This time of year is often a time of renewal, especially for children, faculty, and staff who are returning to schools. Even for those who haven't been in a classroom for many

years, the rhythms of life as we transition from summer into fall schedules invite reinvention and renewal, or at least getting into a different routine. As you read through this issue of the Eve on Zion, you will see many examples of "new beginnings" and "fresh starts."

The church community is rebooting with new opportunities for children and youth faith formation, thanks to several who have stepped up to contribute. For the past two years, the Long Range Planning Committee has been working to update Zion's Mission and Vision. But this hasn't been a solitary process; we've used input from the congregation to

shape and mold the new Mission and Vision. Long Range began the process by creating a survey that was given to the congregation. Based on the input that was received, we crafted a new Mission, Vision, and Ministry Result Areas. These items were given to the congregation in focus groups. These groups gave us many ideas for how to live our Mission—concrete ways for us to act on our Mission.

The theme of this season is RE:boot but this Mission is asking us to do even more. There are items in our action plan that are rebooting programs that may have fallen off during the pandemic. But this Mission will push to go beyond a reboot and challenge us to do more with God's abundance.

Staffing Updates

As many of you may know, the process to call another pastor to serve at Zion is taking longer than expected. During the interim, I have been grateful that Angie Elder agreed to serve as Pastoral Care Coordinator and Chrissy Wolfe as Faith Formation Coordinator. We had already realized we were going to need more help now that we're moving into a busier season for faith formation, but when Chrissy needed to take a brief break the need became more urgent. At a Personnel Committee meeting in June, a more robust interim plan for faith formation was put together, and in response to prayer and a few phone calls or emails, we have had the following people step into other part-time roles to help with faith formation:

Ronda Buck is providing Sunday School coordination, helping recruit teachers and putting together creative and educational curriculum.

Alyssa Hart will be coordinating young adult ministry communication and gatherings, helping with the children's program at Nourish, and providing support for high school events as needed.

Andrea Kragerud will be serving as Pastoral Assistant for Faith Formation Ministry. She will help oversee and coordinate the many things going on with so many different people stepping up to help, plan, and lead milestones ministries (like First Bible instruction and First Communion, and will work with the L2F2 team from Trinity and King of Glory to provide ministry opportunities for all ages. In addition

to faith formation responsibilities, Andrea will also help with other pastoral ministry responsibilities, such as preaching and leading Bible study, pastoral care, and stewardship support.

Pam Stevens will be continuing to set up and support Sacred Space in worship, and she will help with administrative tasks for faith formation, especially things that have slowly fallen to Lindsey's desk during the interim time.

I am grateful for each person who has agreed to step into these roles during the interim, and for the work that Angie and Chrissy have already done to ensure these ministries continue to happen. If you see any of them, please thank them for the sacrifice they are making to provide rich ministry at Zion. If you have other ideas for ministries that can be provided and are interested in helping or know someone who might be, please let me know. Since compensation for the second pastor is in the budget, we are able to pay people for their time and passion.

I have always been grateful for the flexibility and creativity that Zion leaders and members have had with staffing ministries. Whenever we have experienced a transition in staffing, the congregation shows patience, support, and creativity as we discern together how God is calling us into the future. Today's situation is no different. Our vision is still to have a second pastor in place, but the timing is God's. In the meantime, ministry does not stop or pause without that second pastor, but is regularly being rebooted as the situation and needs change.

Zion's story merits inclusion in the MIF Annul Report

Last March, Helen Wuerl, Vice President of Marketing Communications for the Mission Investment Fund (MIF) of the ELCA, contacted Pastor Joel asking if they could share Zion's story in an upcoming MIF publication. MIF is the lending partner for Zion's remodeling project—the renovation of the outdoor worship area and the addition of the commercial kitchen and space for community groups. As Pastor Joel detailed

the impact Zion has had on its community, the MIF Marketing team felt certain Zion's story merited inclusion in its annual report; Zion's vision embodied their annual report theme: "Forward Thinking, Outward Looking." ZION LUTHERAN CHURCH, LOVELAND, COLORADO

When Zion Lutheran Church in Loveland, Colorado, completed renovations to their church building and outdoor space in the summer of 2020, the changes faithfully refocused service to their neighborhood in unexpected ways. "Our building is a gift from God, and it's meant to be shared," says the Rev. Joel Pancoast who has been Zion's pastor for 14 years. Research showed serving others was a primary way members felt God's presence in their lives. If these two things—the church building and service—could align, who knew what could happen?

