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Those Who Dream

When the Lord restored the fortunes of Zion, we were like those who dream.—PSALM 126:1

Eleanor Roosevelt once said, "The future belongs to those who believe in the beauty of their dreams." Unfortunately, there are experiences in life when dreaming seems impossible and hope is difficult to summon. In those moments, it is difficult to imagine any future or anything beyond the present struggles of life. Yet, life without dreams is contrary to life. Langston Hughes, the great African American writer of the early 20th century associated with the literary movement known as the Harlem Renaissance, wrote a beautiful poem about the importance of dreaming, especially in the most difficult of circumstances:

> "Hold fast to dreams, For if dreams die Life is a broken-winged bird That cannot fly. Hold fast to dreams For when dreams go Life is a barren field Frozen with snow."

Psalm 126 was probably written in response to the Israelites returning home after a long exile in Babylon. For seventy years they were in exile in Babylon, forced to leave their homes and land and everything they held dear, everything that gave them comfort and security.

After seventy years of any struggle, it can feel as if there is no hope, no dream of something better. Yet, when they finally were allowed to return home they "were like those who dream." After seventy years they had lost their hope and their capacity to dream of something better, but in this psalm we are given a reminder that hope is outside of our present circumstances.

One beautiful thing about Psalm 126 is that its original language of Hebrew is not clear about whether it was written in the past or future tense. Scholars are divided about

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whether the intent was to focus on God's restoration after they had returned from exile, or to give hope during the exile that God would restore them. But maybe that doesn't matter. What if the point of this psalm is to keep people of faith focused on God instead of hopelessness? What if the point is to teach people of faith how to dream when our dreams have been taken away? Just as people who live in desert climates know that the dry waterbeds will become torrential streams in due season (verse 4), people of faith know that God does not leave us even in the most difficult times, and that kind of promise is what allows us to dream in those times.

Psalm 126 is one of the assigned scriptures for the third Sunday of Advent, and it is a beautiful summary of what the Advent season is about. Generally, Advent is a season of longing and hope that is fulfilled in the birth of Jesus Christ, who is the incarnation of God. More specifically, our theme for Advent and Christmas worship this year draws from Psalm 126 as we focus on "Those who dream."



This Advent, the scriptures will help us imagine what it looks like to live as those who dream, especially during difficult times. The prophets, the psalmists, John the Baptist, Mary, Elizabeth, Joseph, Simeon, Anna, the shepherds and the magi—they were all dreamers. They received, discovered, and responded to God's dreams for the world.

This Advent, we step into the mystery and awe of God's dreams and pray they shape our reality, a reality that feels like one long

season of Advent, a season where it may be difficult to imagine a future of hope. Yet God came into the world in flesh to give us that hope, and a promise that we are never alone. That promise opens our hearts and minds to dream again!

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Music Ministry

ne of the most challenging and significant years in recent memory is coming to an end and as it does, we at Zion reflect on being "like those who dream." The theme of "dreaming" is one that has occupied myriad spaces within our modern lexicon: the American Dream, "dream big," "whatever you dream, you can achieve," etc. The irony is that we now find ourselves at the end of an epoch in which people often benefited greatly from building societal successes on "dreaming" only to find many of these successes quickly challenged or even destroyed by the transitional nature of this year.

We find ourselves wondering and often arguing amongst one another: whose dreams are "right" and whose dreams are "wrong." We find ourselves manipulating the word "dream" to suit our own personal agenda so that we don't have to face the inevitable loss of control over our perception of this life and our purpose in it. Indeed, we have come face to face with the consequences of idolizing the material things of this world, of worshipping man rather than God, and of shoving God into our fear-based boxes of distrust and resentment.

All this because we have believed the lie that God's dreams for us somehow *don't* go beyond even our wildest dreams. We fear God's dreams for us will turn out like those who promised us much and hurt us by failing to keep those promises. We project these experiences onto God and try to force others to have the same view of Him as we do based on our own individual experiences. We forget who God is and who He made us to be. We forget what it means for God to love us. We have turned from God's dream for us and dreamed our own dreams without Him.

