Motion: To accept the 2019 Semi-Annual Meeting minutes. Elliott Pancoast moved, Mike Sloan seconded: Motion passed.

"WHEREAS the Zion Lutheran Church ("Ministry") proposes to borrow the sum of \$450,000 from the Mission Investment Fund of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America under the following conditions:

The loan proceeds are to be used for the purpose of completing repairs and renovations,

The loan is to be secured by a first mortgage, or first lien deed of trust or other security instrument, on the real property of the Ministry, specifically the church buildings and grounds as well as the personal property of the Ministry,

The loan will be for a term of 25 years at an interest rate to be adjusted every 5 years, and it is

RESOLVED that (a) the Ministry is authorized to borrow the sum of \$450,000 from the Mission Investment Fund of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, to be used to the foregoing purpose and to be secured by real property of the Ministry as set forth above; (b) the President and/or any Vice President of the Ministry are authorized to execute the promissory note and mortgage, or deed of trust or other security instrument, to evidence said borrowing, with such changes in those documents as such officers of the Ministry may approve, (c) those officers are also authorized to take all further actions and execute all such further documents as may be necessary to carry out the foregoing borrowing; and (d) those officers are also authorized to agree to any extensions in the payment dates or due dates under that promissory note as are acceptable to the Fund."

Member Giving Through June – we started out less than previous years, but in April – June the members have been supporting the

church with more giving Church Council put a freeze on the programs/budgetary expenses. The

council has been approving expenses.
We have a surplus of \$38,547 – due to increased giving through the first of the year and

PPP Update- Terri Sloan
Loan application submitted in early April for the amount of \$60,644 to cover payroll expenses and utilities for a two month period of time
The loan was approved for \$49,200 – covered 8 weeks of payroll (not utilities or any other payroll benefits)
Once final June payroll was completed, a loan usage report was submitted to lender on June 23 (as part of the loan requirements and

guidelines)
We are currently waiting to hear if the loan was forgiven from our bank (it is our assumption that it will be forgiven, but if not we are holding the loan amount in the budget)

Member Assistance Information – Pastor Joel
Congregational members have donated \$12,100 to help other members during this time of Covid – thank you for the generosity because this money is given outside of the budget o far we have given a small amount

The pastors are in touch with those who are struggling – and they foresee that it looks like we will have to give more in future when bills stop being deferred and continued unemployment

PASTORS' REPORT- PASTOR JOEL AND PASTOR SONJA PANCOAST

For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. — Jeremiah 29:11

2020 was the year when all the great plans each of us had made individually and the plans that Zion has made a community made came crashing down around us. Nothing went as planned and yet we still have a future and a future with hope with God leading and guiding us along the way. The year 2020 has been a year of firsts for many of us, and we hope it is a year of lasts. On March 13, the coronavirus pandemic that we had been watching from a distance had come to us when we were notified that Colorado was under stay-at-home orders for the health and safety of everyone. We had just started the Lenten season, and though our customary Lenten midweek activities of soup supper and small groups spread throughout the building were already limited because of the building addition and remodel, the pandemic further limited how many people could gather at one time together.

One of the "silver lining" learnings in this year was to put to the test the teaching that the church is not the building, but the church is the people of God, gathered and sent. What we learned was that, in spite of any challenge or limitation, the church was never closed. Of course, our gathering would look different, but thanks to technology available in 2020, and thanks to the work of an incredible staff, Zion has never missed a day of worship, whether on Sunday or Lenten midweek. On March 15, only two days after we received notice that we would not be able to gather in person, we began offering worship by livestream, broadcasting across the internet on an online platform called Zoom.

Staff, council, and volunteers acted quickly, creatively, and with love and patience to make sure everyone was safe and cared for, and if necessary, to teach people how to access worship online. For those unable to join online, sermons and prayers have been sent by mail every week. Some who receive those mailings have told us they wait each week with anticipation for their envelope from Zion to come in the mail on Tuesday or Wednesday so they can still feel connected in whatever way possible.



