) until Labor Day.

The office staff are beginning to work with small groups and committees who would like to meet in person at Zion. According to the Larimer County variance for Houses of Worship, these gatherings must be of 10 or fewer people. For groups larger than 10 people, an approval process through the county is required. Small groups, support groups, and committees of 10 or fewer can schedule a time to use the building by contacting the church office. Please note that the entire building was re-keyed during the construction so old keys will not work.

The Regathering at Zion team encourages the use of Zoom to allow those who would like to stay at home to be able to do so and still participate in worship and small groups. We can set up small group meetings through Zoom only or meetings that integrate in-person and Zoom participation together. Contact the church office for more information about setting up small group opportunities.

The Memorial Garden at Zion Lutheran Church stands as a witness of the resurrection and as a reminder of our connection to those saints who have gone before us in life and in death and have passed on their faith to those living now. Within the Memorial Garden stands a Columbarium for the interment of those who wish for their remains after death to be placed in this setting. Directly adjacent to both the sanctuary wall and the outdoor worship space, this space provides a peaceful place of remembrance and reflection as well as a visible sign of those saints who gather with us around the throne of grace whenever the body of Christ gathers for worship of the Living God.

Since Zion's building and grounds are understood as a gift from God, every effort will be made to

share that gift with all. Therefore, interment is not limited to members of Zion. As it is God's desire to care for the poor, it is also our desire to provide a proper burial place for those who may not have a faith community to pay for a proper burial.

We will announce the process and the cost for pre-purchasing a niche in the Columbarium as soon as possible, but every effort will be made to keep it affordable, while also ensuring the perpetual care of the garden and funds for a second Columbarium to be built when the niches on the first are filled.

Now that this space is completed, you are invited to come any time to sit on the benches in the garden and reflect on your gratitude to God for all those saints who have gone before us in faith.





What we know for now is that no volunteers are allowed in classrooms, but also that plans seem to change on a weekly basis. We are in a wait-and-see mode, but Zion will heed the call when Monroe is in position to reach out.

Zion is proud to support KidsPak



regularly. We have sent thousands of dollars every year to support the work they do to provide food to kids in the Thompson School District. Currently, we send half of the money we receive from King Soopers Community Rewards to KidsPak (the other half goes to ELCA World Hunger). This alone could amount to almost \$2,000 that is sent to KidsPak, so if you haven't directed your King Soopers Community Rewards, please consider directing them to Zion so that we can share with those who hunger. We have also sent Great Gift Away funds to KidsPak, which represent monetary gifts given as gratitude for each year of a birthday, anniversary, or other life event.

Without school in session, the work KidsPak does has been more difficult, but they have found ways to continue to provide. As of August 1, Tom Carrigan, the KidsPak director, reported the following numbers:

- September 2019 to May 2020—89,665 meals in 17,933 bags
- June 2020—14,375 meals in 2,875 bags
- July 2020 through 7/24—7,010 meals in 1,402 bags.

KidsPak will distribute food ALL Fridays in August, and will start to pack bags to send to schools in September.

We are very appreciative to Loveland High, Berthoud High, Mountain View, and Thompson Valley High students who have packed over 7,000 bags since April.

We are grateful for the work of KidsPak, and for the generosity of the Zion congregation!

Zion Mission Committee Helps Feed Ugandan Refugees

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, many refugees in Uganda are food deprived for several reasons. First, many are small shop owners or street vendors making just enough to survive before COVID-19, but now have been shut down by orders from the Ugandan government. Secondly, many have had their small plots of land, where they grow food, taken from them by landlords or the government. Thirdly, the UN World Food Program is overwhelmed with so many requests that they can hardly meet the demand.

Think Humanity (TH), a local NGO (non-

governmental organization) has for the last few years been selling Christmas ornaments at Zion in support of these refugees. TH has raised over \$20,000 and given 16 tons of food recently to meet their demand, yet the need continues.

To help, Zion's Mission Committee has appropriated \$1,220 to TH which will feed about 30 large families for one month, giving them a total of 30 kg. of rice, corn, and beans.

The TH staff know each of these families. To hear their sad stories of near starvation, go to Facebook and enter ThinkHumanity Inc. or go to their website.

Pastels on 5th

Thanks to the creativity of Jessica Kuhns, Zion has participated in Pastels on 5th for several years. Pastels on 5th is a sidewalk chalk art festival that pairs local artists with sponsoring organizations to raise funds for Alternatives to Violence (ATV). Alternatives to Violence provides shelter, advocacy, education, and resources for people impacted by domestic

violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking. Zion has been proud to sponsor Jessica as our artist and to support the important work of ATV.

The festival has always been a fun day of enjoying the work of the artists, along with live music, food, a marketplace with artisan booths, and a children's area where kids can create their own sidewalk masterpieces. Unfortunately, Pastels on 5th is unable to include all of these fun highlights, but they have received a variance from Larimer County to hold a modified version of the event.

On Saturday, September 12, 5th Street will be closed for artists, as well as The Foundry Plaza and a few other public locations (TBD). There will be no live music or food trucks, but the artwork will be open to public viewing once the artists have completed their artwork in order to prevent crowds and keep the artists safe.

Zion creates a fund and Loveland Rotary Foundation steps up in support.


Every June, Zion usually collects food, nonperishable items, and monetary donations for House of Neighborly Service (HNS). This year, food donations to HNS have been strong, so after some discussion with one of the HNS Family Navigators, it was determined that we would use this year to do something that would make a greater impact for those in need. Case managers at HNS report that car repairs are one of the greatest needs, with very few programs in Loveland able to support them. HNS provides services for food, housing and rent assistance, utility billing assistance, job training, and many other areas of need. However, they have seen that when a household needs car repairs and cannot afford them, many of those other basic services fall flat because people cannot get where they need to go to receive the services, or travel to work and school. In this time of pandemic and physical isolation, public transportation, carpools, and borrowing vehicles pose an added health risk, making it more important than ever to make sure that these families have reliable transportation to get to work and to the services provided throughout the community.

Zion stepped up to the challenge and started a fund for HNS called Christian Auto Repair Service (C.A.R.S.). You contributed \$3,274, and a generous grant from the Rotary Foundation provided another \$3,000 for a total of \$6,274. The case workers and family navigators at HNS are overjoyed at the ability you have provided for them to help people who are in need of car repairs as much as any other service. Thank you for your generosity!

Weaving Our Prayers Together