Out of this fearful separation, we respond to anything that makes us *feel* good as "love" and anything that makes us *feel* bad as "hate," when really what we mean by good and bad is comfortable and uncomfortable. We forget that God loving us means God allows us "free choice" to do with life what we choose. I put "free choice" in quotes because Pastor Joel drew for me an enlightening delineation between "free choice" and the fallacy of "free will" that blew my mind and heart open the other week, a discussion I am deeply grateful for as it helped inspire my writing here. This free choice allows us to walk as far away from truth and love as we want and yet, God remains God and His truth remains...true.

So what does this have to do with dreaming? With this upcoming Advent season? With our music department?

Lots. Stay with me. Advent season is the time of the year in which the institutionalized church has chosen to specifically focus on God's people "awaiting our Savior." We are able to dream *because* of our Savior, Jesus Christ. I love the juxtaposition of this theme "those who dream" during Advent as it forces into our awareness this truth: we dream because of Jesus. We no longer dream of His coming. He came. He died. He rose again, so that whosever believes in Him and what He did for us *already* may do things just as great if not greater! (John 14:12) This means we get to dream and dream *big*. How big? Jesus risen from the dead and that same resurrection power is within us BIG.

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Thanksgiving Reflections Thanksgiving Worship

Each year we join together with Trinity and King of Glory for a joint Thanksgiving worship. This year, we are putting together a brief prerecorded devotional worship that can be watched and shared on Thanksgiving as part of your Thanksgiving celebration. This service will include prayers, music, scripture, and a compilation of gratitude.

Longest Night Blue Christmas Worship Sunday, December 20, 7:00 p.m. Zion Lutheran Church

We join together on this longest night of the year when the darkness feels that it may overcome the light. We join to lament our losses, share our grief, give voice to our shattered dreams. It is a time to come together for prayers and laments, to mourn the losses and griefs of the year, to let tears flow for the hurting place in our lives, as well as our country and world. This is a safe and sacred space to share anguish, to plead with God to remember us, to pray for justice, and hope against hope, through our doubts and tears and fears that God will set all things right. We come together on the longest night of the year and lift all our concerns, worries, grief, and loss and find that the light shines in the darkness.

Zion, King of Glory, and Trinity will come together on Sunday, December 20, at 7:00 p.m. for a Longest Night Blue Christmas worship. The worship will be in person or on Zoom. We invite you to enter the darkness and find hope in Jesus who is the light of the world.

Worship Update

We have returned to two Sunday worship services at 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. both of which are accessible

via Zoom. The Zoom code had to be updated in mid September. To join each week, you can find the link on Zion's website <u>www.zionloveland.com</u> or in the weekly e-On Zion email. The link is the same for both services.

We currently have in-person worship for twenty people or fewer at each service. To attend in person, you can sign up on the Sign Up Genius or call the church office. This will continue as long as the regathering team and council feel that it is safe for our staff to have others in worship. Good ventilation is important where people are gathered, so for

everyone's safety, the windows on the south wall of the sanctuary and the movable wall on the north side will remain open during worship so that fresh air can be introduced. If you come to in-person worship, you will want to dress accordingly. The heat in the building is operating at full capacity, but colder air is coming in from the outside.

Drive-In Worship

Gather in Zion's parking lot for a service of songs, scripture, sermon, and candlelight all from the warmth of your own vehicle. For those who desire, the service will conclude with singing *Silent Night*, lighting candles, and placing an ornament on the large evergreen tree to the west on the front lawn.

Zoom Worship Broadcast from the Sanctuary

Children and adults will share the Christmas story through the recorded Christmas program. Watch this worship from the warmth of your home, hear your favorite Christmas carols, and celebrate the birth of Jesus with your loved ones just as the first birth was celebrated by Mary and Joseph.

Carols and Candles

A brief devotional time of gathering outside singing carols, lighting the candles, decorating the evergreen on the west side of the building, and hearing the good news of Christ's birth as proclaimed in the Gospel of Luke. Following God's Dream for Zion in 2021 Community and Connection—Commitment Sunday—November 15, 2020

As we look to the coming year, it is clear that God is leading us to find deeper ways to connect and care for each other. We seek to make deeper connections with those in our congregation, in our community, and to those throughout the world. The church council, in creating a vision for where God is leading us in 2021, identified key areas to help deepen our connection and community.