A forward-thinking strategic plan highlighted needed changes to the kitchen, fellowship hall, and outdoor worship area. The kitchen was deteriorating. In planning to renew the space, Zion accepted the challenge to go beyond the merely cosmetic. "Our congregation didn't need a professional kitchen," explains Pastor Pancoast,

"but our neighborhood did." Despite the cost, the congregation, without hesitation, said "yes" to revising the design. Now, a new commercial-grade kitchen is available to prepare community meals and

host class instruction in healthy food preparation and nutrition.

The new fellowship hall is similarly open for use. Music has always been an essential ministry at Zion, underscoring the congregation's appreciation of the arts. During the pandemic, local school space for orchestra practice became unavailable. Could Zion's new fellowship hall fill the gap? Following CDC guidelines, the newly established Northern

Colorado Youth Orchestra began rehearsals at Zion, where it continues to practice today.

"For Zion," relates Pastor Pancoast, "it was obvious to choose MIF for a building loan. MIF is part of the church, and using MIF also helps other congregations. The experience was incredibly positive, and we were always impressed with the immediate responses we received to questions—beginning with the initial application to now."

Improvements happened both inside and outside the church building. Even though the congregation has been holding outdoor services for close to thirty years, circumstances were less than ideal. Now, a

Services originally facing inward now look out—toward Zion's neighbors—part of the congregation's witness of worship and welcome. "Our building is about reaching out," says Pastor Pancoast, "open arms, an invitation, a partnership with our community."

Refugee Update

Will Reents

Loveland's Zion, Trinity, and King of Glory ELCA Lutheran churches have teamed as sponsors of an Afghan helicopter pilot named Haseeb who protected US troops for five years while fighting the Taliban. He escaped one year ago, just before the fall of Afghanistan, but his wife and two children were sent to Hungary and then to Germany where they now are living as refugees.

The Zion, Trinity, and King of Glory refugee team helped Haseeb obtain employment and then supplied housing and transportation until we found an apartment which we furnished.

We have also provided other living expenses and the use of a car. Our three-month commitment with the International Rescue Committee (IRC), his resettlement agency, just ended but we want to continue our relationship and help Haseeb wherever needed.

Two main challenges persist:

- Obtaining asylum status and permanent residency for him and his family. He and his family run a high risk of being killed by the Taliban if they went back to Afghanistan.
- 2. Buying a good used car for him.

The core committee and three pastors are discussing how best to accomplish these two tasks. We will update you with our decisions. For any questions contact Rick Searles or Will Reents.

Faster Pastors to Run 165-Mile Mountain Relay for Wildfire Survivors



Colorado has experienced unprecedented wildfires in the last two years. In Northern

Colorado, we experienced the Cameron Peak Fire in 2020, which is the largest wildfire in Colorado history. In December 2021 and January 2022, the Boulder area suffered the Marshall Fire, which was the most destructive wildfire in Colorado history. In the first six months of 2022 alone, New Mexico has experienced more than 31 fires that were greater than 100 acres, for a total of nearly 900,000 acres burned across the state.

Our congregation belongs to the Rocky Mountain Synod of the ELCA, which is a regional group of churches in mission together. This synod is spread across the states of Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, New Mexico, and the El Paso area of Texas. Since the territory of our synod has been hit so hard by fires in recent years, the Faster Pastors have decided to run for victims and survivors of fires throughout the synod. Funds given for the cause will be received through September 18, and will provide basic needs for

survivors of wildfires, which include food and temporary housing; mental health and trauma resources; and rebuilding, insurance, and material goods replacement.

The Faster Pastors will be running the Flaming Foliage Relay again from Idaho Springs to Buena Vista on September 9-10. The course covers 165+ miles, 30 legs, 3 mountain passes (Guanella, Georgia, and Fremont), including 31 miles of single track trails. The Faster Pastors expect to finish in about 30 hours, running nonstop through the night. Last year, the team exceeded their expectations

by completing the relay in 29 hours, 6 minutes, and 40 seconds!

run, we will be thinking about the areas around our synod that have been devastated by wildfires, praying for survivors, and sharing our story of support and recovery with other teams and runners.