For a Christian church community that lives into the blessing and promise of incarnation, God-with-us in flesh, participating in worship online is not ideal. Physical presence is important for the feeling of true community. The halls of the building are far too silent. The sound of greetings and laughter and the sight of people shaking hands and hugging are missing. Yet, we have learned in this time that even distance and isolation cannot tear apart the body of Christ. God is still bringing us a future with hope.

"Building Community by Sharing God's Light"

We had great plans for our new building in 2020. In last year's report, we shared that the capital improvement and expansion project was well underway, but at that point we were still surrounded by noise, dust, mess, and chaos. By early summer, with a few minor exceptions, the project was complete, and though we weren't able to gather in large groups, we were able to offer many small group tours of the building, during which time the congregation also offered prayers of blessing for the new space, those who would use it, and for God's mission as we will use it.

It has been unfortunate that we have not been able to gather as a congregation in the new space. We have yet to truly "test" the kitchen, and at minimum we have missed the Palm Sunday breakfast, Bella Notte dinner, and many other opportunities for us to gather in the larger fellowship hall serviced by a beautiful, commercial kitchen and washroom. God still had a future with hope. The new space has not gone unused. Early in the pandemic when we were not gathering indoors at all for worship, we were able to safely gather people in the



new outdoor worship and gathering space. Addiction and support groups have been able to meet safely with distancing and masks. Monroe Elementary School used our building as a drop-off and collection site for Christmas gifts for children in need. Zion's own small groups have been able to meet both inside and out because of the space we are afforded. Perhaps most exciting, Zion has become the host to a brand-new youth orchestra!

Of course, we look forward to the day when we can finally gather in the building for one huge celebration together. We hope that will be sometime in 2021. For now, we are grateful for the opportunities the space has given us in this difficult time, and the opportunities to share our space with the community.

Reliant Staff and Staffing Changes

We had great plans for 2020 for our staff as we looked forward to the gifts our newly hired music director would bring. Instead, God had plans for all of our staff to grow in new ways. What has come to light in this last year is the truly amazing staff with which Zion has been blessed. The staff shifted their current ministry descriptions in ways one never expected. This included Lindsey becoming video and sound operator, Noelle playing multiple instruments and being present much more in worship, Stig learning MUCH more about live streaming technology, Madeline monitoring Zoom each Sunday during worship and finding ways to connect

people in creative ways, and Keenan digitally mixing individual voice recordings into one production. Each staff person willingly stepped forward and offered their gifts. Truly our whole Zion community is enriched by their dedication, love, resilience, and care for Zion's community.

At the end of 2020, we received Dr. Keenan Boswell's resignation as Zion's director of music and worship. After only about 13 months, this came too soon, and was quite unexpected. We will miss Keenan's incredible gifts for music at the organ, piano, and with his own voice. We will miss the ways he inspired volunteer musicians to lift up their voices and instruments for worship, and even create and write new music. We have been blessed in the short time to work with Keenan, but he was feeling called out of church ministry, so we had to wish him farewell and Godspeed. Since it has been a short time since we called Keenan, we are relatively prepared to move forward. The Personnel Committee has approved the ministry descriptions and interim process, and a search team has been formed to begin their work so that we can have our music ministries fully staffed soon.



Moving into 2021

In many ways 2020 has been a difficult year. Nothing went as planned, and yet God was there. God had plans for our welfare and has given us a year of hope as we have grown in new and unexpected ways, following God's lead. This year has shown us that God's Spirit continues to call, gather, enlighten, and sanctify the church, as we have continued to worship and be blessed, and in turn serve and bless the community. We are grateful for the creativity, openness, support, and patience of this church community. As we look to 2021, we know that God will continue to lead and guide us in new and unexpected ways. We have plans, but we also know that the Lord has plans for us, plans for our welfare and not for harm, plans that lead us into a future with hope.

YEAR END PRESIDENT'S REPORT—CINDY WARREN

To say this year at Zion was unlike any other year ever for our Church community (and our world) would be a major understatement! It is difficult to remember a time before this pandemic. We have all learned and changed while approaching this change with some cooperation and some resistance. In the small amount of time the music staff has managed this new way of life as it looms with no clear end, we have experienced many steps that deserve celebration. We also remember the times we shared before the pandemic, because (I know it is hard to believe) we spent a few beautiful months creating music and worshipping with friends, family, children, and colleagues.