Building Community

Our building project is complete, and in 2021 we will continue to make regular mortgage payments. These payments support more than a building. They support a place for people in our congregation to connect and people in our community to connect. The Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Depression and Bipolar Support Group, and other community groups meet regularly in our space. We have become the home to a budding youth orchestra with more than fifty kids in three orchestras [see article on page 18 of this newsletter]. New ministries have emerged including Nourish, a monthly gathering for all ages for faith-filled conversation and connection. We know that God has more in store.

Virtual Connection

The pandemic has thrust us to find creative ways to reach out via technology. Our Zoom worship, Bible study, and small groups connect those of us who regularly gather, but the technology has also allowed new connections with the homebound and those across the miles. We seek to continue to grow this ministry to continue to keep us connected in new ways.

Community Care

As we see the need in our community grow, we seek to give more to support those who are struggling in these times.

Ministry Excellence

Crisis can bring out the best or the worst in people. Truly we have seen how this has brought out the best in Zion staff. We seek to support our staff to continue their amazing work.

More information about each of these ministry areas will be coming to you in weekly flyers, letters, and mission moments. A brochure highlighting *Community and Connection* along with a *Statement of Intent* will come the week of November 8. We ask that you thoughtfully read this information and prayerfully consider what God is calling you to give in 2021. God has given us a mission we can fulfill as we pull together and give generously in support of this work.

We will observe **Community and Connection Commitment Sunday on November 15, 2020,** when we will invite you to present your Statement of Intent. This can be done online during worship or following each worship we will have a drive-through Community and Connection Celebration where you can bring your Statement of Intent. You are also welcome to mail your Statement of Intent to the church office or bring it to the office the week before November 15.

Thank you to each one of you for the part you play in this



faithful and exciting congregation. We invite you to pray for our common work together as we continue to reach out to share the good news in word and deed and deepen our connection and community.

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It has been vital to hold space as a church for all the fear and grief that has risen to the surface with the unsettling events of this year. After all, it is written Jesus weeps with us and is there for us in every moment of our lives. Because of this, it is *even more vital* to hold fast to the *promise of risen life* through Him, the Savior who came for us, the one whom the Israelites and prophets dreamt of way back when.

Our world once again waits for Jesus. But what are we waiting for exactly? "The Return of Jesus," many faithful believers say. Did we forget about John 14:12? It's easy to forget when we still struggle to accept that all this messiness we call life is the same messiness God calls "love" and "the working out of our salvation." The Risen Jesus' Holy Spirit is within us, without us and moving all around us at all times. The very fact that this Holy Spirit resides with us amongst all this messiness means that God has not given up on us and He never will. He already did what He needed to do: He sent Jesus in our place to bear the weight of this messiness, to carry the cross of futile dreams and wounded hearts. He came to free us from the burden of shame and guilt. So what of all this mistreatment of one another during hard times? What do we make of so many at this time choosing to shame one another and project self-hatred onto one another? This is the *beautiful work* of the Risen Christ in us. This is His Holy Spirit allowing us to see simultaneously the futility of our separation from God (fear, hatred, shame) and the abundance of His grace and love which manages to still hold space for our mess.

This same grace and love is the resurrecting power of Jesus that allows our beautiful team of music volunteers at Zion to make it through the messiness of extreme fire growth one day and a foot of snow the next in order to still gather and serve with voices and instruments. This is the Risen Christ alive in each loyal soul of our church. This is the Jesus living in us who managed to take on the worst attacks humankind could throw at Him and still rise. So He works through us in our music department to continue rolling with the punches this year throws at us and will throw at us going forward.

In our separation from God, each of these punches feels like an attack meant to deplete us of all hope, faith, and life. When we choose (free choice) to remain in that separation mindset, we see its results. (Hint: you can see the results literally everywhere around you in society right now.) When we choose, however, to take on our new wineskins, to live in the promise of the resurrected body of Jesus Christ, none of these punches can stop us from dreaming. But here's the kicker: we're not only able to dream but, when we truly make space to follow His Spirit's leading, we are called to build His Kingdom here. His Kingdom. Not the Kingdom that comforts my ego or your ego. Not the Kingdom that feels familiar. Not the Kingdom that reminds you of church growing up. Not the Kingdom of rainbows and butterflies. God's everlasting Kingdom. The Kingdom that allows all life experience to exist without the need to place idols on the altars or convert others to our favorite causes before converting them to Christ. We are clearly being made to see how these things of separation limit who God created us to be; therefore, dreaming dreams of these things without putting God first naturally leads to very short life cycles for the manifestation of those dreams.

