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The Heart of Faith

Have you ever wondered what exactly makes a person a Christian? You could give all kinds of answers to this question. Many Christians point to their baptism, while others could emphasize the role of faith or belief, and still others may place importance on living in the way Jesus has shown us. What's at the heart of faith for you?

Our summer theme for worship is “The Heart of Faith.” We will be doing a deep dive into the letter to the Romans. The Apostle Paul wrote this letter to the church community in Rome both as an introduction for himself (as he was an outsider) and as an introduction to a particular way of understanding who God is and how the church was called to live together in the light of Christ. Throughout the history of the church, the letter to the Romans has had a profound legacy in shaping our own theological understanding. Martin Luther considered Romans to be “the chief part of the New Testament and the purest gospel” and “daily bread

of the soul.” As we explore this letter in greater depth, I think you will see why.

The letter to the Romans shows us the heart of our faith, the most essential aspects of who God is and what it means for us to be God's people. Its message is powerful and timeless. At times it is challenging, at other times liberating. Whether you know these passages by heart or whether you are encountering Romans for the first time, it is my hope that we will all be inspired to consider for ourselves what is at the heart of our faith together.

For many of us, summer offers a different pace. Perhaps this is an opportunity for us to check in with ourselves and ask God what is most essential in our life of faith. Just as the heart keeps the body alive, the promise and presence of God keeps our spirits alive. One thing that is at the heart of my faith is the promise that wherever you find yourself this summer, God is with you and God is for you!

As we wind down the spring season, we will soon be looking forward to the late summer when we will have our second annual **Zion Resounds** concert. 
By now, most of you will probably have noticed that the organ console has been moved from the south side of the sanctuary to the right side of the organ cabinet which houses the organ pipes. I wanted to take a moment and tell you all about that move, and why it was done. Logistically, the move will make things so much better for the organist as you likely have seen me trying to discreetly move back and forth from the organ to the piano without disrupting the ongoing service too much. The new location will make this move to the piano much easier and quicker.

But even more importantly, the organ console is now in a much better place to be used to accompany the choir! In its prior position, it was virtually impossible for someone to play the organ and be able to follow anyone who might be directing the choir on the other side of the sanctuary (which is why I didn't play the organ trumpets during the combined choir piece on Easter Sunday). Now there is a much closer direct line-of-sight to the choir director. The move of the console also opens up the entire south side of the sanctuary chancel area for other activities, such as sacred space, or whatever the future might bring us.

All in all, I think this relocation of the organ

console was an excellent decision, and I believe it will serve the church well going forward. And just to give you an idea of the work that went into this move, take a look at the photos included here. One photo shows what the inside of the organ console looks like, and the other photo shows the three control cables that needed to be cut. Inside those three cables are over 200 individual leads that needed to be spliced back together!

I was delighted to celebrate both my ordination and installation here at Zion on March 5. It was a lovely service, with Bishop Jim Gonia presiding and friends and family from all over the country joining in person and virtually to make the event extra special. Many thanks to all who attended the service and shared gifts with me and Greg as we were moving into a new place. We have felt so welcomed here at Zion!

Starting during the season of Lent, many people told me I was “jumping in with both feet.” I got to experience the joys of soup suppers, small groups, and Holden Evening Prayer every Wednesday evening. It helped to have this midweek pause to reflect on where I saw God at work in my life and in our community.

As you may know, I was called to Zion as Associate Pastor with a focus in faith formation. My philosophy of faith formation begins with the community of faith we find in the church. I have often said, “We cannot be Christians alone.” We learn from and are formed by one another, by learning from the witness we hear in scripture and in the faith stories we share. We are also formed by what we do, by the week-in / week-out practices of faith as we worship together, pray, study God’s word, and care for one another.