If you would like to support the Faster Pastors and wildfire survivors, a special offering will be received in worship in late August and early September. You can also follow their progress during the run on social media, from early morning September 9 to late morning September 10.

2022-2023 Scholarships Awarded

Zion has been blessed for many years with several scholarship funds as a part of our Endowment fund. Every year, the Scholarship Committee is able to offer scholarships to students from three different scholarships. This committee remains anonymous in order to minimize influence outside of the student applications.

The Therp Scholarship is one \$1,000 scholarship applicable to any college first-year student with a high school GPA between 3.0 and 3.5 and demonstrates financial need.

The Sprenger Scholarship is granted to students attending an Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) college, university, or seminary. Amounts vary each year depending on the number of students applying and the market.

The Petersen Scholarship is granted to full-time students majoring in education at any college or university who graduate from high school with a cumulative GPA in the upper 50% of their class. The amount available each year varies depending on the market.

This year, because of generous anonymous donations, we were able to offer one-time scholarships called **Distinguished Disciple Awards** to three students who have been active members and

leaders at Zion but did not qualify for any of the endowed scholarships.

Announcing the 2023 Holy Land Pilgrimage

One of my favorite places in the Holy Land is the Church of the Nativity. Under the altar of this church is a passageway that leads to a network of underground caves, widely believed to be the general location of Jesus' birth. From very early on followers of Jesus returned to the location to worship. In fact, these caves are the oldest site in the world continuously used as a place of worship in Christianity.

Immediately next door to the Church of the Nativity is a Roman Catholic Church called the Church of Saint Catherine, which also has a passageway into the caves below. As you enter the sanctuary of this beautiful church, an unassuming sign reads, "We are hoping that if you enter here as a tourist, you would exit as a pilgrim. If you enter here as a pilgrim, you would exit as a holier one."

An unassuming sign delivers a powerful message.

That sign summarizes my own experiences in the Holy Land. In 2018, Pastor Sonja and I went on a pilgrimage together to the Holy Land and returned home unable to see the stories of the Bible in the same ways we saw them before. It was a complete reboot to our reading and understanding of the biblical stories. In 2019, we shared our experience with 46 members and friends of Zion, and earlier in 2022, I was able to lead a group of pastors. Each time I have learned more, and my eyes have been opened to the biblical stories in new ways.

After several years of being unable to travel due to the pandemic, we were surprised by the number of people asking if we would take another group, so we have officially announced our next pilgrimage to the Holy Land, and we hope that you will consider joining us.

The pilgrimage is June 25-July 5, 2023, with an optional excursion into Jordan July 5-8 to see Petra, enjoy a traditional bedouin dinner, and visit a modern refugee community and a local church that serves the refugees. The cost of the trip is \$3,790/person, and an additional \$790 for the Jordan excursion. All accommodations are taken care of by our friend Elias Nawawieh, a Palestinian Christian who grew up in Bethlehem. We stay in 4-star hotels, and all meals are provided (and they are incredible!).

If you are interested in exploring the biblical stories firsthand with your eyes, feet, hands, and heart; or you are interested in traveling to an exotic destination where ancient and modern cultures and politics intermingle in ways that will take you years to sort out; or if you are just interested in traveling internationally with friends, we hope you will consider joining us for this 2023 pilgrimage. We promise it will reboot your faith and change you forever. 

SEPTEMBER—Forty Autumns: A Family's Story of Courage and Survival on Both Sides of the Berlin Wall by Nina Willner, 2016. 416 pages. Memoir.



Forty Autumns makes visceral the pain and longing of one family forced to live apart in a world divided by two. At twenty, Hanna escaped from East to West Germany. But the price of freedom—leaving behind her parents, eight siblings, and family home—was


heartbreaking. Uprooted, Hanna eventually moved to America, where she settled down with her husband and had children of her own.

Growing up near Washington, D.C., Hanna's daughter, Nina Willner, became the first female army intelligence officer to lead sensitive intelligence operations in East Berlin at the height of the Cold War. Though only a few miles separated American Nina and her German relatives—grandmother Oma, aunt Heidi, and cousin Cordula, a member of the East German Olympic training team—a bitter political war kept them apart.

