2023 CHURCH COUNCIL REPORT Submitted by Steve Courts, Interim President

You may be surprised to see the words, "Steve Courts, Interim President", doing the submitting of this report. 2022-23 Council President, Greg Schairer, had to resign for personal reasons in October and I was appointed by the Council to finish his term. This was a blow to our Council as Greg has been a tremendous leader and his passion for Zion's Long Range Plan and his commitment to see the plan through was inspirational. Greg led with compassion, vision, and a willingness to tackle tough issues with grace. While I'm the one submitting this report, this report should reflect Greg's wonderful leadership.

The Council held a retreat in February to welcome the new Members to Counsil. These included Gordon Kuhns (Youth Member at large), Ron Christiansen and Chris West. They have been a great addition to our group and I'm so happy to have them a part of our team.

Here is a brief summary of the work that has been accomplished or is currently being addressed by the Council.

Approved the Safe Lot program

This is not the complete list of accomplishments or works in progress, but hopefully shows what has been most important to the Council both in 2023 and 2024. Finally, I'd be remiss without stating the importance of the Church staff, specifically the work of our three Pastors and our Office Manager, Lindsey Walter. Their support and leadership have been invaluable to the Council.





PASTOR'S REPORT – PASTOR JOEL PANCOAST

2023 has been a year of change and transformation at Zion. The reports of Zion's staff, committees, and other ministries contained in this booklet are but snapshots of the many ways Zion has lived into our mission to **share God's abundance together to transform lives through the love of Jesus.** As you read through these, I hope you are as proud and excited to share in the talents, gifts, and creativity that are offered so abundantly for the life of the world. Read through these reports and celebrate God's mission. For my report I want to share a few "mission snapshots" that have captured my own time and attention in 2023.

Caring and Service

First, I am grateful for the ways Zion has leaned into the mission to share God's abundance. We have two pastors, one intern pastor, and a handful of staff, but each of us is called to educate, equip, and empower a ministry of the whole church to do the work of the gospel, the good news of Jesus Christ that transforms us all through the love of Jesus.

The number of care ministries and people involved in them is an intangible expression of God's love. As a church, we have visited, called, and checked in with each other. We have listened, delivered home communion or meals, prayed, or just sat with each other as a visible sign of God's presence to each other, especially in times of need. This care moves beyond our own community, as many of you have given your time, energy, and love to the children, family, and staff at PeakView Academy, the new ministry of SafeLot created in 2023, the work of bringing an Afghani refugee into the safety of community and continuing the work to join him with his family, or countless other ways we have shared God's abundance. Zion has been the hands and feet of God in our community as we have cared for each other and the world God made!



Staffing

None of this work could happen without the incredible staff at Zion. Unfortunately, the nature of



managing a church staff that includes as many part-time employees as we have means that hardly a year goes by at Zion without some change to our staffing, but as difficult as farewells can be, these transitions have also offered us opportunities to celebrate the ministry and gifts of new staff.

The first transition I celebrate is the addition of **Pastor Veronica Gould** to Zion's staff. It is a joy to partner in ministry with her as she offers her gifts and passion for ministry. I am grateful for the discernment and prayer of the call committee, council, and congregation to call her to partner in ministry with Zion, and for the love the congregation has provided her as you welcome her as your pastor.

Occasionally we have gotten questions about her role on staff. Though she has taken on the primary role to coordinate faith formation activities, she is called to much more than that as she preaches, teaches, administers the sacraments, leads worship, provides pastoral care, speaks for justice on behalf of the poor and oppressed, equips the church for witness and service, guides the church in proclaiming God's love through word and deed, and much, much, more. Pastor Veronica and I have been and will continue to share in all aspects of ministry. The main distinctions between our calls are that she is tasked with coordinating faith formation ministries, and I am tasked with leading the staff. Even before Pastor Veronica was called to Zion, in June 2022, the council wanted to emphasize the shared call any pastors would have at Zion, so they gave us the titles of "lead pastor" and "pastor." This may not sound like much, and these are not titles we often use, but the thought that went into this decision is 10 important: Pastor Veronica is not an "associate" or "assistant;" she is a pastor and she is your pastor; and I am grateful for her presence and ministry with us!