Throughout my first months at Zion, I have been getting to know this community and observe all that is already happening here, from Sunday school to confirmation to camps and retreats. Starting January 2, I've been working at my clinical site as a chaplain finishing my last requirement (clinical pastoral education-CPE) for graduation and ordination. My experience at St. Anthony North has been wonderful, challenging, humbling, and holy walking with people through a variety of crises and celebrations. This type of work can be quite intense with encounters ranging from life to death and everything in between. It's been a wonderful journey for me and is almost complete. baccalaureate service on Saturday, May 20, held on campus at Luther Seminary and a graduation ceremony Sunday, May 21, at Central Lutheran Church located in downtown Minneapolis. Zion has been blessed by two intern pastors in recent years. Courtney Steitz interned with us in 2018-2019 and is now serving at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Inver Grove Heights, Minnesota. Andrea Kragerud interned with us in 2021-2022 and is now preparing for the process of interviewing for a first call (see article from Andrea on page 6 of this newsletter). These experiences have been positive for Zion and for the interns as a mutual partnership and learning. Zion has grown from their presence and leadership, and these interns are now great pastors serving the larger church. Because it has been such a positive experience, creating a path for regular, yearly internships has been part of our congregational vision for a few years.

Good news! After Easter, Luther Seminary notified us that we will be receiving Katie Elkin as an intern pastor. We don't know the exact details yet about when she will start, but we are too excited not to share the news now! Katie is from North Carolina. She completed her undergraduate studies at the University of North Carolina Chapel Hill, and seminary at Duke Divinity School. She has a breadth of ministry experience, including outdoor ministry, Young Adults in Global Mission in Madagascar, Lutheran Campus Ministry, and more. We are so excited to welcome Katie sometime near the end of the summer. Stay tuned for more details about Katie in the near future.

In the meantime, we are exploring two considerations to provide a great internship experience. First, we will be recruiting an intern committee that will meet with her at least once a month. If you are interested in working with her to provide constructive feedback and critique, please let Pastor Joel know. Second, we will be looking for housing very soon. Intern pastors need their own housing, so it can't be a basement of someone's home unless it has amenities such as a separate entrance and kitchen. Most likely, we will need to lease an apartment, duplex, or house. If you have any thoughts, please let us know as soon as possible.

It's almost summer, and summer means Vacation Bible School (VBS)!

We are so excited to be partnering with Sky Ranch Lutheran Camp and Loveland Lutheran Faith Formation (L2F2) to have a very special VBS day camp for our kids.

The theme will be “FruitFULL Faith: A Spirit Filled Life!” The children will learn about the fruits of the spirit as the Apostle Paul describes them in Galatians 5:22-23: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

Dates for VBS will be June 12-16 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon. Each day, we will begin with a check-in and gathering worship, followed by rotations of small group activities for the kids. Snacks will be provided.

Sky Ranch Summer Camp

We have lots of fun opportunities to get up to camp at Sky Ranch Lutheran Camp this summer for kids in 1st-12th grade. We want to make sure all the kids at Zion are able to participate in as much of the fun as possible, so please let us know if financial assistance can help you or your child get to camp. Prices are listed below.

To register for camp, please contact the office.

June 25-30 (Confirmation Intensive)

Confirmation students are invited to immerse themselves in the biblical story for the week at confirmation intensive camp. Cost: \$475.

High school students are invited to help facilitate the story at Confirmation Intensive Camp and have fun together. Cost: \$300.

July 30-August 4:

Lower elementary students who are completing 1st-3rd grade this May can try a two-night introduction to camp (July 30-August 1). This is a great opportunity for first-time campers to make friends, worship, and experience Sky Ranch. Cost: \$280.

Upper elementary students who are completing 3rd, 4th, or 5th grade this May are invited to camp for the full week to connect with God and participate in community-building activities, day hikes, low ropes activities, and a sleep-out! Cost: \$475.

High schoolers completing 9th-12th grades are invited to the full week of camp for Rendezvous High School, where they will enjoy day hikes and rafting on the Poudre River, sleep in platform tents, cook over the fire, and engage in service projects. It's a high-adventure, high-fun week of camp! Cost: \$515.