In late January through Early March, the Children's Choir met on Tuesdays with help from our volunteers, Pam Stevens, Kathy Pancoast, Judie Wass and Esther Lucero. There were so many new faces from Monroe Elementary, along with Monroe students who joined in 2017, and Zion children who joined the in 2016. This group was able to share their gifts in our worship services twice before March. The children were not the only ones who made connections through our church, but the parents of these children also felt welcomed and connected to Zion.

With the wonderful help of Jane Andrews and her volunteers at King of Glory, host families at King of Glory and our extremely accommodating and generous host families from Zion, we made a joint effort to host the Watoto Children's Chorus at the end of January. This was an eye-opening experience for many as we basked in the moving show provided by Watoto.

As my memory takes me past February 2019, I cannot fathom having more gratitude for the staff at Zion, and the immense support provided by our congregation. Our Sunday and Midweek worships were only made possible by everyone learning new technologies. I was incredibly impressed when Joey Klammer, Sophia Pancoast, and Hannah Pancoast recorded themselves playing "As The Green Blade Rises" to then have the recordings combined and presented at our Easter service.

My studies never prepared me for a virtual music camp, we held one over the summer of 2020 and it was so fun! With the changing technology we were able to include kids and adults from across the country. After one week of rehearsing over Zoom, the participants visually and audibly recorded themselves and were part of a video collage presented during Sunday worship singing "Mungu ni Mwema with God is so Good."

An enormous blessing came when Deborah Price arranged to purchase tables for our Orff instruments. This allowed CMM to welcome a small group of kids to play our set of Orff instruments. The kids definitely worked hard and learned a lot through this process, but the best part was seeing their excitement interacting with others kids face-to-face. I am thankful the weather was beautiful through September and October so we could all safely gather outside for all but one rehearsal. We all rang in the New Year with a new music director, pianist, organist and leader at Zion. Dr. Keenan Boswell started in late November 2019, jumping straight into the Advent and Christmas Season. Though Keenan has resigned his position, there were many celebrations spanning his time with us.

The Chancel Choir held rehearsals every Wednesday and shared their gifts of singing during our Traditional service through March 2020. They spent a lot of time singing favorite anthems and enjoying the coaching and healing approach Keenan used in rehearsals. The consequence of time forced the choir to lose and gain members throughout the year. For some former members, conversations and celebrations are still shared with the choir. For others we hold the memories of them close to our hearts and think of them as we sing. We celebrate the new members who bring smile, laughter, and beautiful singing to the choir.

Once the choir was forced to stop rehearsing in-person for the safety of everyone, they transitioned to Zoom rehearsals. During these rehearsals they would focus on using their voices correctly, prepare music to record, and continue checking in on each other. With some trial and error, the choir found a way to record their voices. Keenan would then sync the recordings and share the final recording in services. Many anthems, including "Still, Still, Still" on Christmas Eve, were a deeply appreciated.





Music Ministry Continued

In preparation for the virtual Advent devotional, some choir members recorded songs as a quartet to music performed by Exquisite Brass. Thanks to Stig Oresjo, we had audio recordings to sync with visual recordings for the advent videos and the brass quintet videos, which were shown during the Christmas Eve services.

The Zion Praise Band had quite a full year even with challenges brough by the pandemic. They gained members throughout the early part of the year and started producing moving music for our worship services. When they could not gather, Keenan facilitated the writing of an original song, "Alive in Christ" written by Erin Bachman, Keenan Boswell, Nita Star and Dave Wolfe.

Through the summer months Praise Band members were able to gather, at a distance, and share in the Contemporary Worship, which was through Zoom. During this time the group and the staff solved balance problems and spacing problems so the music could enhance the worship experience of people listening through their computer speakers.