In July of last year, David Dunbar ended his term with us as director of worship & music, organist, and praise band leader. Thankfully, the search and discernment process led us to put together an incredibly talented team of musicians for Zion's worship. **Neil Forsythe** joined the staff as the organist and praise band leader. We are grateful that **Noelle Stucky-Bauman** remained on our staff, shifting responsibilities to include director of worship & music, children's ministry, and chancel choir. Continuing in their prior roles, we retained **Thomas Chen** as bell choir director and **Ryan Marvel** as accompanist and collaborative artist. Zion is certainly blessed to have such an gifted and diverse group of staff to lead our music and worship! Where would we be without the rest of Zion's incredible staff? Many of you may not even be aware of half the work that **Lindsey Walter** does to connect the many different ministries and people, both within and outside the church. **Stig Oresjo** not only creates projection for worship; he also makes sure technology (projection, video, sound, and more) is working all around the building for many different gatherings and events. Ronda Buck keeps the building clean and welcoming, and she coordinates people, curriculum, and supplies for Sunday School. **Alyssa Hart** coordinates young adult gatherings each month and helps with youth events when needed. **Terri Sloan** keeps the financial records up-to-date and supports the congregational treasurer in many ways. **KB Benstock** is in the nursery almost every Sunday, caring for the voungest in our congregation.

In addition to our paid staff, we have many staff who have held regular responsibilities but volunteered their time. **Angie Elder** shares her heart and the love of Jesus through coordinating many care ministries. **Pam Stevens** sets up our Sacred Space activities every week, helping us experience the gospel in ways beyond hearing and listening in worship. **Linda Sterner** creates a beautiful and interesting quarterly newsletter. Scott Sprain and Eileen Huddle manage contributions to Zion's mission and ministry from members, guests, and groups that share our space.

Internship

Beyond staffing, Zion has made a commitment to hosting intern pastors every year. While this is a commitment and contribution to the wider church in the formation of pastors, it is certainly a great benefit to Zion and I am grateful to be part of this important ministry.

Katie Elkin joined us near the end of last summer and will only be with us until the end of July, but as we already approach her midpoint with us, I can only hope she has benefited from us half as much as we have benefited from her presence and leadership. Even as she waits for ordination to the ministry of Word and Sacrament, Katie has already been an incredible asset to Zion's mission and ministry in the role of pastor. As we have been able to do with Pastor Courtney and Pastor Andrea, we all look forward to seeing where God will take Katie in her ministry.



Holy Land Pilgrimage

With the violence raging in Israel and Palestine at the end of 2023 and the beginning of 2024, it is difficult to imagine being there now. Fortunately, in June and July, before any of the current chaos began, 20 pilgrims from Zion between the ages 15 and 80 joined another group from Atonement Lutheran Church in Boulder in Israel and Palestine to walk in the footsteps of Jesus. This is the second Holy Land pilgrimage we have offered through Zion, and once again it was incredible to see how a trip like this could bring people of all generations together as we shared meals with each other, cared for each other as some fell behind or



grew weary, and worshiped together. I am grateful for the opportunity not only to share the land itself where many of the biblical accounts took place and where Jesus walked, but also to walk with the living Christ as this group of pilgrims grew together.

We are hoping to offer a pilgrimage to follow the footsteps of the Apostle Paul in June/July 2025. This will include an exploration of Greece, Turkey, and the upper Mediterranean as we learn about the early church and the spread of the gospel. Stay tuned if you are interested in joining this pilgrimage next year!

Sabbatical

Sabbatical is a final snapshot that has occupied a small amount of thinking in 2023 but will occupy considerably more time in 2024. The council has recommended and approved a sabbatical for me in 2024. When I took a sabbatical in 2015, the time was wrapped into a strategic plan so that I could spend time gaining ideas, experiences, and skills for three "dreams" the congregation had discerned about the direction God was taking Zion, while three teams simultaneously worked on action plans for when we returned.

This year, sabbatical will look slightly different. After 16 years of ministry at Zion, which recently included ministry during pandemic, a child going to college, and an ailing parent, the first part of this sabbatical during early summer will focus on my own rest and renewal in my relationship to God and my family. I will return at the end of the summer, and during the fall I will then spend the second part of my sabbatical visiting with churches and leaders to explore ideas that will enhance Zion's current mission action plan. I am grateful for the opportunity to take an extended Sabbath rest while focusing on my own faith and relationships. The council has been incredibly supportive and caring, and we have the right staff and other resources in place to be able to cover my absence.