Labor Day Weekend at Sky Ranch Lutheran Camp



Come for the weekend to enjoy the beauty of the camp at 9,200 feet surrounded by mountains of 12-13,000 feet.

This year, reservations will be made directly through Zion (not Sky Ranch) on a first-come, first-serve basis. To reserve and pay for a tent site, trailer site with electricity, cabin, or lodge room, call or email the Zion office, check the Connections sheet in worship, or go to the website and fill out the form under the “Register for Events” tab. Sky Ranch is requiring that we pay for a three-night minimum because they’re trying to fill the camp as much as possible. However, the rates are affordable, so even if you can’t stay all three nights we hope you will agree that it is a worthwhile value. If you are interested but need help paying, please contact one of the pastors. We want to have as many people there as possible, and finances should not keep anyone from participating who wants to share in this experience.


forty volunteers deliver approximately 400 meals to homebound seniors and individuals with disabilities in our community so they can live nourished lives, maintaining their independence and dignity.

it. I was ready to give up. But the door opened and he took me out and placed me on the shelf.

“One hour later he handed me a mirror and said, ‘Look at yourself.’ And I did. I said, ‘That’s not me; that couldn’t be me. It’s beautiful. I’m beautiful.’”

“I want you to remember this,” he said, “I know it hurts to be rolled and patted, but if I had left you alone, you’d have dried up.

“I know it made you dizzy to spin around on the wheel, but if I had stopped, you would have crumbled.

“I knew it hurt and was hot and disagreeable in the oven, but if I hadn’t put you there, you would have cracked.

“I know the fumes were bad when I brushed and painted you all over, but if I hadn’t done that, you never would have hardened; you would not have had any color in your life.

“And if I hadn’t put you back in that second oven, you wouldn’t survive for very long because the hardness would not have held. Now you are a finished product. You are what I had in mind when I first began with you.”

News Flash: April 12, 2023

Two teachers from Eagle Crest High School died, one of whom had symptoms associated with bacterial meningitis.

Flashback: March 21, 1988

Meningococcal Meningitis, words we had never heard, blindsided our family and friends. In 18 hours, our daughter Laura had died. On May 3, 2004, Angela Gall, Sonja Pancoast's sister-in-law, and on April 10, 2007, Sierra Krizman lost their battles with meningococcal meningitis. Someone you know may have been a victim of meningococcal meningitis.

Colorado averages seven deaths per year from bacterial meningitis. More than 75 percent of 17-year-olds in the United States had not received any meningitis B vaccines as of 2019.

Sierra's Race is changing that number. The 15th annual race had 600 participants and raised over \$51,000.00. Over the past 15 years, Sierra's Race has raised over \$771,000 and has been able to provide 7,220 free vaccinations. This translates into 7,220 families that are protected from the heartbreaking loss of a loved one taken from them.

So, while the race has been a fun, healthy, and competitive vehicle to accomplish our goals, the purpose has always been to raise awareness and provide free vaccinations to anyone and everyone.

Scholarship Awards

Zion has been fortunate to receive from the abundance of faithful stewards over the years who have established scholarships to support students for college or seminary. It is incredible to think that these stewards have shared the heart of their faith with students who do not even know them, yet receive from their abundance many years later.

This year, we are excited to announce a new scholarship opportunity. Thanks to the generosity of the Boyce-Tate family, a new scholarship called the Boyce/Tate Distinguished Disciple has been established to award active members of Zion who have shown outstanding contributions to the ministries of Zion and have lived their faith in the community. Preference will be given to students who show financial need, and to applicants attending ELCA colleges, universities, or seminaries (or a religious institution of a denomination in common communion with the ELCA). However, because Zion already has a scholarship dedicated for students attending ELCA institutions, if applicants have qualified and received another scholarship from Zion, students who have not qualified for or received another scholarship from Zion may be awarded as a Distinguished Disciple. Up to three new awards may be granted each year in the following categories:

1. One student entering their first year of college and identified as a “distinguished disciple.”
2. One upper class undergraduate, graduate, or doctoral student.
3. One seminarian.