In March, as the staff brainstormed ways to keep connections throughout the church and provide opportunities for worship without putting volunteers in harm's way, we used Wednesday evenings for special music. We continued Holden Evening Prayer for weeks past the Lenten season. After, Keenan and myself began planning for Exhale in hopes that the mini concerts envisioned would provide some with joy as they listened. Eventually we were able to have a few choir and praise band members share their gifts of singing and playing piano, and we were able to have a few professionals perform virtually.

CONNECTING HEARTS—PASTOR SONJA PANCOAST

Connecting Hearts is a wonderful umbrella of groups in our congregation who provide care for each other inside the congregation and out. These include Helping Hands – fixing homes for members and through Habitat, Homebound Communion Ministers, Meals to Heal, Parish Nurses, Prayer Shawl, Quilt Tiers and Stephen Ministries. Each of these ministries has had to adjust to the new regulations during the pandemic and still we are able to provide

care. Helping Home and Habitat were still able to have people work on homes outside when the weather permitted. Homebound Communion Ministry expanded to all of us as we all are homebound and unable to join in worship. During this time we have shifted to having communion once a month in worship to all of us who are homebound.

Meals to Heal ministry expanded as more people were in need of meals for surgeries, deaths, births, and COVID. In previous years meals may have been provided by others who could come from out of town and stay. With the travel restrictions we came together as a community to provide meals for those who were in need.

Parish Nurses were not able to do blood pressure clinics but were still able to check on members or take them to the doctor.

Prayer Shawl was not able to meet in person but they were very busy crocheting in their homes. The need for prayers shawls increased as they are a safe way to provide care and connection in these times. Many who were sick, lonely, or in various need received prayer shawls.

Quilt Tiers was not able to gather in person to tie quilts but many of the tiers changed their ministry to making masks to help keep others safe.

Stephen Ministry moved their monthly meetings to Zoom and their one on one caregiver relationship to telephone conversations.

A new ministry of phone calling was added in 2020 and a faithful group stepped up to give people a call weekly throughout March, April, and May. As the summer months approached we realized that many were able to get out more and connect with loved ones so the team was reduced and the focus moved to monthly calls to those who are not able to get out very often. These calls have continued for the remainder of 2020. As we look to 2021 we can't wait to see what God will do with this new ministry.

Thank you to each one of you who cares for each other. You truly share God's love in so many and various ways.



FAMILY PROMISE (FORMERLY IHN)—RUTH SPRAIN



Family Promise provides needy families with housing, food, and support. The name Family Promise changed from Interfaith Hospitality Network to reflect the organizing body of which Angel House and Zion are a part.

During 2020, COVID-19 affected the ministry of Family Promise dramatically. Because of state and local regulations, Family Promise was either not accepting families or housed families in motels. Zion was not able to house families in our facility due to construction in the spring, then due to COVID regulations.

During November 15-22, 2020, Zion hosted two families in motels. Volunteers brought dinners on three evenings, plus over \$800 was donated to provide gift cards for groceries and meals from restaurants. Additional funds were donated and provided by Zion for motel rooms. The cost of a motel room for one family is about \$55. That means the cost for one family for a week is about \$385. Clearly, the cost of hosting families is much more expensive with motel hosting and paying for restaurants versus housing families at our church and cooking meals. Therefore, we are extremely grateful to volunteers who donated to our hosting week!

Zion plans to host four weeks for Family Promise in 2021. Depending on whether Zion can host families in our church, both help and monetary gifts will be needed during those weeks. Since many Zion members attend worship on-line, communicating the need for donations and help is more challenging. Zion's Family Promise coordinators will call volunteers directly as well as use announcements in newsletters and emails. Please give generously! Homeless family assistance is needed more than ever because of job loss and COVID restrictions.

We are grateful to the Church at Loveland who partners with Zion to host on Friday and Saturday during Zion's Family Promise weeks. In November, Church of Loveland provided part of the funding for motel rooms and food to assist families in the program.