Invitation

This is probably the longest annual report I have written in the 16 years I have served as a pastor at Zion. I have written about so many amazing things about Zion: who we are, the work that God has completed in us in 2023, and what God is calling us to do and be together in 2024. Finally, I want to share what may be my greatest concern for the church (both Zion and the greater church) in the near future: Christ's church has not lived into our call to share the gospel and invite others into the mission we share. It is not our fault alone; there are a million reasons that have caused this to happen, from pandemic to economics to politics and more. This is not just a problem at Zion or even within the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Pastors and church leaders I know and read across our country in many different denominations and church expressions share this concern. This is not a concern that will be addressed easily, or with a program, or by a few great leaders. This is a concern that belongs to the whole church, so my hope for 2024 and beyond is that we all find ways to extend the amazing work we are doing through the love of Jesus from service and discipleship to invitation. Show pride in your church, but more importantly, show confidence in the gospel of Jesus Christ, and start to invite others into the church you love. Look around you, in every aspect of your life. Who do you know that doesn't have a church home? Who do you know who would benefit from a loving, supportive community rooted in the gospel? Who do you know who you would love to share God's abundance to transform lives through the love of Jesus? This

is the mission we share!

PASTOR'S REPORT – PASTOR VERONICA GOULD

Dear friends in Christ.

Zion and I both began 2023 in the midst of a call process, and I am so grateful to the call committee, the council, and the whole church for extending the call for me to serve as your pastor in faith formation. Appropriately enough, I moved to Loveland on Valentine's Day (in the middle of a snow storm!) and I have been blessed to get to know this place as home alongside my partner, Greg. Thank you all for the welcome you have given us.



On March 5, we celebrated my ordination and installation at Zion. Since then, we have celebrated many milestones, from first communion to confirmation, funerals and baptisms. I have been able to proclaim the good news of Jesus in preaching, Bible study, teaching, service, and worship, together with so many incredible people. Many thanks to all of my colleagues and collaborators in ministry, especially Zion's staff, the L2F2 team with Trinity and King of Glory, Sky Ranch, Rocky Mountain Synod, the SafeLot team, and many more!

We journeyed together through a Lenten season inspired by art and the healing stories of Jesus. The squares we painted in our small groups came together to reveal the image and story of Jesus feeding the 5000. This painting that now hangs in the fellowship hall is a reminder of what I appreciate most about our church—we each have a place in the story of God, and we make our mark together. As an intergenerational community of faith, we are called to share our faith across the generations. We are called not only to be disciples of Jesus but to make disciples of Jesus, to share our faith with others.

Faith formation is about discovering who we are in the light of Christ and helping others discover this good news, too: we are beloved children of God called to love and serve one another in the Spirit. This is a lifelong discovery, a lifelong revelation, a lifelong return to what has always been true. We especially celebrate this discovery in children, through Sunday school, as they learn the Biblical story; in worship as they pray, praise, wonder, and even teach during Kids in Christ; in opportunities to serve and build relationships in church, at school, and at home.



I have been so blessed to encounter the Holy One in sacred moments with you: with the youth at Sky Ranch Camp, with families sitting around the campfire on Labor Day Weekend, with women at our retreat in Estes Park, with members and friends of Zion in the sacrament of Holy Communion that we share, with high schoolers at Friendsgiving and middle schoolers at confirmation retreats, with adults and children at Nourish, with Zion's grief group as we share from the heart, with guests of our SafeLot around the dinner table. I hope that you all experience the blessing of the presence of the Holy Spirit in this community and know that it is a blessing meant to be celebrated and shared!

At our semi-annual meeting, I encouraged the congregation to consider how we at Zion could "seek the welfare of the city" (Jeremiah 29:7). We have worked towards this goal by sharing our space with many community groups, advocating for and supporting neighborhood concerns in city council, supporting children and families at Peakview Academy, and envisioning projects that address the housing crisis facing so many people in our community. We continue to seek ways to reach out, connect, and collaborate with our neighbors for the sake of the gospel and in care for all who are in need.