This year, the Boyce/Tate Distinguished Disciple Scholarship was awarded to Sophia Pancoast in the amount of \$2,500. Sophia hopes to attend either California Lutheran University or Pacific Lutheran University to major in biology, with an emphasis in genetics.

The Sprenger Scholarship is awarded to students attending an ELCA college, university, or seminary. For the 2023-24 academic year, two returning students will each be awarded \$2,500 from the Sprenger Scholarship. Tyne Klammer will be a senior with a major in sociology at Pacific Lutheran University. Olivia Tate will be a senior with a major in nursing and a minor in religion at Pacific Lutheran University.

The Arnold “Pete” and Clarice Petersen Scholarship is awarded to students majoring in education. For the 2023-24 academic year, Maddie Elder will be awarded \$2,000 from the Petersen Scholarship. Maddie will be a sophomore at Colorado Christian University, majoring in elementary and special education.

We are so proud of each of these students, and grateful for the heart of faith of those who have made these scholarships possible. Please join us in praying for all of our students!

Zion's School Partnership

When the Thompson School District announced several years ago that Monroe Elementary School would be closing at the end of the 2022-2023 school year, many at Zion were saddened. Many youth and adults attended Monroe, or took their children there, or even worked there. And in the last decade, many from Zion have volunteered there in one way or another. Volunteers have tutored students, helped teachers with administrative projects or room decorating, made copies in the office, and led playground activities. Volunteers have also helped prepare and serve meals for Back to School Night, shared soups and other food for Parent-Teacher Conferences, or handed out bags with educational supplies (and candy) at Trunk or Treat. The work with the teacher, staff, and students brought great joy and fulfillment to many, so Monroe will be missed.

Many know this by now, but when the 2023-2024 school year begins, three schools will be combined into one campus that will house preschool through 8th grade. Monroe and Mary Blair Elementary

So the answer is a resounding "YES," they do want to partner with Zion!

We will need to respond. The needs in the community are great, and you can make a difference!

Schools were each somewhere around 40 percent capacity of their buildings, and Conrad Ball Middle School had room to share, so with grants from government agencies, the Conrad Ball building is being expanded to provide one home for all three schools. This new school will be known as Peakview Academy at Conrad Ball. Peakview is not right across the street, like Monroe was, but it is still "in the neighborhood."

Many at Zion have wondered if the faculty and staff at Peakview would still want to partner with Zion. Last fall, the new principal invited Pastor Joel to join the "community and engagement" committee to explore the questions many had been wondering, but it wasn't until the February and March meetings that the answers became clear. The principal asked every person

on the committee (about 24 of us) to write activities on large sheets of chart paper that could be done every month leading up to the school year and during the school year that would help engage and serve the community. The second phase of the activity was to write how these activities would get done and who would help. It was astonishing how many times "Zion" was written on every single piece of chart paper! So the answer is a resounding "YES," they do want to partner with Zion!

This means we have our work cut out for us. Be praying about if you are interested in helping at the school next school year, whether for one hour each week or more, and whether on the playground, in the office, in or in a classroom. If you are interested in volunteering in any of those ways, drop your name to one of the pastors or in the church office. We will need to respond. The needs in the community are great, and you can make a difference!

Safe Parking in Loveland

What is “Safe Parking?”

Members of Zion’s Local Service Committee have been learning more about it. Zion has hosted two informational sessions with local churches and community organizers.

Churches in several Colorado cities have been working with CSPI (Colorado Safe Parking Initiative) to help people experiencing homelessness while making their own neighborhoods safer. The program goal is permanent housing, but waiting lists for affordable housing can be long, and shelter space is more difficult for couples and families with pets.