As we have prayed for His Spirit's guiding to lead us in our music ministry at Zion, God has worked through us to dream up new ways of

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performing choir anthems while physically distanced, a new concert series that allows members to exhale at the beginning of each month, new songs to write and sing together in our praise band and new ways of having brass at Christmas time. God's dream of Jesus alive in us is surely manifesting here at Zion!

Now...His Holy Spirit has led me to share what has long been known within my spirit. It is time. These coming months bring us to our greatest challenge yet: to watch the veil of deception over our world fall down while the *true* Spirit of Jesus Christ shows His justice and righteousness to us in the midst of this fall. This is the challenge to fully *receive* "the overwhelming, never-ending reckless love of God" manifesting before our very eyes. The love of God is allowing us to fully experience the consequences of our dreaming dreams that were based in separation from His truth of resurrected life, dreams that were based in fear and deception.

When the angel came to deliver the message of Jesus' coming to Joseph, He said "Do not be afraid." When we place our trust in the things of this world, fear inevitably overwhelms us when these things fall because we chose to put our trust in things we can see and be "right" about. When we place our trust in the promised coming of God's Eternal Kingdom (the kingdom of which He has made us co-creators, FYI), we can feel the fear as an experience and simultaneously choose to put our faith in the *truth* of His resurrected life *IN US!* The evil in our world, in us, can do everything in its power to deceive, burn things down and destroy, but all of these actions inevitably lead to *new life* and *new hope*.

This is our time to dream big like "those who dream" throughout the Bible. But, we don't need to live within the limitations of our past traumas and associated dreams. We are no longer slaves to any power or principality of this world as it *has* been. Each of us is individually and fully made *sovereign* and *free* in Jesus Christ's resurrected life. When we remember this and make the choice to accept this truth, we rise from the ashes of our own crushed dreams and live again, humbled by His grace and renewed by His Spirit. This is our time to manifest Heaven on Earth through His Holy Spirit.

We are leaving an epoch of "dreaming to escape reality" and entering an epoch of manifesting the dream come true of Jesus risen and alive in us.

PS—Triggers are loving signs from your body (which God designed in His image) to become more aware of your state of being than you were before. They are not something to run from. They are ways that God loves us by allowing us to grow through them, like "growing pains." If you have the inclination to dismiss the boldness of my writing here because you were "triggered," I highly encourage you to lean into those triggers. Ask the tough questions. Go to God in prayer. What dreams and visions has He given you to share? It no longer works for us to dismiss and run from whatever makes us uncomfortable. It's time to recognize that power of the Risen Christ in us and to lean into these times rather than run from them.

Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. —JOHN 14:12

What felt odd was not including the volunteers the children love and miss, explaining I could not give them all hugs even though that was what I wanted the most, and reminding them to mind their space and stay six feet apart. The need for this reminder never waned, but the kids were quick to pick up on safety and cleaning procedures. Looking past the fears, the stresses, and the unknowns, the children were able to interact with their friends and make music together to be shared in worship. Their resiliency gives me hope for our future.

Even though your bodies do not fill our building, the church feels full of love and support. We continue to offer a safe space for all types of people in all walks of life. Our community is incredibly generous with their prayers, emotional support, and donations of time and money. A donation in memory of TRUDIE HUTH could not have come at a better time. We were able to purchase tables that allow the children to play Orff instruments at the correct height. The entire experience was a more than acceptable alternative to children's choir, and I know Trudie would have loved seeing the kids' smiles as they prepared their music for worship. Looking ahead to December, we will be joining forces for a Christmas program. In January 2021, be watching for the opportunity to sign your kids up for another Orff ensemble.

In the meantime, take care of one another. In the words of my father-in-law, wash your hands, wear a mask, keep your distance, and stay in touch.