PERSONNEL COMMITTEE—JANIE LICHTFUSS

Like so many things, the work of the Personnel Committee moves in waves. Sometimes we are very busy and other times things are much slower. A lot has happened in 2020. We hired Keenan Boswell to serve as organist,

Director of Music, choir director, and Director of the Praise Band. No sooner did he begin, Covid-19 hit and we are all virtually out of the church building. It is good to note, however, that Keenan has continued to serve us well and has been very creative in offering music for the congregation. The Personnel Committee thanks him, and all the Staff, for their wonderful work to make Zion an alive and worshipful place. The Personnel Committee updated all the job descriptions and the Personnel Handbook and we met personally with staff members to discuss goals for the



coming year—so we have kept busy. Eventually things will return to a "new normal" and the congregation can once again come together as a congregation worshipping together in the sanctuary at Zion. Meanwhile, stay safe and stay well! Blessings.





FAITH FORMATION—MADELINE FAIRFAX

2020 has been both an exciting and a challenging year in Faith Formation at Zion. Prior to the pandemic we had a strong start to the year with a new Mardi Gras pancake dinner, a series of monthly youth-planned high school events, L2F2 Confirmation field trips to help apply faith to everyday life, a summer service trip to Idaho planned, Vacation Bible School with a cross-generational theme in the works, weeks at Sky Ranch scheduled for 1st-12th graders, a brand new small group ministry pilot project called Nourish, all ages monthly events and service projects planned, and more. But in the middle of our Lenten wilderness theme in mid-March, we found ourselves enduring a true sense of wilderness. The annual events, gatherings, shared food, and traditions that many participants of all ages look forward to each year suddenly needed to be adapted, postponed, or swapped entirely for new traditions and experiments. While we still wait with anticipation to celebrate these milestones of faith in their fullness at some point in the future, at all age levels we've also found lots of new ways to gather and share our growing faith creatively.

From Confirmation classes meeting via Zoom, preschoolers gathering for virtual story time, third through fifth graders forming an online book club, adults navigating new technology to register for events remotely, high school youth organizing a dance on the new patio, families recording Christmas program video clips, and lots of drive through events and porch drop-offs to help distribute supplies, I've admired everyone's resilience and creativity to celebrate and grow in faith, particularly in the last 10 months of ministry.

Several other highlights for the year included First Communion for six children, Affirmation of Baptism for three youth, Faith Formation Fridays, Sierra's Race Largest Team award, Unraveled Summer Faith at Home prayer stations and activities, Advent kits for families with young children, KidsPak volunteer opportunities, celebrating 2020 graduates, online Sunday School led by Sky Ranch summer staff, outdoor movie events, young adult small groups through the ELCA, and an additional partnership with Trinity Lutheran joining Zion and King of Glory for Confirmation ministry.





Thank you to everyone who has led, volunteered with, and participated in each of the ministries and events that have been able to take place. Even when we are not able to gather in-person, you have shown your commitment to faith formation and building community. In August, we were still able to begin a new ministry called Nourish. Led by Joel Brauner, with the intention of nourishing participants' minds, bodies, and souls, the initial plans for gathering around food have been temporarily adapted from their original plans. However, the ability to share in connection and mutual prayer support has been much needed during a time when many families feel isolated.

In the year ahead, we look forward to returning to some of our time-honored faith formation traditions, but we will also remember the unique opportunities we have had to try new things and adapt. We are grateful for the lessons learned and for the hope the new year brings. No matter what happens, we trust that the Holy Spirit will continue to move through the community at Zion to help us form our faith and our understanding of God's presence in our lives.







MONROE ELEMENTARY OUTREACH—PASTOR SONJA PANCOAST



During the first three months of 2020 we were blessed to have our regular volunteers in place helping to support the kids and families at Monroe through weekly volunteering in the classroom, playground, and library. At Spring Break the school district let out and did not return back to in person learning until late September. We are so thankful for each of the volunteers who gave of their time in the classroom to touch the lives of children and to let them experience first hand our love and care for each one of them.

When school went back in the fall, we were still able to partner with Monroe but in a more limited fashion. Noelle lead a Children's Orff Choir in September and October. We kept kids warm with 30 coats, 7 pair of boots, and 5 pairs of gloves, hats and scarves in October. We helped families celebrate the holidays with 30 Thanksgiving bags in November and 57 gifts for Christmas for students and staff in December.