With a well-structured program, churches are able to offer parking space during evening and nighttime hours to screened and approved clients on a temporary basis. Spaces range from 3-20 cars, but 10 is typical. The experience has been overwhelmingly positive.

Support services have helped many people to achieve permanent housing and improved employment. Neighbors have appreciated improved safety. Careful screening and sensible guidelines are critical to the success of the program. Clients value a temporary place to park and sleep safely, and their presence acts as a deterrent to crime.

The program is similar to the help Zion was providing to homeless families that stayed in our building through Interfaith Hospitality Network (IHN) / Family Promise, except that they would stay in the parking lot instead of the building. If Zion were to start this ministry, we can choose

the level of services to provide—meals, showers, etc., depending on volunteer response.

The need is much greater than current spaces can accommodate. CSPI reports that more than half of their clients are working, about 50 percent are disabled, 30 percent are on fixed incomes and many have been through some source of trauma.

Three churches in Longmont have opened their lots for safe parking, and Saint Spyridon Orthodox Church in Loveland has recently approved a program.

Several Colorado cities are working to update their zoning regulations to facilitate Safe Parking programs. In Loveland, city staff have forwarded a recommendation to the city council to amend city policies to allow this important work to happen so that people have safe, affordable places to stay.

Look for more information as we listen for how God may be calling us to help.

Drawn to the Word

Lent is the season of the church that includes the forty days (not including Sundays) prior to Holy Week. Traditionally, Lent was the season for people to learn the faith in preparation for baptism on Easter Sunday. As the church has grown and spread around the world, baptisms and formation were spread across the calendar, but Lent continued to retain its emphasis as a time to focus on formation on God's unrelenting love as a spiritual discipline. Zion has lived that as a communal experience, with soup suppers, small groups, worship, and mentoring all focused on one specific theme.

This year our theme was around "Drawn to the Word," a ministry of Pastor Paul Oman that uses his artistic gifts to share the stories of Jesus. On most Wednesdays, we shared a video of Paul telling a miracle story of Jesus, but on March 22, Paul was at Zion in person and painted the story about the friends of a paralytic man who brought him to Jesus for a healing. The way he shared his perception of this story was deeply profound, but one of the most exciting times during his painting was when he rotated the painting to show that what had been the bottom of the painting was actually the top...and what we could not see in the painting before suddenly became clear to us! This is so much like the stories from scripture that we read and hear. Sometimes we just can't make sense of it, until someone turns it around for us, and suddenly we understand what God had been trying to show us all along.

The worship planning team and staff chose this story of Jesus healing the paralytic man for a specific reason. As powerful as Jesus' miracle stories are, this miracle tells a story about the church. We hope that as people see this painting that graces the walls of the church building, we

will all be encouraged to be like the friends of the paralytic man, who cared for their friend deeply enough to bring him to Jesus.

If you have a friend, co-worker, acquaintance, or family member who does not have a church home, consider inviting them to worship, fellowship, Bible study, or any other Zion gathering, so they may experience the heart of your faith and the faith that we all share in Jesus. Who knows? Maybe they will receive a healing or even a miracle from Jesus as this paralytic man did!

Thank you to the Judy Bilstad memorial fund that helped pay for this experience and for the painting that we can see any time we come to Zion. We are grateful that Rick Bilstad, Judy's son, agreed that this would be a meaningful way to remember Judy and the heart of her faith. We are also thankful for Jessica Kuhns, who wrote the small group conversation guide and pulled together supplies both for Paul's painting and for the entire season, and for Jacob Kuhns, who built the frame for the painting and the easel that held it while Paul painted.

Dear People of Zion Lutheran Church, Pastor Joel, Pastor Veronica, Jessica and Jacob and family, Lindsey, Stig, Ron, David, and all who participated in any way—Thank you for inviting me to share in worship with you and for the Paint-Along event. Holy Week Highlights


Maundy Thursday