In Forty Autumns, Nina recounts her family's story—five ordinary lives buffeted by circumstances beyond their control. She takes us deep into the tumultuous and terrifying world of East Germany under Communist rule, revealing both the cruel reality her relatives endured and her own experiences as an intelligence officer, running secret operations behind the Berlin Wall that put her life at risk.

OCTOBER—*The Personal Librarian* by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray, 2021. 347 pages. Historical Fiction.



A remarkable novel about J. P. Morgan's personal librarian, Belle da Costa Greene, the Black American woman who was forced to hide her true identity and pass as white in order to leave a lasting legacy that enriched our nation.

In her twenties, Belle da Costa Greene is hired by J. P. Morgan to curate a collection of rare manuscripts, books, and artwork for his newly built Pierpont Morgan Library. Belle becomes a fixture in New York City society and one of the most powerful people in the art and book world, known for her impeccable taste and shrewd negotiating for critical works as she helps create a world-class collection.

But Belle has a secret, one she must protect at all costs. She was born not Belle da Costa Greene but Belle Marion Greener. She is the daughter of Richard Greener, the first Black graduate of Harvard and a well-known advocate for equality. Belle's complexion isn't dark because of her alleged Portuguese heritage that lets her pass as white—her complexion is dark because she is African American.

NOVEMBER—*Wilding: Returning Nature to Our Farm* by Isabella Tree and Eric Schlosser, 2019. 385 pages. Fiction.



For years, Charlie Burrell and his wife, Isabella Tree, farmed Knepp Castle Estate and struggled to turn a profit. By 2000, with the farm facing bankruptcy, they decided to try something radical. They would restore Knepp's 3,500 acres to the wild. Using herds of free-roaming

animals to mimic the actions of the megafauna of the past, they hoped to bring nature back to their depleted land. But what would the neighbors say, in the manicured countryside of modern England where a blade of grass out of place is considered an affront? In the face of considerable opposition, the couple persisted with their experiment and soon witnessed an extraordinary change. New life flooded into Knepp, now a breeding hotspot for rare and threatened species like turtle doves, peregrine falcons, and purple emperor butterflies.

The fabled English nightingale sings again. At a time of looming environmental disaster, Wilding is an inspiring story of a farm, a couple, and a community transformed. Isabella Tree's wonderful book brings together science, natural history, a fair bit of drama, and—ultimately—hope.

Primary hygiene needs such as laundry are often overlooked but essential for anyone trying to secure employment, compete for affordable housing, and regain their self-sufficiency. If you are able to contribute time to this ministry, you will make a huge difference in the community in a fun and unique way.

Dear Mobile Laundry Friends,

Here is an email that Pat Friehauf (Mobile Laundry cofounder) sent out to volunteers a couple of months ago.

"I just compiled the Mobile Laundry monthly stats for Homeward Alliance, and wanted to share it with you. If you've ever wondered how much laundry we do, here's your answer. April was a record month in terms of volunteer hours (287), number of guests served (101), number of loads washed (456), and pounds of laundry (2,647)! During April, we also had our highest number of loads ever in one day at 48!

Of course, we couldn't do what we do without our amazing volunteers. I hope you all have experienced the gratefulness of our guests when they pick up their laundry. It means so much to them to have clean, sweet smelling clothes. Some of you are new,

some are trying new roles, many are willing to fill in when we are short-handed. You rock! And we are so grateful."

Currently, we are working three days a week: two at the Loveland library and one day at Fullana Learning Center in Fort Collins. In addition to the clothes we wash, dry and fold, we provide laundry vouchers to those who can't access our services (24 vouchers last month).

With all the increased activity, we are using lots more soap and cleaning products. We also use a lot of gas and propane, and we can always use financial support for these items and repairs to our truck and machines. You can go to the Homeward Alliance website, click on programs, click on Mobile Laundry and you will find directions on how to donate the products we need and how to sign up to volunteer.

Thanks for all your support. As Pat said in her email, "We couldn't do it without you and you keep us moving forward. You rock."


































High School River Heroes