STEWARDSHIP—PASTOR SONJA PANCOAST

2020 is a year like none other. One of the things that we stand out as we reflect on this year is the amazing generosity of each of the members of Zion. When the pandemic hit and the council began to reflect if we would be able to afford to keep all our staff, before they were even able to make a decision the congregation has responded with increased generosity and support for God's mission and ministry at Zion. This generosity has continued throughout the year and truly we cannot say thank you enough for your generosity and support.

As we look to 2021 the Stewardship Committee partnered with the Rocky Mountain Synod for Stewardship for All Seasons Refresher. Starting in September and continuing until March 2021 the Stewardship team meets monthly with other congregations in the synod to learn deepen our stewardship of all our resources.

This fall we focused on how we can deepen our Community and Connection for 2021. We focused on four areas:

Building Community – In 2020 our building was complete and as we look forward to 2021 we begin see how the building can be a place to build community.

Virtual Connection – In 2020 we had to quickly pivot worship to online platform. As we look to 2021 we look to how we can improve our online worship as well other virtual gatherings that will help us stay connected in this new world that we find ourselves in

We look forward to 2021 as we grow in Community and Connection.







When we introduced *Church Becoming* in late 2019 in anticipation of our 2020 Synod Assembly, we had absolutely no idea how fitting this theme would be. Church Becoming was intended as an invitation for all of us to step together into a space of **renewal and transformation** – to more fully become the church the Spirit is calling us to be for the life of the world. Three short months into 2020 our journey of becoming moved into turbo speed! Overnight we became a church meeting primarily online for worship; we became a church who gathered via ZOOM over hundreds of hours to brainstorm, lament, share resources, pray, plan, support, and be together.

Having witnessed the violence against George Floyd and other siblings of color, we became a church who engaged the collective work of anti-racism and dismantling white supremacy with greater energy and intention. In the midst of economic hardship, we became a church whose buildings suddenly served as food distribution centers, a church whose people mobilized to ensure for the basic needs of those most vulnerable during the pandemic.

There is no doubt we are a different church than we were last year. We aren't the same people of faith we used to be. And while it's not yet clear how this current chapter will finally shape our becoming, we know that the way forward does not lie behind us. As we move into the Spirit's promised future, we claim our continued call to proclaim God's unconditional, cross-shaped love for the sake of world.

We proclaim and embody God's love through our weekly worship and learning, through digital ordinations and installations, through the work of our Synod Council and our Candidacy Committee, through advocacy and outdoor ministries, through empowering leaders and growing in generosity, through our engagement on the border and our care of neighbors. We proclaim and embody God's unconditional, cross-shaped love as Church Together, through the people, congregations, and ministries of our Rocky Mountain Synod. Thanks be to God for YOU!

MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT

Living the Gospel Outside our Walls

We may not have services eye to eye, but we are living the gospel in serving many families and homeless people in El Paso. Thanks to the COVID-19 Churchwide grant, other donations, and partnerships we are distributing 142 food-boxes every week and have supported people with basic needs during this pandemic. Through other partnerships, we can distribute 100 hot meals to all our elderly members and others in the community. Every Wednesday, we pick up 72 food-boxes and distribute them to people in our community. It is how we are connecting with our members and getting to know other families in our community.

As an elder shared, "Pastora, I am thankful to God and the Church because since the Pandemic started, I am eating better than before".

We are not closed! We have so much ministry outside our four walls. We have met all kinds of people. One man was sitting outside his old apartment with his head down. He cried when we gave him the box of food. He said he had not eaten that day. My youngest daughter Allexa was with us that day. She said, "I love to see you guys helping people".





A MESSAGE FROM ELCA PRESIDING BISHOP ELIZABETH EATON

Dear friends in Christ,

This year has been a challenging one! The COVID-19 pandemic has changed the church and society. We have had to shift the ways we engage in ministry from a focus on in-person worship and meetings to livestream worship, virtual meetings and gatherings in the parking lot. God will provide both relief from life's struggles and hope for a stronger church, God's church. We do not need to know how the future will unfold. As members in the body of Christ, we need only trust that God is with us and will provide.