Dreaming New Dreams in 2020—NoCoYo

At the beginning of August, I received a quick text from Hannah's orchestra teacher at Lucile Erwin, Daniel Smith (who also happens to be her string bass instructor): *"Having a tough day with the news that the kids can't come together for school in the fall. I had an idea. Can you give me a call?"*

I gave him a call, and he shared about how distraught he was that middle school and high school students that he teaches at Lucile Erwin Middle School and Loveland High School were not going to be able to come together to make music again in the fall. He said he had been dreaming of ways kids could get together to make music and wanted to brainstorm together. As we talked together, a new dream emerged.

What if we put together a community youth orchestra at Zion so that kids could make music together? Orchestra is the perfect pandemic opportunity. Kids wear masks all the time; they are 6 feet apart; no one talks except the conductor; and they are playing stringed instruments so there is no blowing. We began to envision how this could take shape. I shared that Zion had just built a new fellowship hall as part of our Building Community by Sharing God's Light building project.

This vision—this dream—had to be more than just a Mr. Smith and Pastor Sonja dream. The dream was presented to Zion's regathering team and church council and began to emerge into a reality. We applied for variances, created a website, and developed promotional materials. The dream evolved into more than an orchestra of kids from the schools where Mr. Smith teaches. This would be a community-wide youth orchestra. NoCoYo was born with the vision "Inspiring Harmony for Tomorrow." The dream started with 24 youth and a conductor who could meet weekly. As the dream was shared, many others wanted to join. As of this writing, 60 kids have auditioned for three different youth orchestras—a beginner orchestra, an intermediate, and an advanced orchestra.

The launch date is Monday, November 2. The empty chairs that you see will be filled with youth who are finding connection in safe ways in these times.

Personnel Committee

The personnel committee has been quite busy this year. While the committee needed to meet with each staff member in an annual review, this year was more intense because of the effects of the coronavirus. Several staff were left without programs but then stepped up to fill in where they were needed. This was very helpful! This meant that some previous goals had to end and new goals added. Several staff positions never had written job descriptions so that was done, and the committee made recommendations for salary increases.

CARS

Between generous givers at Zion and a generous grant from the Rotary Foundation, Zion partnered with House of Neighborly Service (HNS) to begin a new program at HNS called CARS (Christian Auto Repair Service). Many people who are transitioning out of crisis and into self-reliance are often one event away from falling back into poverty or crisis, and an expensive car repair can be that one event. The CARS program allows those for whom car repairs become an obstacle to continue to dream of greater possibilities. Recently, we received two stories of those who have benefited from this generous program.

The first involved a single mom who was in the Family Promise (formerly IHN) program. She had been driving her car with tires with treads so worn they had become dangerous. So a case manager at HNS worked with her to determine how much she could afford, and the CARS program paid the balance to get new tires. With the new tires, she will be safe for the upcoming winter weather and continue to transport her children safely to daycare and then get to work safely. She cried and was so very grateful for the "miracle" help!


The second story involved an older, single male, who called HNS requesting assistance to repair the clutch on his vehicle. The case manager worked with this client to determine how much he could afford, then made arrangements with Fred's Automotive to pay the balance for the repair. The client is disabled with an old back injury, and his car is a critical link to his independence. Having to walk or ride the bus system would be virtually impossible for him. He showed a deeply grateful appreciation for all the help he received.

Faster Pastors Outrunning Hunger

The Faster Pastors were at it again this year, this time running the Flaming Foliage Relay virtually. The team was comprised of 10 pastors and laypeople who each ran three legs ranging from 3.2 to 12.6 miles each leg, running for a total of 163.4 miles. Eight congregations were represented from Colorado, Utah, and New Mexico. Zion had three participants on the team including PASTOR JOEL, PASTOR SONJA and newcomer MATT MOORE joining the team. Matt was a great addition and ran a total of 17 miles combined for his three legs.

Zion raised a total of \$2,895 for ELCA World Hunger. AMAZING! You all are a part of the team as together we are outrunning hunger!









Sky Ranch Fire Update by Brad Abbott, Executive Director (Posted on Facebook—October 24)

A short update as we were allowed access to Sky Ranch for a few hours today before the sirens of the sheriff announced the fire was getting more active and we had to leave. The fire is still burning in the Pingree area, and there are still active flames and smoke on the camp property. As of today, all buildings are ok. We were able to verify the loss of some outlying structures, including the high ropes course, Sondance worship area, sauna, Beaver Meadows platform tents, and parts of the Wilderness worship area. The fire did burn near

the Outdoor Chapel, but flames stopped at the base of the cross, sparing the worship area. There are still a lot of unburned areas in and around camp, so structure protection teams are actively patrolling our site and tending to spot fires.