As we enter a new year of ministry together, one word has captured my imagination: discipleship. I am excited for opportunities in the new year to strengthen existing relationships and establish new ones, to sit once again at the foot of Jesus like a child and listen to the good word, and to invite others to share the wonder at God's marvelous love for us. I cannot wait to see how God will be at work in this beloved community of disciples.


Council Member at Large, Amy Moore-

These ministries include: Home Communion Ministers, Stephen Ministry, Care Callers, Meals to Heal, Prayer Shawls, Quilt Tiers, and the Prayer Chain. In 2023, these ministries have worked together to *share God's abundance to transform lives through the love of Jesus*.

There are 13 members of Zion who take communion monthly to Zion's home-centered members who are unable to attend worship in person. These **Home Communion Ministers** not only share the bread and wine from the Lord's table, but also friendship, prayer, and a personal visit. THANK YOU to Amy Brauner, Cindy Brusko, Cindy Kurtz, David Barber, Elliott and Kathy Pancoast, Harriet Colton, Janie Lichtfuss, Joanne Sterkel, Mary Harris, Norm and Jan Einertson, and Phyllis Zimmerman for the time and love you share through this ministry.

Stephen Ministry is a one-to-one care ministry where Stephen Ministers meet with a care receiver who is going through a difficult time (death, divorce, medical illness, etc.) The Stephen Minister and care receiver meet weekly for prayer, conversation, and encouraging support. In 2023, Zion held a training class and commissioned four new Stephen Ministers: Ron Christiensen, Susan Samuels, Noel and Linda Breen. They join the active Stephen Ministers at Zion: Will Reents, Catherine Glaser, Don Roney, Kathy Loken, and Bonnie Showalter. Stephen Ministry offers additional care through sending of grief support materials and monthly prayers for healing in worship. If you or someone you know would benefit from the care of a Stephen Minister, please reach out to Pastor Joel, Pastor Veronica, or Angie Elder.

Meals to Heal provides meals for those recovering from surgery, during an illness, following the birth/ adoption of a baby, or the death of a loved one. Zion has many dedicated volunteers who participate in this ministry and we are grateful for each of you. Please call the church office at any time if you or someone you know would benefit from the gift of meals during a difficult time.

Prayer Shawls are available on the ladders around the church to share with family and friends as a way to physically represent the prayers that are being offered for them through the Zion community. There are faithful volunteers (for whom we are very grateful) who spend countless hours crocheting and knitting these shawls while praying for those who will receive them.

The **Quilt Tiers** meet monthly to tie quilts that have been sewn at home of gracious volunteers. These quilts are donated to Lutheran World Relief and sent to other places recovering from disasters such as fire, hurricane, tornado, flooding, and war. Thank you to our volunteers who share this tangible gift of God's love with those in need.

The **Prayer Chain** is an email ministry where prayers are sent from the Zion office to members of Zion who offer prayers for needs in our community such as surgery, illness, or death, as well as prayers of thanksgiving for the birth or adoption of a baby, successful treatment or surgery, or milestone celebrations. If you would like to be a part of the Prayer Chain, please contact Lindsey in the church office. In addition, if you or someone you know is in need of prayer, you may call the church office anytime to have a Prayer Chain request sent out immediately.

Every evening is occupied with several organizations utilizing the fellowship hall, classrooms, conference room and the sanctuary is buzzing with chancel choir and band rehearsal. The bell choir utilizes the downstairs music room and Boy Scouts, Bipolar Depression group, Beauties and Gems, Seventh Day Adventist church, Sons of Norway, Biblical Justice, NOCO orchestra, Nourish, Bridge, SafeLot and many more enjoy all the space in the kitchen and fellowship hall. Our building so far, has been able to allow outside groups use the space at no charge. We wish to continue this pattern, so many others can receive the fruits that God has provided. Thank you to everyone that supports our building that allows it to be utilized in such a caring capacity. You are a blessing to Zion and in the community.