The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ. We must no longer be children, tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine, by people's trickery, by their craftiness in deceitful scheming. But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love." —Ephesians 4:11-16

In the early verses of Ephesians 4, the apostle Paul writes to the Christians in Ephesus, a city on the Aegean Sea at the mouth of a river and at the intersection of three trading routes. The letter was written about ten years after the church had started. During the early years of this congregation, Jews and Gentiles from several ethnicities and nationalities had come together to form "one body." Paul was aware that they had done well and commended them for their faith and love.

The word "one" appears more than seven times in the first four verses. This reflects the importance Paul gave to being called into the "unity of Christ." He wanted to note that, although many of the church members came from far off, there is "one Lord, one faith, one baptism." This oneness reflects God's gift of reconciliation in Christ.

A second emphasis from Paul was that, as believers, they were to "bear with one another in love." This would require humility, gentleness and patience as each of them practiced their faith. It would require tolerance to "maintain unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

A third emphasis was that each person had been given gifts by God and that these gifts were given to increase the whole. Because the Ephesian church was a young congregation and its members were just beginning in their faith journey, their understandings were often tossed to and fro. But as they grew in faith, each person contributed to building up the body of Christ.

The fourth and final emphasis was that by "speaking the truth in love," each person must grow into Christ. This means taking time to learn about one another and their gifts. Knowing these gifts, we can do God's work both within and beyond the faith community. When there are decisions to make or relationships to reconcile, we know to begin with prayer and reflection, always desiring to speak the truth in love — not for our own benefit but for God's glory, that we might become more complete.

As our members and friends gather today, whether face-to-face or online, we are reminded of our calling into "unity in Christ." We come from many places and work in many contexts, and yet we recognize "one Lord, one faith, one baptism."

Whether new to a worshiping community or further along the journey, we realize that humility, gentleness and patience are required both in the good times and especially in times of uncertainty and struggle. God wants us to be more complete through our work. Christ provides the way. The Holy Spirit is with us for guidance and courage. Each of us has been given the gifts to be complete, and through our faithfulness we will grow stronger and work together as one body.

LET US PRAY: LORD, LET THE WORDS OF THE APOSTLE PAUL DWELL IN US DEEPLY. MAY WE EMBRACE THE RECONCILING POWER OF ONENESS WITH CHRIST. MAY THIS ONENESS GUIDE OUR CONGREGATION AS WE LIVE INTO THE NEW REALITIES OF THESE TIMES. AS WE MEET NEW PARTNERS IN MINISTRY, MAY WE TAKE TIME TO GET TO KNOW THEM WITH PATIENCE, HUMILITY AND LOVE. HELP US TO SEE HOW SHARING OUR GIFTS WILL MAKE YOUR WORK EASIER AND MORE FULFILLING WHILE BRINGING ALL OF US CLOSER TO CHRIST. MAY THE BLESSINGS YOU GIVE EACH DAY STRENGTHEN US TO A LIVING, DARING CONFIDENCE IN YOUR GRACE. AMFN

WHAT IS MISSION SUPPORT?

Financial Mission Support is given to the synod by our 160 congregations. Each year, your congregation designates a portion of the congregational budget to send to the Rocky Mountain Synod to support our synodical, churchwide, and global ministires.

HOW IS THE SYNODICAL BUDGET SET?

The synod treasurer and finance committee, on behalf of the synod council, present a proposed budget to the voting members of the synod assembly. The synod budget is set by vote of the synod assembly.

HOW ARE MISSION SUPPORT DOLLARS USED?

As Lutherans we believe that God works through multiple expressions of the church: the congregation, the synod, the churchwide organization of the ELCA, and Lutheran institutions here and around the globe. We are a connected and inter-dependent church. In 2020, 47.5% of synodical mission support was shared with our churchwide organization.

WHAT LOCAL IMPACT DOES MISSION SUPPORT HAVE?

Mission support allows for staff to accompany congregations in transition and supported and equipped leaders through digital gatherings throughout the pandemic. A portion of the budget is given to our 3 outdoor ministries, critical partners in faith formation of youth and young adults. Your commitment to being the church together provides for our work in local and state public policy. We are Christ's Church, Better Together!