I am impressed with the incredible work that the fire crews have done to preserve and protect buildings at Sky Ranch and throughout this fire.

Scott Sprain

NOVEMBER—*Calypso*, by David Sedaris, 2018, 273 pages. Nonfiction.

When he buys a beach house on the Carolina coast, Sedaris envisions long, relaxing vacations spent playing board games and lounging in the sun with those he loves most. And life at the Sea Section, as he names the vacation home, is exactly as idyllic as he imagined, except for one tiny, vexing realization: it's impossible to take a vacation from yourself.

With Calypso, Sedaris sets his formidable powers of observation toward middle age and mortality. Make no mistake: these stories are very, very funny--it's a book that can make you laugh 'til you snort, the way only family can. Sedaris's powers of observation have never been sharper, and his ability to shock readers into laughter unparalleled. But much of the comedy here is born out of that vertiginous moment when your own body betrays you and you realize that the story of your life is made up of more past than future. Calypso is simultaneously Sedaris's darkest and warmest book yet—and it just might be his very best.

JANUARY—*Sapiens: A Brief History of Humankind*, by Yuval Noah Harari, 2015, 469 pages. Nonfiction.

From a renowned historian comes a groundbreaking narrative of humanity's creation and evolution—a #1 international bestseller—that explores the ways in which biology and history have defined us and enhanced our understanding of what it means to be "human." One hundred thousand years ago, at least six different species of humans inhabited Earth. Yet today there is only one—homo sapiens. What happened to the others? And what may happen to us?

Most books about the history of humanity pursue either a historical or a biological approach, but Dr. Yuval Noah Harari breaks the mold with this highly original book that begins about 70,000 years ago with the appearance of modern cognition. From examining the role evolving humans have played in the global ecosystem to charting the rise of empires, Sapiens integrates history and science to reconsider accepted narratives, connect past developments with contemporary concerns, and examine specific events within the context of larger ideas. A Summer Reading Pick for President Barack Obama, Bill Gates, and Mark Zuckerberg.

Six days on the road with an enigmatic holy man who answers every question with a riddle is not what he'd planned. But in an effort to westernize his passenger—and amuse himself—he decides to show the monk some "American fun" along the way. From a chocolate factory in Hershey to a bowling alley in South Bend, from a Cubs game at Wrigley field to his family farm near

In Roland Merullo's masterful hands, Otto tells his story with all the wonder, bemusement, and wry humor of a man who unwittingly finds what he's missing in the most unexpected place.

MARCH—*A Woman of No Importance*, by Sonia Purnell, 2019, 368 pages. Nonfiction.

The target in their sights was Virginia Hall, a Baltimore socialite who talked her way into Special Operations Executive, the spy organization dubbed Winston Churchill's "Ministry of Ungentlemanly Warfare." She became the first Allied woman deployed behind enemy lines and—despite her prosthetic leg helped to light the flame of the French Resistance, revolutionizing secret warfare as we know it.

Based on new and extensive research, Sonia Purnell has for the first time uncovered the full secret life of Virginia Hall—an astounding and inspiring story of heroism, spycraft, resistance, and personal triumph over shocking adversity. In 1958, the very same year that an unknown songwriter named Berry Gordy borrowed \$800 to found Motown Records, a pretty young mother from Nashville, Tennessee, borrowed \$100 from her brother to run a numbers racket out of her home. That woman was Fannie Davis, Bridgett M. Davis's mother.

Part bookie, part banker, mother, wife, and granddaughter of slaves, Fannie ran her numbers business for thirty-four years, doing what it took to survive in a legitimate business that just happened to be illegal. She created a loving, joyful home, sent her children to the best schools, bought them the best clothes, mothered them to the highest standard, and when the tragedy of urban life struck, soldiered on with her stated belief: "Dying is easy. Living takes guts."

A daughter's moving homage to an extraordinary parent, The World According to Fannie Davis is also the suspenseful, unforgettable story about the lengths to which a mother will go to "make a way out of no way" and provide a prosperous life for her family—and how those sacrifices resonate over time.