AUDIT COMMITTEE—JODY R., RANDY DAVIS, JANIE LICHTFUSS

The Audit Committee has been testing random accounting transactions at various times throughout the years, since its inception in 2018. The Committee looks at monthly bank statements, the Zion Expenditure Request forms, invoices, and the recordings in the monthly QuickBooks accounting records. Selected deposits were traced to the Church's deposit records and to the monthly QuickBooks records. These procedures are performed at random times throughout a year with the sole purpose to verify that the accounting procedures and processes are being followed. During the testing for 2023 the Committee found that the procedures and processes were being followed as expected and that there were no areas of concern. The Audit Committee's results were shared with the Council.



MUSIC MINISTRY— NOELLE BAUMAN-STUCKY

The Zion Congregation saw many changes in staffing during the year 2023. Through this time, it was noticeable how supportive our staff is, especially through staffing transitions. All aspects of David Dunbar's position were dispersed and executed in a timely manner, and most of this was delegated by Lindsey Walter.

The Music Ministry Team fluctuated and expanded. Thomas Chen continues to serve as our Bell Choir Director. Ryan Marvel is our Chancel Choir Accompanist and Collaborative Pianist. I am still serving in my role as Children's Music Ministry Director and am now the Chancel Choir Director and Music Director. Neil Forsythe joined us in October as the Zion Organist and Praise Band Leader. We are thrilled to have a substantial and skilled group of musicians to serve Zion in Worship.

We wrapped up the Advent season, Christmas Eve, and the end of 2023 with five beautiful services where all music staff and many musicians from our congregation shared their gifts to enhance our worship services. Leading up to Christmas, Ryan Marvel invited all to a marvelous afternoon full of music from his most recent Christmas album, and some from his past albums.

Our Praise Band began using Thursday nights for rehearsals. This is allowing the band to expand what they can do and provide confidence for the members. For many years the Praise Band has been flexible with personnel, always managing musician's time away. They have also had some impressive consistency from a few: Rod Braman on guitar and voice, Erin Bachman on voice, Janie Lichtfuss on electric autoharp, and Thomas Robinson on drums.

The Zion Bell Choir, lead by Thomas Chen, continues to rehearse on Wednesday evenings, and presents one a month from August to January. Trinity, King of Glory, and Zion Lutheran Choirs joined in anthems at each church throughout the year and we are continuing these collaborations. In November all the choirs joined together at Trinity to sing an anthem which included organ, piano, bell choir, and a solo cello, played by Becky Kutz-Osterberg.

The Lent and Easter season offered many moments of musical enjoyment as we sang our beloved "Holden Evening Prayer" for our midweek services, and sang a cantata composed by David Dunbar for Good Friday.

In July David Dunbar organized a recital titled Zion Resounds. This was the last of a few recitals organized during his time with Zion where he offered a space for members of the church to share their musical gifts during a meaningful afternoon.





CHILDREN'S MUSIC MINISTRY— NOELLE BAUMAN-STUCKY

The most recent musical opportunities for children and youth were in our Advent season. The Sunday School Pageant was held at our second service on December 10. The Sunday School children prepared a script lead by Ronda Buck and Jenna Coleman, alongside preparing music. Our youth were helpful in filling in roles in the pageant and providing music throughout the service. It was a wonderful morning to celebrate the ripe generation and their dedication and engagement in our community.

The Chancel Choir invited children to sing with them for an anthem during Advent. We had a few young voices, including Sheyda Johnson, and we were blessed to have Jana Webster-Wheeler join us on flute. Jana also shared a beautiful prelude and postlude and was accompanied by Ryan Marvel and Neil Forsythe.

As the children get older there will be more opportunities for them to try instruments. The Children's Choir, Kathy Pancoast, and the families involved were so kind to allow the members to prepare music on recorders. Elle Farasyn, Sheyda Johnson, and Khaleesi Lucero worked hard to learn "Da Pacem Domine" with Latin text and on their recorders. They rocked it!

Our Summer Musical Camp was a hoot! We brought back the very first musical I prepared with Zion, "A Technicolor Promise," by Allen Pote and Carole McCann. The camp participants spent only five days learning text, song, and dance to bring this exciting story to life. Children learned about God's promises throughout this rainbow themed, hula hoop filled week of fun.

Last March, the Sunday School members showed their creativity by preparing hymn slides to the text of "Earth and All Stars!" Each participant was assigned a line of text and were to interpret it through a drawing. These drawings were then shown as the congregation sang the song in worship for Palm Sunday.

The year was filled with new opportunities while aligning with some traditions. As vulnerable as it may make them feel, I am incredibly thankful to those who challenge themselves to share their musical gifts with us and praise God while doing it. I am looking forward to seeing the progression of our musical impact and the continued support from each and to each person involved.





SAFE-LOT- LINDA BREEN

In November, Zion Lutheran became the first church In Loveland to host the new SafeLot program. In an initial partnership with King of Glory and St. Spiridon churches, we provide safe and legal parking spaces during the hours between 6 pm and 8 am for screened guests. The City of Loveland modified an ordinance to acknowledge the legality sleeping in cars as part of a church-organized program. Volunteers and pastors visited Zion's adjacent residences with SafeLot information and received support and encouragement for the program. An informational session was held with the congregation to address questions and concerns. Using a grant from the synod, we purchased a portapotty. Volunteers from Zion and UUC Namaqua built an enclosure for it. Electrical connections and electric blankets are provided. We were able to accommodate 4 guests through the end of November, when they moved to King of Glory. In December, they began receiving case management services from staff at Guiding Connections, which is a part of House of Neighborly Service. Zion returns to hosting parking guests in January, on a bimonthly schedule. Volunteers provide meals with fellowship and an opportunity to take showers. On two nights in November when the predicted temperature dropped below 10 degrees Fahrenheit, volunteers joined the guests in sleeping inside the building.

Our first volunteer organizing meeting, led by Pastor Veronica and Pastor Joel, had a wonderful turnout. The volunteer signups for November were filled, and some who had intended to offer meals did not have a chance. January provides more chances for volunteers to participate, and greater challenges in accommodating the unusually cold January temperatures. Volunteers cook and serve meals and assist guests in using the shower facilities and laundering towels. A morning lot host checks the parking lot, and an evening host monitors the lot and communicates with guests. In extreme cold weather, overnight hosts are needed to spend the night with guests, and additional volunteers may help in laundering sheets and being present during some evening and morning hours.

The initial group of Loveland Safelot guests are all seniors, and one has a regular job. A short-term guest moved out of the area when she obtained a better job. They are quiet, friendly, and grateful to have a safe place to sleep. There have been no concerns with their behavior and no complaints from neighbors. In fact, some of the guests and volunteers have been helpful in improving the security of the church by reporting unauthorized people using the parking lot at night.

Many thanks are due to the dedicated and generous volunteers, and to the Zion leadership for the support of this program. We hope to keep people safe while improving their chances for permanent housing and job opportunities, and we hope our experience may encourage other local churches to join the program. In the longer run, we look for partnerships which may address the causes of homelessness and provide more long term options.

LOCAL SERVICE—JACOB KUHNS

The Zion Local Service Committee began its inaugural year by outlining its goals. The committee was formed for the purpose of connecting the Zion member community to local organizations that can use our support. Zion members have a long history of being involved in the community and serving others. In the past we have worked regularly feeding people experiencing homelessness, helped found a multi-service community organization and built houses for families. Service to others is part of the character of Zion.

Since the pandemic however, connections between the Zion community and local organizations have dwindled and some have fallen away completely. Rebuilding these connections is what the Local Service Committee was created for. We want to work with the Zion community to find out how people want to help their community and we want to work with local organizations to find out what type of service they need.

Within the first few months of coming together as a committee we were presented with the idea of SafeLot. While this program is much narrowed from the many ways Zion has served its wider community in the past we felt it was too good an opportunity to help others to pass up. For the remaining part of 2023 the focus was then put on SafeLot until such a time as the program could be a stand alone committee. The Local Service Committee looks forward to returning to its wider goal in 2024 with renewed energy and membership.

TECHNOLOGY-STIG ORESJO

There are around 40 to 50 people tuning in to Zoom for our services every Sunday, as you turn around towards the camera in the sound booth, and wave to during "Sharing of the Peace". Two of the main reasons we have so many online, even now after the pandemic, is due to amazing technical equipment from a generous congregation, supportive individuals and families. The other reason is due to our great team, Stig, Lindsey, Pam, and Rich running sound, camera, and projection and their dedication, Every Sunday showing up at 7am to power all our equipment up and verify that everything works. We seldom have issues, but it is important to be here early to troubleshoot anything that has occurred.

In 2023 we purchased an additional camera, a "digital snake" and a couple of wireless microphones. With the snake we were able to replace an "analog snake" in the choir area. The analog snake has a separate pair of cables for every microphone used. The digital snake is time multiplexing every microphone, so it is an internet cable (8 wires) instead of around 100. Much easier to install and much cleaner up into the mixer board. For 2024 we look forward to expanding our wireless system with microphones in the choir area, to improve clutter and tripping hazards.

A HUGE thank you to the congregation for your support and providing ZION with resources, that allow us acquire great equipment. Our team continues to look for ways we can improve and make our online worship experience better.

FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP—GENE ELDER

2023 marked the maiden voyage of the newly merged Financial and Stewardship Committee (formerly known separately as Finance and Stewardship). A few late nights with Excel wizards Steve Claytor and Chas Farasyn produced our 2024 plan.

The theme for the year was "Entrusted" and we were grateful to see our generous members of Zion rise to the ambitious challenge that was set for the year. At Zion, we live into that promise through our mission to "share God's abundance together to transform lives through the love of Jesus." In recent years we have seen many examples in our shared ministry of what God has entrusted to us as a faith community: Gifted staff, pastors, and a yearly intern pastor. A vision that leads us into the community to share God's love. Deep partnerships with other ministries, agencies, and community leaders. A caring intergenerational community drawn together by God to grow in faith and love.

In 2023, one of our ministry priorities was greater commitment to engaging our community. As we engaged the surrounding community and neighborhood, God has opened doors to entrust us with the following increased service opportunities for 2024:

Ensure that people experiencing homelessness have a safe place to park and sleep in their vehicles through SafeLot Loveland. Share a spirit of generosity and relationship with local agencies, such as Alternatives to Violence, House of Neighborly Service, Community Kitchen, KidsPak, and many more. Renew our previous commitment to Monroe Elementary School with Peakview Academy, the new and expanded school at the Conrad Ball location.

Envision new opportunities with the Northern Colorado Regional Youth Shelter, projected to open across the street from Zion next fall. Continue to share space freely with the community through the upkeep of Zion's building and grounds.

Zion has been entrusted with incredible staff, from office and building management, to worship and music, to faith formation and pastoral care, and much more. Our staff is part of the strong foundation for our present and future ministry, including a new second pastor and an intern pastor. Being stewards of God's gifts means that we honor our gifted staff through appropriate compensation, which is always increasing as the cost of living increases.

Serving as an internship site for developing pastors has been a gift both for Zion and for the greater church. Interns bring energy, new ideas, and an opportunity for us to reflect intentionally on our mission. Most at Zion would agree that our previous intern pastors, Courtney Steitz and Andrea Kragerud, have been gifts of abundance. Already, many of you know that Intern Pastor Katie Elkin is a gift and blessing to Zion. Because of this gift God has entrusted to us, this ministry initiative will help us actualize our goal to serve as a yearly internship site.

Zion has been entrusted with an intergenerational community that cares for each other, as well as the leadership to develop new programming and outreach. This ministry initiative will allow us to increase our potential for life-changing faith formation ministries in 2024, such as faith milestones, confirmation, high school service learning, young adult programming, and adult faith formation.

Perhaps the greatest challenge since the pandemic has been that many younger families have not returned to regular participation in our faith community. This ministry initiative will allow us to experiment with alternative ways to invite renewed or new participation, growth, and learning through faith formation.

There is a nationwide effort to get the AAA or Afghan Adjustment Act passed and many letters have been sent , including many from our 3 ELCA Loveland churches, but no real significant progress has been made at this time. Hassib continues to be employed by his original employer and amazes us with his positive attitude and resilience.



- New Pavilion! We cannot wait for you to experience this beautiful space!



A MESSAGE FROM PRESIDING BISHOP ELIZABETH EATON



Dear friends in Christ,

Over the past year we have continued to experience changes in the world around us. Even as our church finds ways to adapt to this changing world, we find hope in the unchanging and always present promise of God's love through Jesus Christ. We change and adapt not to conform to the world but because we believe that the gift of God's Son is for the world, and that our congregations and worshiping communities are places to gather and be sent into the world, where we will tell the story of God's love in word and deed.

The ministries of our congregations, our synods and the churchwide organization provide ways for the church to move beyond the boundaries of structures and geography and to share God's love with people in our neighborhoods, our cities, our country and beyond. We engage in this ministry knowing that our church walks by faith, trusting in God's promise in the gospel, and that we exist by and for the proclamation of this gospel word. In John 15:5, Jesus reminds us, "I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing." We are connected by the promise that we do all through Christ and can do nothing apart from him.

God gives the Holy Spirit, who uses gospel proclamation — in preaching and sacraments, in forgiveness and in healing conversations — to create and sustain this faith. Just as we rely on God to sustain our faith, we rely on each other to sustain the ministries that offer God's love to the world. Through your generosity to each expression

of this church — your congregation, your synod and your churchwide organization — you add to our collective voice proclaiming God's love for all.

I am grateful for your generosity over this last year. My gratitude spreads far beyond your generous financial gifts. You've shared your gifts of time through countless hours of volunteering, serving and accompanying. You've shared the gifts of your voices as we've tried to discover and learn how God is calling us to be the church now and into the future. And, finally, dear church, you have shared the gift of the realness of God's love with the world around you. Be well, dear church, and stand steadfast in the promise of God's love and grace as you take that promise with you into the world.


TOGETHER IN 2023

- The **Campus Ministry Committee** regrouped to better accompany our seven synod campus ministries.
- Lutheran Advocacy Ministry Colorado worked on a number of bills including the passage of House Bill 1112 (Rep. S. Bird), which will make significant changes for Colorado tax filers who claim the Earned Income Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit. It's one of our state's most effective and proven antipoverty measures.
- Lutheran Advocacy Ministry New Mexico advocated successfully for \$10 million in additional one-time funding for low-income/affordable housing, \$30 million in additional annual funding for low-income/affordable housing, and an increase in the state's child-tax credit and universal healthy school meals for all New Mexico children.
- The RMS Disaster Response Committee organized to better accompany and support congregations in areas that have been impacted by major disasters
- The Synod was represented at board meetings & gatherings of our Social Ministry Organization partners, including Lutheran Family Services Rocky Mountains, Eben Ezer Lutheran Care Center, Urban Servant Corps and Border Servant Corps.
- A multi-cultural ecumenical pilgrimage to Greece and Rome included members of the Rocky Mountain Synod and the Episcopal Church in Colorado walking in the footsteps of Paul while praying for peace in the Holy Land.
- **Vital Right Shaped Ministry** provided tools for congregations and rostered ministers to review their congregational life, set a course for their future, and strengthen leaders for their journey ahead.
- Our **Congregational Transition Team** supported ministries throughout the synod during their transition and call process.
- Synod staff accompanied two of our congregations as they
 moved into new spaces, with Highlands Lutheran in Denver
 relocating to the Lutheran Center and Cristo Rey/Latino
 Ministry West Denver moving into the building generously
 donated to the synod by Christ the King Lutheran upon its
 conclusion of ministry.

Your generosity fueled these ministry opportunities, while supporting the countless ministries of our whole church across this country and around the world.

With **profound gratitude**, we celebrate the many ways your mission support has empowered our ministry and mission as **Christ's Church, Better Together** in the ELCA Rocky Mountain Synod in 2023.

- In May we met in **Assembly** in El Paso to experience the power of "Cruzando Fronteras/Crossing Borders" for the sake of the gospel, and in September our rostered ministers gathered in four locations across our synod to engage in the discernment about the 2024 bishop's election.
- The Global Mission Network supported RMS missionaries and began planning for a RMS border immersion trip and visit by Malagasy companion synod leaders in 2024.
- Excellence in Leadership (EiL)
 added trainings on healthy
 boundaries, adaptive leadership,
 conflict management &
 congregational systems. Since
 2019, EiL has trained 179 leaders in
 courageous, resilient & faithful
 leadership.
- 3E (Educate, Equip, Enact), funded by the Lilly Foundation, provided 11 mini-sabbatical grants for rostered leaders, stewardship learning opportunities for congregations, non-profit management training for 40 leaders, and funding to support rostered leaders engaging in counseling, coaching and spiritual direction.

Give us the ability to adapt to the cultural, economic and social changes that occur in the neighborhoods we serve.


Receive our prayer, O God.
